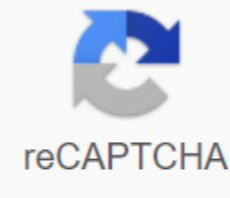

These are the regulations that will be maintained for fiscal 2017. Significant changes in this version of the RCM are: SEIT make-up provisions are set out within the RCM, which require SEIT make-up when the SEIT teacher is absent and, where appropriate for the needs of individual students, the student has a justified absence. The service provider may, but is not obliged, make sessions for unexplained absences of students. It provides reimbursement for safety uniforms (PTC 105) and household maintenance (PTC 102), subject to indirect care screen. It provides compensation for 100-level staff and office workers (code 505 and 605) for work of more than 1 FTE, similar to direct care workers. All other non-direct care workers are still limited to 1 FTE. Provided that merit awards (bonuses) can take into account the longevity and presence of employees as part of the merits as long as they are measured and supported by written employee performance assessments. Allows providers to pay sign-up bonuses subject to the following provisions: They can only be paid to workers in direct care Must be paid within the first year of employment Not to exceed 10% of individuals' fees The conditions must be articulated in the written agreement They can only be for positions where the organisation has difficulties recruiting staff (supported by high turnover and/or vacancies) Allows providers to pay retention bonuses subject to the following provisions: It may only be paid to workers in direct care Must be reflected in a written contract, including a request to receive such a bonus, amount and timing of payment, and withdrawal at termination cannot be paid during the first year of employment Cannot exceed 5% It can only be paid to employees, not contractors Follow the bonus rules in that they must be paid within 2.5 months after the end of the year. It allows for reimbursement of educational assistance costs, including student loans, because as long as such costs are incurred by taking a course or obtaining a diploma relevant to the area where the employee works, and the employer has exhausted all federal and other grant options available to cover such education costs. In addition, the employee must receive a passing assessment, and other parameters exist. Discretionary pension contributions are limited to 25% of compensation for individual employees Legal and other professional remuneration incurred in connection with any actions or procedures initiated to challenge the results of an audit or any act, omission or determination by the funding body is not permitted (e.g. if you sue in connection with the findings of the OSC audit) Requires service providers to purchase their debt in order to secure the most recent interest rates, every 5 years, the graduated inadmissibility of interest in working capital for late CFR filers is foreseen, if submitted within 90 days. If the application is more than 90 days late, interest on working capital is not allowed. It prohibits providers from loaning tuition revenues received from state or local governments or school districts for student education under Article 81(1) of Regulation (EC) No 1093/2009. It provides new requirements for documentation on consultation fees (such as accounting and legal fees) and vehicle fees.
