Only adults at least 21 years old can use cannabis. The state commission created to oversee the state's medical cannabis program will also oversee the new and sixth cannabis market. Cannabis products will be subject to the country's sales tax. If approved by the legislature, a municipality may pass a local ordinance to collect local tax on cannabis products. A statement translated this amendment into the legalization of a controlled form of marijuana called cannabis. Only people at least 21 years old can legally use cannabis products. The Cannabis Regulatory Commission will oversee the new adult cannabis market. This committee was created in 2019 to oversee the state's medical cannabis program. The scope of the commission's new authority will be detailed in laws enacted by the Legislature. All retail sales of cannabis products in the new adult cannabis market will be subject to the country's sales tax. If approved by the legislature, a municipality may pass a local ordinance to collect local tax on cannabis products. Constitutional amendment to property tax deduction and exemption for veterans of peace (state question #2)(Spanish version) Do you approve amending the Constitution to give a \$250 property tax deduction to veterans who have not served in wartime? Do you also approve amending the Constitution to give 100 percent property tax exemptions to certain completely disabled veterans who have not served in wartime? The widow or widower of these veterans will also receive a \$250 deduction or a 100% exemption after the veteran's death. A translated statement this amendment would give a \$250 property tax deduction to veterans who did not serve in wartime. The widow or widower of a veteran who did not serve in wartime will receive this deduction after the veteran's death. The amendment also extends the 100% property tax exemption to disabled veterans Who became disabled during peacetime military service. People who become disabled during peacetime military service and are fulfilled in an ongoing retirement community will not receive a 100% exemption for disabled veterans. Currently, these deductions and property tax exemptions are only given to veterans who have served during wartime. The amendment would give the deductions and exemptions to veterans who did not serve in wartime. A constitutional amendment to change the legislature's re-certificate schedule if census data is delayed (state question no. 3) (Spanish version) Do you approve the Constitutional Amendment to change when new legislative districts are created if federal census data is delayed? The current COVID-19 epidemic has delayed the collection of census data. If New Jersey doesn't get the census data on time, new legislative districts may not be ready in time for state parliamentary elections in the year ending one. This change in the re-lying schedule will allow lawmakers to be elected that year from their existing districts to their two-year term. The new districts will be used starting with the next scheduled general election for the state legislature. A statement translated into this constitutional amendment changes when new legislative districts are created if federal census data is delayed. The state constitution requires that a census be held every ten years to count the people living in the country. Census data is then used to create new legislative districts to ensure residents have equal representation from elected officials. However, the current COVID-19 epidemic has delayed the collection of census data. This could delay census data for states and affect the establishment of new legislative districts. The state constitution requires Commissionportionment to create new legislative districts every ten years after the completion of the federal census. If census data is delayed, the new legislative districts may not be stabilized in time to hold elections. This constitutional amendment requires the commission to delay the creation of new districts if the governor receives federal census data after February 15 of this year ending one. The commission will adopt the new districts after the November general election, but no later than March 1 of this year that will end in two. The new districts will be used from

legislative elections in a year that will end in three. They will continue to be used until new districts are re-established by the Commission Committee after the next federal census. In the June and November primaries in the year ending one, senators and assembly members will use their existing districts to run for a two-year period. The old districts will also be in effect in the year that will end in two years if legislative elections are held that year. This amendment requires the committee to begin conducting its business when the governor receives the census data. It also requires the 11th member of the committee to be appointed by the Chief Justice of the New Jersey Supreme Court within a month after the governor receives the census data. Nothing in this amendment will change the appointment of committee members of the chair of the state political party in accordance with Section 4, Article 3, Section 1 of the State Constitution on or before November 15, and was approved by the Secretary of State on or before December 1, the year the census was taken. Mikko Locid, our Revolutionary Shooter in Atlantic County, announced his campaign for Atlantic County clerk. His platform focuses on improving electoral integrity and voter turnout through voter education and redesigning the provincial vote than he calls an incomplete spreadsheet for a more traditional voting-style design of the office bloc. Democracy is about being part of the conversation, Locid said. For too long, the conversation has been led by people with ties to power, money, and special interests. Locid is a resident of Miyas Landing and an IT professional with a bachelor's degree in political science, pre-law from Stockton University. He is active in local politics and has worked on various progressive campaigns as a member of the Democratic Party. At the launch of his campaign for county clerk, Lawside also announced that he was stepping down as our revolutionary sink in Atlantic County, a position he has held since its in founding. County officials have statutory authority over ballot design, and the design used in most New Jersey counties unfairly favors candidates based on their voting position. A study by Julia Sass Rubin from a New Jersey policy perspective found that a favorable voting position on the county line could offer up to 50% momentum in the vote share. This gives the local party chairman significant power to influence the outcome of the election. In some extreme cases, such as voting in Mercer County, the placement of candidates doubled with two U.S. House candidates in one column, resulting in more votes, which denied them the right to vote. Outside of a significant vote in 2020 as a result of a statewide postal vote, The province has struggled to surpass the 50% rate, with some in recent years dipping as low as 34%. Locid believes this can be improved by renewing confidence in the electoral system and increasing voter understanding of the electoral process. This includes leading a concerted effort among election officials to reach new voters and communities with low voter turnout, and increase accessibility by utilizing modern resources to localize information. Locid will run in the Democratic primaries. Current President Ed McGeegan has not yet officially announced his intention to run for reelection. The 2021 primary will be held on June 8, 2021. (Visited 178 times, 28 visits today) A former senior Green Party official will seek the Democratic nomination for county clerk on a platform of ballot redesign to limit the advantage of organization lines. Mikko Locid, the Atlantic County Revolution shooter, could challenge incumbent Ed McGettigan in the 2021 primary. McGuigan, who is under fire for meddling in the last general election - he did not send 554 voters in Hamilton Township the right vote in a provincial presidential race where the gap is just 286 votes - has not yet announced whether he will seek reelection. In 2017, Locid was the Green Party's candidate for state council in the second legislative district. He won 718 votes, less than three-quarters of 1 percent, in his bid to unseat Democrats Vince Mazo (D-Northfield) and John Armato (D-Buena). Green Party candidate for The Atlantic County Free-Holder in 2017, Melissa Tomlinson, served as a spoiler. Tomlinson received 1,452 votes across the district in a race in which Republican John Risley defeated Democrat Thelma Witherspoon by 892 votes. Witherspoon won this year's County 3 Free Holder race in which McGettigan messed up at the polls. However, Locid was active in Democratic politics before 2017 and following his only bid for public office. Locid said he would emphasize the integrity of the election and increase turnout as a county clerk. Democracy is about being part of the conversation, Locid said. For too long, the conversation has been led by people with ties to power, money, and special interests. Ordinary people should be able to lead the conversation in our district. Mentone Councilman Joe Girallo announced he would seek the Republican nomination for county clerk. Locid, a professional IT company, is the founding shooter of Our Revolution in Atlantic County, a group formed after the end of Bernie Sanders' 2016 presidential campaign. He said he'd step down from that position to run for county clerk. He lived in the town of Egg Harbor and served on the board of the Atlantic County Green Party. As county clerk, Locid says he'll kill ballots that look at incomplete spreadsheets and replace them with better voting. It gives all candidates better visibility. As a county clerk, I will replace the current voting design with the more standard 'Office Bloc' voting design, which lines up candidates running for the same position in vertical columns, separated from other positions, Lucide said. It's only when our constituents have confidence in our choices that their voices can truly be heard. I don't put the blame anywhere, but we can do better. Voters deserve it. Atlantic County Republican Party shooter Keith Davis called on McGettigan to resign because of the voting mess, and Republicans filed a lawsuit to force another election in the race for holders of District 3.
