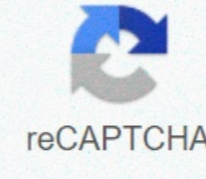

Duane Academy is an independent, independent day school located in Burlington, New Jersey, for pre-K-12 classes. Originally called St. Mary's Hall, founded in May 1837 by Episcopal Bishop George Washington Duane, it was initially called the Episcopal Girls Boarding School, the first in the United States to offer classical academic education. In 1955, membership of the diocese was interrupted. In 1966 a boys' school, known as Duane Academy, was built on campus. The schools were merged in 1974 as St. Mary's Hall Duane Academy. The name was later shortened to The Duane Academy. The school's current principal is George Sanderson. The school has been accredited by the Central States Association of Colleges and Schools commissioned on primary and secondary schools since 1989.[6] and is a member of the New Jersey Association of Independent Schools, the National Association of Independent Schools and the National Association of Episcopal Schools. [1] History was founded as St. Mary's Hall by the right-wing pastor George Washington Duane, the second episcopal bishop of New Jersey. Through the diocese, he bought a school for girls. St. Mary's opened on May 1, 1837, with 52 pupils. [7] It was founded to provide a classical education equal to that of boys, and girls and young women as university and postgraduate students were accepted. Young women were ready to work in teaching. It was the first girls' academic boarding school in the United States. In his early years, students mostly From the East Coast, but it was drawn from a vast area, ranging from New England to Virginia, to upstate New York, who traveled to school by boat and stagecoach. Bishop Duane raised capital for the new school by issuing shares, but the severe financial recession hit the United States as the school opened. St. Mary's Hall, funded mainly by the personal funds of Eliza Greene Perkins Duane, the bishop's wife, survived. She received an annual dowry of \$9,500 from the estate of her late first husband, which she donated to the school. [8] The success of St. Mary's Hall encouraged Bishop Duane to open a boys' school on a nearby site in 1846. However, the new Burlington College did not enjoy the success of the girls' school, which closed in 1877. [9] The girls' school continued to flourish, evolving throughout the late 19th century. [10] Teachers generally lived in nearby houses, especially along Wood Street. This prosperity continued in the first half of the twentieth century, when central heating was introduced, as were electric lighting and showers. A large house was purchased nearby, initially for use as a lower school and later as a large dwelling. [11] Many private schools were forced to close during the Depression, but St. Mary's Hall was able to increase the number of students today by creating additional bus routes on the newly completed Burlington Bristol Bridge to Pennsylvania on the other side of the Delaware River. [12] By the 1950s, boarding numbers were declining. In 1953, the trustees decided to give up boarding accommodation and convert to a day school. [13] Membership in the diocese ended in 1955. In 1966, the Trustees again opened a boys' school, Duane Academy, in collaboration with St. Mary's Hall. Although they are administered by the Board of Trustees itself, the two schools are separate institutions. Help the banners about St. Mary's Hall girls, do not mate with doane boys. [13] On February 27, 1974, the main building on the St. Mary's campus was destroyed by fire. There were plans in full swing to merge the two schools, and the damage caused by the fire encouraged the trustees to move forward with the plan. From September 1974, one school - St. Mary's Academy in Duane Hall in a mixed school - was opened under a new director, The Reverend William Schell. [13] In April 2008 the name was shortened to The Don Academy. [14] In January 2015, the school announced that Henry Rowan (1923-2015) and his wife Eleanor, long-time benefactors, had donated \$17 million to the Duane Academy Endowmentfund, with proceeds available to the school forever. The current endowment for the school is \$28-million. With Rowan's previous gifts and other donations, the school was able to establish and furnish Rowan Hall (2015). It connects Scarborough Hall (1912) and Odenheimer Hall (1868), and the unification of the campus. [15] Duane Academy is located on a 15.11-acre (6.11-hectare) campus at the western end of Burlington and located along the banks of the Delaware River in an area also known as the Green Bank. Among its buildings are three buildings listed in the National Register of Historic Places, including the Church of the Holy Innocents. This church was classified as the first Gothic Crusader church in the United States. The building was recorded in the Survey of Historic American Buildings (HABS), with calculated drawings held by the Library of Congress. Church houses are a good example of early, 2 guide, mechanical tube machine work. Originally built by Hall and LaPo in 1854 and rebuilt by George Jardine and his son in 1900, it was restored in 2012 by Patrick J. Murphy & Co. [16] In 2019, Duane Academy acquired the two properties associated with the former Elias Bodnot Elementary School, adjacent to the Duane Academy campus. This campus acquisition grows by about fifteen percent. [17] Student body receives enrolled students from 41 municipalities across the states of New Jersey and Pennsylvania. [18] As of the 2017-2018 school year, the school had 234 students and 38.0 teachers per class (fte), with a ratio of 5.9:1 students to teachers. The school's student body was 49.6% (112) white, 26.1% (59) black, 10.6% (24) Asian, 8.9% (20) two or more races, 4.0% (9) Hispanic and 0.9% (2) Native Hawaiians/Pacific Islands. [2] The academic curriculum offers a broad curriculum, with students in lower schools taking courses in mathematics, language arts, science and social studies. In addition, they study Spanish and music. [19] Students from grades 6 to 12 are required to study the basic curriculum for English, mathematics and science, along with studies on subjects including history, fine arts, and performing arts. [20] Graduation requirements minimum graduation requirements for grades 9 -12 are: 4 English grades 3 Maths 3 Science3 Science 3 Science History 3 World Language Grades 1 Fine or Performing Arts Students Must Also Complete A Degree at the Level of Trade and Leadership Course each year. These courses include courses such as media, digital programming, world religions, training and leadership. In grades 11 and 12, courses include courses in college and professional preparatory. [20] The participation of athletics in athletics is a key element in education at the Duane Academy. As a result, each student in grades 9-12 is required to play in a team for at least one season a year. Students in grades 6 to 8 compete with other middle school teams in football, boys' basketball, baseball and softball. Students in grades 9-12 compete at the varsity level at Burlington Scholastic University[21] in tennis, across the country running, Girls' football, boys' basketball, baseball, softball and bowling. The team competes in regional boat races in both autumn and spring. The Doane Spartans Academy[4] competes in inter-population sports under the auspices of the New Jersey Zoos Association (NJSIAA), for all sports except the crew, and competes independently of any sports conference. [22] At non-general levels of Group B and Prep B, school teams compete in state championships held at the end of each season. The school's sports facilities include 2 football fields, a linball, a Winzinger baseball field, a full-size gym and two fitness centres. The Delaware River is used for crew practices.
