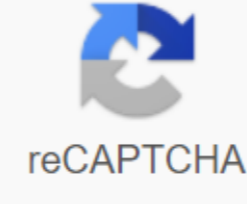

Here's a fun past simple board game that helps students practice past regular and irregular verbs as well as simple positive sentences. In this activity, students make excuses for arriving late to class by playing simple board games from the past. Give each group a copy of the game board and a set of excuses cards. When a student lands in a square marked I'm sorry i'm late, the student picks up an excuse card and makes excuses for being late by changing the sentence to a simple form of the past. I missed the bus'. If a student forms a sentence correctly, it stays square. Otherwise, the student must return to the previous rectangle. The first student to arrive at class wins the game. Here is a free past simple game to help students practice forming simple affirmation statements of the past. Each group is given a set of time-expressive cards and a set of verb cards. Students put their time expression cards on piles and handle verb cards equally. The player then turns the time expression card in the pile and makes a simple positive sentence of a true past using one of the verbs in his card and time expression.
