

University of the Arts (UArts) - The Philadelphia, Pennsylvania BFA program in graphic design at UArts teaches students in old and new media. Students have the opportunity to work on real, practical projects based in the wider Philadelphia area as part of their coursework. The department also hosts an annual spring seminar with a well-known visiting design teacher. This is another program that focuses more on practical and commercial than artistic and theoretical. Art University Academy - San Francisco, California Academy of Arts, BFA University's Graphic Design focuses on the intersection between art and commerce. There's also a focus on professional readiness and creative and marketing competence. Overall, this school is more about giving you action-working skills and connections than developing your exquisite artistic sensibilities as a designer. Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) - The Rochester, N.J. Graphic Design BFA's RIT is broad in professional education and interdisciplinary in coverage. Students have unique opportunities to cooperate with other departments and disciplines on projects, especially in technical and environmental impact of design. RIT is a good option for students who are interested intersection between technology and design. Admire this very important and cutting-edge part of graphic design for you with so many options, it can be overwhelming to try narrow the field down to a few programs that really interest you. I strongly recommend attending school, using information sessions near you, and talking to current students and recent graduates. To get admitted to more competitive programs, you will often need a strong art and design portfolio. Are you taking art classes, so how could you hold a pencil, or graphic design a relatively new interest for you? To get feedback on your portfolio, I advise taking it to any portfolio review session you may find. Sometimes art schools send representatives across the country to review student portfolio fair, where you can get feedback from many schools in one day about how your portfolio stacks and what you can do to strengthen it. Otherwise, try contacting your local school of art and design to try to get a portfolio of feedback and a clear idea of how competitive your portfolio can be. #2: Am I more interested in the artistic or commercial side of design? Some programs, like the one in Ele, are much more concerned with the high and artistic side of graphic design and its theoretical applications, while other programs, like the School of Visual Arts, are more focused on transforming you into commercially trained practices. One is not necessarily better or more useful than the others, but it could be better aligned with your goals. Dreaming of experimental installations in an art museum or advertising for Target? Graphic design programs tend to fall under the categories: those housed in specialized art schools like RISD, and those housed in major universities like Carnegie Mellon. If you have a heart set on a more traditional college experience, you might be better off going to a big university that offers offers design programs. If, however, you are interested in a smaller institute either, consider a large art school like SCAD. This seems like a very real and official lecture at art school. #4: Am I interested in interdisciplinary research? What about cutting-edge technology? Some programs offer more flexibility in investigating other interests (especially the technology in Carnegie and RIT) than other, tougher programs. You should also consider if you want a program that is clearly focused on training students in new media and the most advanced graphic design technologies like the College of Creative Studies. #5: Is there a special faculty I want to work in? Check out the biographies of professors and faculty in all the programs that interest you. Who does the job that interests you the most? Be sure to mention any faculty you're impressed with and want to work with in your app, too! #6: Do I want to study abroad? If you have a heart set to study abroad, your options are somewhat limited. Both SCAD and Ringling have established study options abroad, but you'll probably need to do some research to find out whether going abroad is possible at other schools as well. #7: Do I have geographical preferences? Last but of course, not least, where do you want to live while you attend college? There are plenty of options in California and the East Coast (NYC in particular), but you're not necessarily confined to these places. Many programs on this list are as far away as Sarasota, Florida; Chicago, Illinois; and Savannah, Georgia. If you want to go to the Big Apple, you have a lot of options.
