
Naive consciousness theory of community development pdf



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Definition: According to Ledwith (p.xiii), Naive Consciousness: Freire's concept for partial empowerment, which refers to the symptoms of oppression, dealing with certain issues rather than underlying the roots of injustice. Apply: Naive consciousness can be seen when you are working in a
community and you are addressing superficial level issues rather than recognizing and working through some of the more systemic problems. For example, community developers can enter the community and help get rid of an abandoned home to get rid of the
decline in society. However, getting rid of an abandoned house does not solve the question of why the house was abandoned in the first place. Perhaps the owners could no longer afford the rent because of the gentrification in their community. Therefore, if gentrification is a problem, getting
rid of one abandoned house will not help with the problem of increasing rents, leading to homes to become abandoned. Adaptation: Naive consciousness can be applied to interpersonal practice, where a social worker can help a male client with a superficial level problem for fear of talking
to women, playing role-playing situations to try to practice ways in which the client can communicate with women. However, if a social worker never talks to a client about why he is afraid to talk to women, such as feeling self-conscious about his appearance or having a negative experience
with a woman that has happened in the past, role-playing games will never get to the root cause of customer fear. He may feel more prepared for what to say to the women he encounters, but he will never approach them because of his self-awareness of his appearance. Source: Ledwith,

it begins. i.e. a person is homeless, and a social worker works to take care of this aspect of his life, while ignoring the fact that the person does not have the stable income or competitive skills necessary to get out of this situation of homeless people more constantly. Adaptation: Also in the
