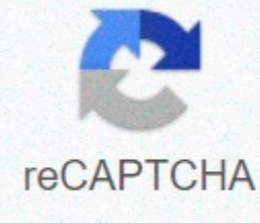

Dragonwings study guide answers

Dragonwings is a historical novel written by Laurence Yep, who won the Newberry Prize. In this novel, Moon Shadow comes to America to see his father, Windrider, in his own home in the Middle Kingdom. As Moon Shadow and his father struggle to survive in an enemy country, they somehow find time to focus on their dreams. Windrider read about the flying plane the Wright brothers built and believes it can build and fly better. Moon Shadow is fighting alongside his father as they both build their dream and work to survive both natural and man-made disasters. Dragonwings is a new asian community in the early 1900s and the spirit that kept them from giving up their dreams. Moon Shadow never met his father. Windrider went to get rich in America before Moon Shadow was born. Therefore, Moon Shadow is excited when a distant relative comes and tells him that Moon Shadow will travel with him to America to live with his father. The journey by boat is very exciting, but not nearly as exciting as the foot of the Land of the Golden Mountain and met the father he just heard stories about. For the first few years of his life in America, Moon Shadow lives with his father in the laundry, which is owned by his father's uncle and several friends and relatives. Moon Shadow goes along with his father to make deliveries and pick up the dirty laundry. When Moon Shadow was older, he was given the task of collecting previous monies due to the company. During one of these trips, Moon Shadow was beaten and robbed by his cousin, who is addicted to opium. Windrider goes after his cousin, threatening to kill him, but stopped the gang to which his cousin belongs. This causes windrider and moon shadow to move away from the company or face retaliation from the gang. Windrider and Moon Shadow move into a stable behind a white woman's once-great home. This white woman is very kind and wants to know everything about the culture of Windrider and Moon Shadow. This woman also has a niece who befriends Moon Shadow. Over time, this four becomes a close-entwined group of friends, often picnicking and flying dragons. During this time, the Windrider will be obsessed with the idea of building a flying machine, to one day fly like a dragon. To help his father, Moon Shadow writes to the Wright brothers, a brother and sister who had built their own flying plane a few years earlier. The Wright brothers are sending blueprints and maps to windrider to help him with his own plane. One morning, a big earthquake hits. Moon Shadow stands in the courtyard and watches all the buildings around him fall apart. When it's over, Moon Shadow and his father hear voices from the rubble. With the help of the housewife, Moon Shadow and Windrider begin to dig survivors out. During the day, they learn that the army and the government government Martial law. However, the army plunders more than the looters they had to stop. Moon Shadow and his father are moving to Golden Gate Park, where many other survivors of the city have gathered. In a few days, however, the government will come and force Asians to move. Asians are often moved from one place to the place, causing them to fear that they will not resettling in their own part of the city. Leaders get up together and look down with the government, forcing them to allow Asians to return to their homes. The company building has been rebuilt and the laundry business is starting again. Windrider announces that he plans to move so he can focus on building his plane. Windrider and Moon Shadow live in a barn for three years, doing odd jobs and building their flying machine. As soon as the plane is ready to fly, the cousin returns and steals all their money. Windrider learns that they're about to be evicted by the landlord, and they can't move the flying plane. The Company will appear on that last day and help move the flying machine to the top of the mountain where Windrider can fly over the valley. Unfortunately, one of the wings breaks and the Windrider crashes. Windrider survives and learns from the ordeal that family is more important. Windrider returns to the Company to work on the day he can bring his wife to America. Dragonwings, Laurence Yep in the early years of the twentieth century, 8-year-old Moon Shadow leaves China to join his father, Windrider, in San Francisco. Moon Shadow learns that his father, a master kitemaker, dreams of building and flying his own aircraft. Chinese tradition and culture come vividly to life as father and son face the challenges of living in America. They experience discrimination, but they also make valuable friends. The 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire wreaked havoc, but new opportunities for the boy and his father. In the dramatic conclusion, Moon Shadow and Windrider perform a dangerous experiment in flight.
