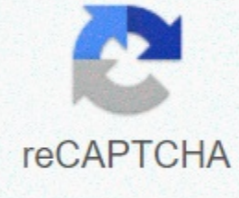




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Root tool apk for android 5.1

KingoRoot is one of the most used one-click rooting apps for Android devices. KingoRoot won't work on every Android smartphone and tablet out there that exists, but no one one-click rooting tool ever does. In addition, they mention a list of compatible devices, mostly from their website. Compatible manufacturers include Samsung, Google, Lenovo, Motorola, Huawei, Sony, Micromax, Alcatel, ZTE and devices from 85 other mobile manufacturers from around the world.
