This technique only works on antonym questions. So, this is a great technique for using gre because it only contains antonym questions. While almost every word is synonymous, remember that not all words have opposites, and eliminate them first. 4) Eliminate near synonym response options. Spot synonyms within answer options can be valuable because it allows you to narrow down your appropriate answer options. If the two answers have very similar meanings, the correct answer is very vague. Therefore, it is possible to eliminate these selections. The roots of many SAT/GRE words have similar meanings in foreign languages. For example, the Spanish word malo means bad. This is a common root for many negatively charged words: in addition to malignant malapropos malediction malevolent malicious malefaction, the Spanish word bueno means good. But be careful, this is also a common root for many positively charged words: benediction is useful philanthropic philanthropic benevolent. Sometimes questions will try to trick the tester by adding roots to the words that lie in their true meaning: bellicose restisome noisome credulous fulful adulterate craven sediation

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
