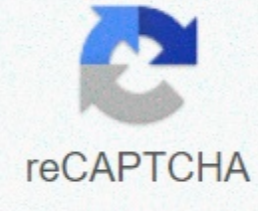




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A history of film 7th edition pdf

Westerns is said to be an American art form, but the very first Western was filmed in 1899 in the English countryside, in a town called Blackburn. Filmmakers created a one-minute film titled Kidnapping by Indians four years before The Great Train Robbery, the film most film historians name as the first in the genre. Since those early depictions of life and frontier justice in the Old West, filmmakers have explored a wide range of themes and characterizations - what it was like during this tumultuous period of American history. Although the genre has sometimes declined, it continues to evolve. Modern westerns include more complicated, inclusive themes told from different perspectives than the typical cowboy hero. However, many westerns from the earliest days of filmmaking continue to appear on lists of the top films of the genre in film history. A legendary gunfighter faces his mortality in a way he didn't expect after being diagnosed with cancer in this 1976 film adapted from a novel. John Wayne plays J.B Brooks, a hardened gunslinger who would rather die dignified in a firefight than face a lingering death. James Stewart plays Doctor Hostetler, who delivers life-changing news. The film received rave reviews, as well as Oscar, BAFTA, and Golden Globe nominations and a place on the year's top films list. Most Westerns feature men as the main character.
