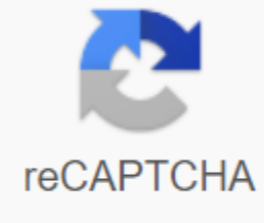




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You have thoroughly studied all breeds of dogs for your new puppy and you have chosen Shepherd Australia. Good choice. There are very few breeds of dogs as faithful, affectionate and entertaining as Australia. But the cost of Shepherd Australia may be a concern. So, how much does the Australian Shepherd cost? The average price of Australian Shepherd ranges from \$650 to \$850. However, an Australian can cost between \$300 and \$1,800+USD depending on the breeder's reputation, jacket colours, pedigree and location. Australian Shepherds are not the cheapest breeds out there, but they are also inexpensive. Let's keep examining why Australian Shepherds cost as much as they do. That's why you'll see some go for about \$350, while others go for well over \$1800. It's important to understand these factors when shopping for your new child. By going in with knowledge, you will rest easy knowing you will get the best deal. 1. Breeder reputation Not all Australian breeders are equal. Some are more knowledgeable, while others are less. Unfortunately, many are ordinary breeders and few are professional breeders. If you can afford it, it is always best to go to a professional breeder. It is often clear which breeders have a reputation and that is not. As a general rule of thumb, you get what you pay for. In other words, the higher the price, the more reputable the breeder (usually). However, this is not a difficult fact. Many breeders, reputable or not, may try to overload based on rare qualities, such as unique shirt colors. Looking for reputable Australian shepherd breeders This may be the most common question among new owners looking for their Australian child. The good news is that there are many ways to find reputable breeders. Take, for example, the AKC Merit Breeders Program. They state that their program strives to honor responsible breeders who rise above them. This means more detail and attention to health, temperament, genetic screening and care during pregnancy/ after birth. Ask your breeder if they are part of a reputable program. If so, you can do a quick search from them here to verify if that's really the case. If they are less honest, it must be a giant red flag. Properly questioning the Merit program isn't the only way to find reputable Australian Shepherd breeders. And just because a breeder is not part of the AKC's list doesn't mean they have no credibility. The best way to find a reputable breeder is to wear your detective hat and get started Question. Also, you should really go to the breeder's facility to check how they are treating their Aussies. Always make a list of questions before Go. Through their answers, you can often feel how savvy Australian breeders are. If they give great answers and seem savvy, then there is a good chance they are responsible breeders. Ask questions regarding the process of caring for the mother and puppy during pregnancy and after pregnancy. These are the most important steps undeniable in breeding. For the most part, many will think that reputable breeders do not charge extra for different coat colors. However, supply and demand will say otherwise. It is not uncommon for breeders to charge extra for speaking, tricolor or Merle Shepherds Australia. This is because they are in higher demand. Although not everyone, many potential owners prefer the unique look of merles and three colors. So breeders are often left with black Aussies, or little other desire. Sometimes, instead of charging more for fancy shirt colors, they can simply charge less for those harder to sell. At the end of the day, Australian breeders are running a business. It's their livelihood, so I can't blame them. Some may even argue that this practice gives breeders little credibility. For example, some breeders can be bred for color coats (to make more money), instead of breeding for quality dogs (temperament, health, etc.). This may be the case with some, but it is certainly not the case with all breeders. Australian Shepherds Genealogy What exactly is the Australian Shepherd genealogy? In a it's your child's family history along with more detailed information. All have pedigree - at least from reputable breeders. To form a pedigree, dogs of a particular line must be registered with a Kennel Club, such as the AKC. However, just because dogs are registered on a pedigree doesn't mean they are quality. Real breeders only need to pay a fee to register their dogs. How Genealogy Affects Aussie Price A dog genealogy can tell you many things, some of which, you should definitely be aware of. For example, many genealogies will tell you how great one is at a certain skill. When you look at a pedigree of Australian puppies, you may notice the CH symbol next to an early ancestor. CH stands for champion, and means competing in a competition and winning. This can be a show competition, agility or cattle competition. For Australian Shepherds, the competition is usually in herding because it's their instinct intelligence. Unsurprisingly, the more child champions there are in its line, the higher the price they will usually be. So if you're just looking for a companion Australian, then a long history of cattle-raising champions is probably not worth it. Healthy dogs cost more Although not present on all pedigree, a number of health factors will be noted with these recently. Of course, the healthier the price, the higher the price. For example, the abbreviation OFA records the condition of one with hip dysplugs - a relatively common deformity of the hip socket. Dogs tested and graded: E (excellent), G (good) or F (fair). Other health information such as eye conditions and elbow dysplasia are found on genealogy as well. 4. Last factor (but not least) position in Australian Shepherd's price is the position. Certain areas where Australian Shepherds (or dogs in general) have higher demand can mean premiums on price even with the same quality. However, if you happen to live in an area with many competitive breeders, it's a good idea to have a quick drive around to check them out. More competition often means better Australian prices. Remember, it is best to visit the facility and ask questions to assess the extent of responsibility of an Australian Shepherd breeder. But if they are willing to spend money on advertising, there is a good chance they are professional and reputable breeders. Still check their sites and call in to get prices so you can compare with your local breeders. Do quick searches on Google and Yelp to find them in your area. Applying an Australian Shepherd can range anywhere from \$50 to \$250 per adult, depending on the organization.
