A Bluetooth headset uses short-range wireless technology to connect to your Android phone, so you can speak hands-free from up to 8 meters away. When you pair a Bluetooth headset with your Android phone for the first time, you need to configure it using the headset's PIN. This PIN is a number that helps your Android connect to the right device. If you're having trouble connecting your headset with your smartphone, you may be using the wrong PIN. Touch the Settings icon on the home screen of your Android phone. Tap Wireless & Networks. Touch the Bluetooth headset list in the device list. Enter the new PIN when prompted during the device setup process, and then press OK to pair the headset with your Android phone. They range from over-ear headphones to real wireless earbuds, so you have some variety to choose from. For the best of the bunch, you'd need to start with the Sennheiser HD 4.40 BT for its excellent sound quality, comfort and consistency. Source: Sennheiser Sennheiser does not often compete with aesthetics, but the company is very consistent in its audio capability. Even with a price range like this, the HD 4.40 BT are the best wireless headphones under 100 dollars and prove you get real bang for your buck. It may be a bit surprising considering they came out in 2017, but they're still available and sound just as good as today's headphones. Admittedly, the sound signature here is not on Sennheiser's regular audiophile level, which opts for a more crowd-pleasing sound stage that slightly boosts the bass. Nevertheless, it works really well for several genres and pushes a lively sound that never feels significantly unbalanced. You could listen to hip-hop or rock on them and probably draw the same conclusion. Call quality also keeps good, making them convenient to use when you need to talk. Unfortunately, as it's a pre-2018 model, they don't benefit from the support features in the company's Smart Control app. This means that you don't have the chance to optimize them with an equalizer. The older Sennheiser app, which is used for such purposes, is no longer available, so you can't make any adjustments. They also do not have active noise reduction (ANC). It is nice that they are comfortable to wear with decent cushioning, which is because the battery life is up to 25 hours per charge, give or take the volume you hear. Source: Anker With the Anker Soundcore Soundcore 20Q, you basically pay 1 dollar for every hour of battery life you get from these headphones per charge. You get up to 40 hours of playback while ANC is enabled, but this number goes up to a ridiculous 60 hours if you keep ANC off. For this kind of duration they must be comfortable to wear, and fortunately they are. The headband has a large extension, complemented by deep and wide ear cups to accommodate even the largest ears. This combination makes longer listening times much easier on the head and ears. Anker claims that the ANC excludes up to 90% of ambient noise, but there is a limitation. As with some of the company's other headphones, they perform better when they drown higher-frequency sounds while struggling with lower frequencies. Usually it is the opposite, especially with this price range, which makes it so unique. If you live with screaming children, you might appreciate the help. Due to its fit, passive noise isolation helps seal some of the low-end noise, but the ANC could have continued this better. It's hardly surprising that they sound bass-heavy. If you have hip-hop and EDM, you'll appreciate what Anker offers here. You get fairly balanced mids, and some warm highs, so it's not terribly lopsided. It is only obvious that the sound signature is there to partially compensate for the functioning of the ANC. The Anker Soundcore Liberty Air 2 is firmly represented in this category thanks to an impressively balanced sound signature. You will hear bass punch through with a slight boost to the heights and fairly consistent mids for exceptional performance. As is so often the case with earbuds like these, it is essential to get a good seal in your ears to get the most out of the sound. Your chances are good to find something that suits you from the small, middle and large eartips that come in the box. Although they are stable, they do not always feel comfortable with longer listening sessions. These earbuds work best in shorter bursts, although it is a subjective point. The drivers push the mid-range, but only make a marginal upgrade for the heights. Improved ANC performance is always nice, although admittedly it's not a dramatic shift. It does a slightly better job of blocking low-frequency noises. Nevertheless, getting ANC at all at this price is a bonus, so at least it is useful. They won't give them much in the way of passive noise insulation, so you can hear what's going on around you. Jabra hasn't made the Elite 45h so chic, but it's what's on the inside that counts. The sound quality is excellent, although Jabra's is safe by default with a balanced and neutral sound platform. You can optimize this more to your liking through Jabrasound+ app and its equalizer, which gives you existing presets or the ability to create your own. Unfortunately, phone call quality doesn't follow, and that could be because the two-microphone array needed a third to amplify your voice. It is one of the compromises to be in this price range. Battery life reaches crazy levels when you hear the standard volume throughout. It's the only way to reach 50 hours, but even if you increased it, you'd still be north of 30 hours without pressing an eye. In addition, Jabra has adopted USB-C for these headphones and removed itself from Micro-USB in its previous on-ear models. With a battery life of up to 20 hours, this is an important factor, although it would be nice if you didn't have to charge it via Micro-USB. That's enough to listen to music for days before you have to recharge it. The only downside is that they use Micro-USB to do it instead of the more efficient USB-C now common. At least you get some quick charging with two hours of playback when plugged in for five minutes. The good news is that they also sound good for all the time you listen to them. They have a balanced sound signature that sacrifices some of the heights to push more of the mids and lows. Not uncommon for headphones in this area, and the intention seems to appeal to a wider taste. ANC works well enough here, especially at low frequencies. The E9 are also comfortable to wear. Mixcder made them with larger ear cups that run a little deeper, so that most ears fit cuddly inside. The headband is made of beautiful leather and is reinforced with steel. They are a bit on the heavier side compared to others like them, but have a certain durability to them, too.
