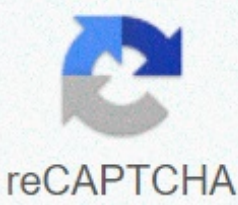




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Boerum hill school for international studies pta

A positive school climate promotes school safety, student self-esteem, emotional well-being, mental health and reducing incidents of substance abuse, student absences and suspensions. The New York State Department of Education (NYSED) continues to promote initiatives to promote student participation and, as a result, increase student performance, safety and well-being. Our social emotional learning material supports the priorities of the state's ESSA project and promotes a positive school climate. Grades 1-8: 16.6% High School: 49.4% × Boerum Hill School for International Studies has stable leadership, dual-language French teaching and challenging International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum. Students enjoy many arts offerings, excursions and a gastronomic program where they work in a professionally equipped kitchen and practice in restaurants and catering. The atmosphere throughout the school is relaxed and friendly. Our parents said they are impressed with how quickly their children learn French and from creative and collaborative class work. Principal Nicole Lanzillotto, who led Boerum Hill's middle grades before taking the helm in 2017, encourages children to have a say in their school. For example, a group of students successfully advocated allowing hats to be worn at school after studying the code of conduct, reading and discussing the book, For white folks teaching in the hood with staff and then writing a thoughtful report. Students are taught French every day. In addition, science is taught in both French and English. Students participate in an after-school French immersion program, where they develop their conversational fluency. The IB program offers rich classroom discussions, thoughtful research papers and imaginative lessons. For example, instead of English and social studies courses, students receive courses such as Individual and Societies, Language acquisition and Language and Literature. Courses in all grades emphasize skills such as communication, social and self-management, as well as research and analytical thinking. In a high school math class we observed, students were discussing the the use of charts and charts to explain the findings. Among their conclusions, visual representations go beyond language barriers. In a higher English class, students wrote blog posts on topics they were researching. I like this kind of writing because I can express myself, said one student writing about Eric Gardner, the Staten Island man who was killed in 2014 during an arrest by police for selling loose cigarettes. In the middle-aged program (grades 6-10) each year focuses on a topic that is reinforced in all subjects. For example, in 6th grade, students focus on identities and exploration, studying topics such as globalization, sustainability and relationships in all humanities courses. in mathematics of the 8th grade, a survey in functions is part of the grade-wide question of how an idea becomes a movement. Tenth grade is a year of reflection on how all subjects are connected, with studies on constitutional foundations, 3D math modeling and writing for different audiences. The IB diploma program is a challenging two years starting in 11th grade culminating in the completion of a year-long service project, a long research project and exam series. Since the curriculum was first implemented in high school and then expanded in high school, the 2019 graduation class (11th grade when we visited) will be the first group to be eligible for an IB diploma. Students receive practical training in the school's professionally equipped kitchen, as well as through internships shadowing chefs and catering events for the Department of Education and Brooklyn Borough Hall. Students enjoy day and overnight excursions, as well as a nice range of arts, selection classes and after-school activities, including sport. arts, chess, music, dance, theatre and technology. Collaborations with an impressive range of organizations, including the French Embassy, the 92nd Street Y Unterberg Poetry Center, the Brooklyn Historical Society and Urban Advantage, help expand learning opportunities beyond the classroom. The school is housed in a large building that is shared with Digital Arts and Film Technology High School and Success Academy Cobble Hill Charter School. Students can leave the building for lunch or enjoy the recess in the school's expansive courtyard with teen-sized climbing equipment, multiple fields and a basketball court. There is a busy college office led by a full-time college counselor. Juniors and seniors getting support from a guidance consultant dedicated to these grades. Most graduates go to CUNY and SUNY

schools and some attend private and out-of-state colleges. SPECIAL EDUCATION: There are ICT courses (Integrated collaborative teaching) in all grades plus SETS. INTRODUCTIONS: As part of a regional justice plan, all Middle Schools in District 15 use an open method with priority for 52 percent of places that go to students from low-income households (who qualify for the federal free and reduced-price lunch program), students in temporary housing, and English language students. The high school is open to students throughout the city with top priority to continue 8th grade and then throughout District 15. Admissions are based on a review of students' grades, exam scores and attendance history.
