At the age of 11, he and his younger brother Edward contracted spinal meningitis in 1936 and suffered for Detroit to live with her aunt in the hope of finding better job opportunities. After his move, he visited the Bethany Pembroke church and accepted the call to accounting and business administration. He also graduated from high school through a mail-order school and received a full four-year congressional fellowship degree in education, becoming the first African-American to do so in college. He earned a master's degree in deaf education from Michigan State Normal Collegis of the Deaf Africans (later called the Christian Mission for the Deaf). Shortly thereafter, he travelled to Accra, Ghana, and established the Accra Mission Shana, Côte d'Ivoire, Benin, Cameroon, Burkina Faso, Burundi, the Central African Republic, Sierra Leone, Chad, Togo, Zaire, Gabon, Congo, Nigeria and Kommunication which involved the use of sign languages indigenous peoples. En route from Rward (1982).	y pioneer for the deaf. Born on June 27, 1925 in the Ensley area of Birmingham, Alabama, Foster was the eldest of four children. His father Wiley Foster was a First World War veteran and worked as a from permanent deafness. Because of his disability, he attended the Alabama School for the Deaf of Color for a while since the school did not offer a high school program. At the age of 17, Foster moved to live a Christian life. After living in Detroit for some time, Foster decided to continue his studies. In 1950, he graduated with honors from the Detroit Institute of Commerce with a concentration in hip at Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C., a federally funded school created to educate the nation's deaf and hard of hearing citizens. In 1954, Foster graduated from Gallaudet with a bachelor's lollege (now Eastern Michigan University) a year later, and in 1956 he earned a second bachelor's degree in Christian missions from Seattle Pacific College. That same year, Foster founded the Christian a School for the Deaf in Accra, Ghana, the first school of its kind in Africa. Over the next three decades, with the cooperation of local schools and churches, he founded 31 additional schools for the deaf in Kenya. It has also set up training programmes for those working with the deaf in Ethiopia, Liberia, Mali, Niger, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe, among others. He introduced his concept of total sons and a daughter. He also supported several deaf students attending Gallaudet College. Throughout his life, he has received numerous awards and distinctions. He received an honorary doctorate wanda to Kenya, Foster was killed in a burning plane crash on December 3, 1987. His remains, along with those of 11 other Americans, were buried at the crash site near Gisny, Rwanda. In 2004, the audet has also dedicated and renamed its auditorium to the Andrew Foster Auditorium. Currently, Gallaudet has created the Andrew Foster Merit-Based Scholarship for Students.
