I said, 'I will pray to all saints because I want my children to attend Danbury Public Schools which have small classrooms,' she said. His prayers were answered. His two older daughters attended elementary and middle schools in the district, where Ramon said they can benefit from a smaller enrollment, compared to other middle schools and many of the elementary schools. They appreciate it, said Ramon, who also has a 3-year-old daughter. They really like it. Entering magnet schools requires luck or divine intervention. Acceptance at the two magnet schools (Westside Middle School Academy and Western CT for International Studies (AIS) si basa basa a lottery. Often, many students are left on the waiting list. Parents trying to get their children into magnet middle school learned Friday whether they have earned a place or will be put on the waiting list. Primary school families are heard at the end of January. Magnet schools are popular because they offer innovative programs and greater ethnic and racial diversity than some of the other schools, said Kevin Walston, assistant superintendent. In many ways, magnet schools promote academic success, he said. They lead with the theme of the curriculum that the whole school gathers around. Latin outreach Some parents in the Latin community say the district might better spread the word about the lottery process, however. I had to go dig, ask for information, ask about how the lottery goes, said Ramon, who immigrated about 22 years ago to Danbury from Ecuador when he was 13. She said she was headed to the website where she could apply. Ramon applied for magnet schools a few years ago. She successfully applied for her now seventh grader to attend AIS Elementary School, which allowed her now 10th-grader to enter the school through lottery brother preference. She successfully asked again for her second daughter to go to Westside. The district has stepped up its efforts this year to publicize the lottery process and has seen an increase in the number of applicants, especially from the Latino community, Walston said. We had more targeted publications and more targeted signs in the city center, trying to encourage participation in the lottery process, he said. The immediate investment has produced some dividends for us. Social media and the district's website are other methods, Walston said. Emails are often not so effective because many applicants are new families trying to get their students to kindergarten at magnet school, he said. Many of them, we still don't have the information on why they came into the community, he said. Walston said the district wants to further improve its awareness. Communication is something we always try to improve on, he said. This year is no different. Ramon invited parents from the Latin community to his home to help them apply. They didn't know how the trial went and how to get in, he said. Most of them only know that there is Rogers Park and Broadview (middle schools) that they need to consider. He said that the application itself is simple and is available in Spanish and Portuguese. That doesn't make sense when you don't know there's a lottery going on. Ramon said. The word has to be out there in the community. The intake of teachers and staff of Latin origin would help families feel more connected, he said. Elmer Palma, Palma who sends one of his three children to Westside, said he felt similar concerns from Latin parents. He said the language barrier sometimes makes it difficult for parents to get information. I would like to see more of the Latin community trying to learn the language, said Palma, who is on the City Council. In this way, we communicate everything that is beneficial to our families. Why popularity? Palma said he likes the curriculum and opportunities for the individualized attention that magnet schools provide. In magnet schools, it seems that I challenge students more, he said. Specialized programs are a big draw for families, Walston said. It excites parents and students, he said. AIS has a theme of international studies, while Westside has two tracks: global studies and STEM, or science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Westside has separate lotteries for themes, with families able to apply to both, Walston said. Palma said he appreciates that magnet schools provide parents with another option. Danbury schools are very good, there's no doubt about it, he said. They do very well, but it's a good opportunity to give choice. He said he hopes the proposed charter school can become another option. The State Board of Education approved a charter school for the city, but the state did not grant funding for the opening. Families are also attracted to the diversity of schools, Walston said. Students come from different neighborhoods and sometimes different cities, so there's a higher probability that children also have different racial or ethnic evidence, he said. AIS and Westside offer this diversity, while in many cases we may not get it until the kids get to high school, Walston said. It is in particular a draw for families from nearby towns, he said. While Westside is only open to Danbury students, AIS Primary School is also open to students from surrounding towns. AIS must have about 70 percent Danbury students and 30 percent students out of the district, with 243 Danbury students and 130 other students enrolled in 2018-19, Walston said. Additional state funds go to the AIS because it is open to multiple districts. Individual districts also provide funding based on the number of students they send, Walston said. The perception in the community is that magnet schools have more resources than our regular schools, he said. I often think it's perception. It may not necessarily be reality. Funding is no higher on Westside than in broadview or Rogers Park middle schools, although the Westside building has been upgraded more recently, Walston said. .
