Teachers from auburn University's College of Veterinary Medicine published a third guide to anatomy in a series of four books detailing equestrian anatomy. The book is Called Horse Anatomy Guide: Head and Neck, Illustrated Guide. The author of the book is Dr. Mahmoud Mansour, Professor of the Department of Anatomy, Physiology and Pharmacology, who is also the coordinator of a large section of gross animal anatomy. Dr. Janet Stais, Professor Emerita, edited the book online for a private publication. Dr. Paul Rumf, Professor Emeritus, is the author of a chapter covering teeth, blood vessels and nerves. Dr. Dewey Ray Wilhite, coordinator of the Gross Anatomy Laboratory, contributed to the autopsy and imaging throughout the book. Past manuals on the anatomy of horses contained only black and white images, and Dr. Mansour developed the style of his guides to include colorful, detailed illustrations to help students understand the anatomy of horses more effectively. This is the third book in a series of books on equestrian anatomy. The first two books covered the forelimb and the hind limb, respectively. This book on the head and neck contains 142 illustrations on 90 pages. This book is a guide to autopsy for veterinary students, but will also be useful for practicing veterinarians in mixed and large animal practice and clients for visualization. The fourth and final book on horse body cavity will be published at the end of next year. When finished, four books will cover the anatomy of the entire horse.
