Roulette works pretty well by comparing you to random people. Unlike Chat Alternative, you can't only use text messages. It also does not provide discussion groups that you can join, as in the SayHi app. All your information is anonymous to ensure your privacy if you do not decide to inform another person. However, in its attempt to keep the channels clean from unwanted items, the app has a strict prohibition policy that often kicks out people who do nothing wrong. Unfortunately, you can't get your account unlocked if you pay the company. However, they provide moderators for conversations only in case you have any problems and want to report some indiscretions. Where can you run this program? You can use it on Android 4.1 and beyond. Is there a better alternative? The alternative is generally better, with its wider selection of options. Moderation is better in CA and SayHi. In addition, the latest app offers more features than others, such as sending voice messages. Unfortunately, frequent bans and login information keep it back. Should you download it? No. For the roulette service, it does not stand out as an excellent program. Cross-platform Compatibility Skype and generally smooth videos are key elements that keep users returning to Skype for their video chat needs. iChat (Mac OS X)iChat is the default instant messaging app complete with Mac OS X. iChat boasts multiplayer video chat (up to 4 people at a time), iChat Theater for sharing and viewing files during video chat, and Backdrops, which allows users to customize what's behind them (for example, you're in Paris). Downer: iChat is only available on OS X. VSee (Windows only) Vsee is a free Windows video conferencing app. In addition to VSee video chat options, it is also designed as a collaboration tool. So, as explained by their demo video, you can collaborate with a colleague on the Photoshop document (even if that person doesn't have Photoshop installed) through screen sharing, and you can share that file (or any document, for that matter) by dragging the file to the video chat. VSee Free supports video chats with four people at the same time, while the paid version supports up to eight at a time. Of course, both people should use Discord in order to work, but otherwise everything went well in our testing. Google DuoPrice: FreeGoogle Duo is essentially Google's answer to FaceTime. It's also one of the easiest video chat apps available. You just log in, check your number and you're good to go. You can call other Google Duo users as you make a regular phone call. It also includes a feature called Knock Knock, which lets you see what someone is up to before answering a video call. The app is cross-platform. This means that it works between iOS and Android. Rumor has it that the web version goes for computer support after all. It's about as simple as it gets for a video call application. It's really very good. In-app shopping is for things like emoticons and stickers. JusTalkPrice: Free with the in-app purchasesJusTalk is another of the lesser known video chat apps. However, it's actually pretty decent. You'll be able to theme your app as you please. Also, you can do things like doodle while in a video call to add a little fun to the proceedings. It also has group chats, encryption and cross-platform support. It's a decent alternative to something like Google Duo, where video calls are the main feature. However, we don't see it competing too favorably with the chat app, which also has video chat features. The app is free to download and use. In-app purchases are for things like themes and personalization benefits. They don't affect functionality, really. KikPrice: FreeKik is a popular video chat app. It's actually a text chat app with video chat features. The app has single or group chats, support for most types of media sharing (GIF, video, images, etc.), and some additional things such as stickers. Kik is a popular chat service for mobile gamers. Gamers, for example, I've used it for Clash of Clans in the past. It also does not rely on your phone number. You just need a standard username to use just like Skype and unlike WhatsApp or Google Duo. It's colorful, so those who want something a little more serious may have to keep looking. Otherwise, Kik is a perfectly acceptable app for video and text chats. Signal Private MessengerPrice: FreeSignal Private Messenger is one of the most popular privacy chat apps. There are group chat features, but it's mostly for personal use. This is one of the biggest differences between it and the competing privacy chat app Telegram. Video calls worked well in our testing, so we have no problem recommending them. It's a neat way to get some encrypted chats as well. The app is also completely free and open source. You can't go wrong with it, but there are better video chat apps if you need group video chats. SkypePrice: Free with the in-app purchasesSkype is one of the most popular video chat apps for any platform. It has native apps on most platforms, including PCs, making it one of the best cross-platform options out there. Android app, of course, is not perfect, but it can usually get the job done. You can make group video calls with up to 25 people. The app also has a free text chat, Microsoft and Facebook account integration, and you can even call regular cell phones for a nominal fee. The app still needs work, but it's definitely better than it was a year or two ago. Cross-platform support is top notch as well. Viber MessengerPrice: Free with shopping in the Viber app started life as a voice call app. Previously, you could call people on the service along with regular phone calls. It has since become a full-fledged messaging service. You can still make phone calls as you could before (for a fee). You can also text chat, video calling and more. It also has the encryption of voice, text and video calls between Viber users. There are a few extra fun features like hidden chat rooms as well. It's a little heavier, similar to Facebook Messenger.
