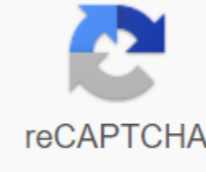




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Mla sample paper with annotated bibliography

An annotated bibliography is a list of quotes for various books, articles and other sources on a subject. Annotated bibliography looks like a page cited by the works, but includes an annotation after each cited source. An annotation is a short summary and/or a critical assessment of a source. Annotated bibliographies may be part of a larger research project or may be an independent report in itself. Types of annotations A summary annotation describes the source by answering the following questions: who wrote the document, what the document discusses, when and where the document was produced and was provided to the public. The emphasis is on the description. An evaluative annotation includes a summary so it is listed above, but also critically evaluates the activity for accuracy, relevance and quality. Evaluative annotations can help you learn about your subject, develop a thesis statement, decide whether a particular source will be useful for your assignment, and determine whether there is enough valid information available to complete the project. The focus is on description and evaluation. The manual of the MLA, the eighth edition does not include instructions for formatting an annotated bibliography. However, the teacher can assign an annotated bibliography in the style of the MLA. Annotated bibliography contains descriptive or evaluative comments about your sources. Each citation should comply with the MLA guidelines. Start comments immediately after quoting. The title can be Annotated Bibliography or Annotated List of Cited Works. The instructor may request an annotated bibliography to evaluate the types of sources you select for your research. Annotations should show that you have carefully conducted research and critically analyzed the information you will use to write your paper. Ken Battle relies on a careful study of government documents, as well as his own research as a widely published political analyst, to explain Canadian child benefit programs. It presents some fundamental assumptions that all members of society should contribute to raising children. Comparing child poverty rates in a number of countries is a useful help to anyone assuming that Canadian society is doing a good job of protecting children. Battle pays particular attention to the National Children's Allowance (NCBs), arguing that it did not deserve to be criticised by politicians and journalists. He stresses the development of the NCBs, costs and benefits and complains that the Conservative government has reduced it in favour of the Lower Universal Child Care Allowance (UCWB). However, he relies too much on his own work; he is the sole or main author of almost half of the sources in his bibliography. He could make this work stronger by drawing lots from the perspectives and analyses of others. However, Battle provides a valuable source for this essay, as the chapter provides a concise overview of the government-funded assistance currently available to parents. This provides context for analysing the scope and financial reality of child poverty in Canada. Kerr, Don and Roderic Beaujot. Child poverty and family structure in Canada, 1981-1997. Journal of Comparative Family Studies 34.3 (2003): 321-335. Sociology professors Kerr and Beaujot examine the demographics of poor families. Based on data from Canada's annual Consumer Finance Survey, the authors consider whether each family had one or two parents, the age of single parents, and the number of children in each household. Note that all text, including writing below the reference, must be indented so that the author's last name is the only text left. Sample MPA Annotation Lamott, Anne. Bird bird: some instructions on writing and life. Anchor Books, 1995. Lamott's book offers heartfelt advice on the nature of a written life, complete with its insecurities and failures. Taking a humorous approach to the realities of being a writer, the chapters in Lamott's book are toilet and anecdotal and offer advice on everything from plot development to jealousy, from perfectionism to fighting with his own internal critic. In the process, Lamott includes writing exercises designed to be both productive and fun. Lamott offers sound advice to those struggling with writing anxieties, but her main project seems to be giving the reader a reality check in terms of writing, publishing, and struggling with someone's imperfect humanity in the process. Rather than a practical manual to produce and/or publish, this text is indispensable because of its honest perspective, its down-to-earth humor, and its encouraging approach. Chapters in this text could easily be included in the curriculum for a writing class. Several of the chapters in Part 1, address the writing process and would serve to generate discussions on students' own drafting and review processes. Some of the writing exercises would also be suitable for generating writing exercises in the classroom. Students should find Lamott's style both engaging and enjoyable. In this nonfiction book based on the journalist's experiential research, Ehrenreich tries to determine whether it is currently possible for a person to live on a minimum wage in America. Taking seats as a waitress, a maid in a cleaning service, and a Walmart sales employee, the author summarizes and reflects on her work, her relationships with her coworkers, and her financial in each situation. An experienced journalist, Ehrenreich is aware of the limitations of her experiment and the ethical implications of her experiential research tactics and reflects on these aspects in the text. The author is upcoming about her methods and complements her experiences with academic research on her jobs, the economy, and the rising cost of living in America. Ehrenreich's project is timely, descriptive and well-documented. The annotation above summarizes and evaluates the book in citation. The first paragraph provides a brief summary of the author's project in the book, covering the main points of the work. The second paragraph underlines the strengths of the project and assesses the methods and presentation thereof. This particular annotation does not reflect on the potential source importance or usefulness for this own research person. London: Routledge, 1998. Davidson's book provides an in-depth examination of the major roles occupied by the numerous pagan goddesses of Northern Europe in everyday life, including their roles in hunting, agriculture, internal arts would be weaving, household, and death. The author discusses relevant archaeological evidence, symbol and ritual patterns, as well as previous research. The book includes a series of black and white photographs of the relevant artifacts. This annotation includes a single paragraph, a summary of the book. It provides a concise description of the project and the project of the book and its major features.
