
American tourister bag lock instructions



Faulty locks (click here) It is very rare that a TSA lock becomes faulty when used normally. If you are experiencing problems with the TSA lockdown, it will usually be due to some form of impact damage (possibly caused by mishandling of airline employees, see details of transit damage on our warranty page), or due to the installation of the lock incorrectly. If you forget the combination code, or it was installed incorrectly, unfortunately for security reasons, there is no easy way to reset it. You will either visit the repair center and they will replace the lock at your expense, or you can cycle through, and check, all combinations (from 0-0-0 to 9-9-9), which takes about 1 hour. Imagine the scene you have just arrived at a hotel in an unfamiliar city after a long flight. You put your suitcase on the bed and slowly turn the numbered wheels of the three-digit combined lock. You press the button to access your case, but nothing happens. Metal lightning tags remain firmly trapped in the lock clasp... A locked suitcase with a TSA-approved lockgetting combination locked out of your luggage is something that happens even to the most experienced travelers at one time or then. Fortunately, the ubiquitous, TSA-approved, 3-digit combination of locks used by brands such as Samsonite, Eastpack, Antler and American Tourister is easy to open without damaging either the lock or the case and without any special tools. By following the steps below, you can quickly open the lock and reprogram the code to a new 3digit combination that is easier to remember. To do this, you must first set the lock of the current combination. Then press a small button (usually using a ballpoint pen) that frees the moderate large wheels from the locking mechanism (currently in an open position). You can then turn 3 measureded thumb wheels yourself into a new combination before you press a large button (the one used to open the lock). This reconnects the moderate flash wheels to the lock mechanism, activating the new code. The method described above is based on the fact that part of the locking mechanism itself (jagged discs next to the big wheels) is visible. This makes the number shown on the knurled thumb wheel pretty much irrelevant. After aligning the discs you just need to turn them around until the lock opens. The TSA (Transportation) is a U.S. federal government agency responsible for the safety of travelers, which was created in response to the 9/11 attacks. Fortunately, Master Lock has created TSA-approved luggage locks that prevent strangers from getting out of your bags, allowing security to open them for inspection with special tools. Earlier, the Transportation Security Administration simply cut off the locks. These three-digit combos should be personalized, so you choose a combo. But don't worry. There is a way to open the lock even if you forget the combos. The easiest way to unlock a three-digit lock is to use the combination and follow Master Lock instructions. To do this, turn the lock until the numbers are read from the right side up. Roll the left of the dial until the first number of your combination lines up with the number to the left of the dial. Roll the middle dial to the corresponding line number with the number to the left of it. Do the same for the right number. Your three-digit combination should now show, from left to right, lined up with scoring hash marks. Pull the lock case away from the U-shaped metal ring without turning any of the dials. The lock will press open to expose the hook. The hook rotates 360 degrees so that it can be placed on, and taken off, luggage. If you forget the lock combination, try this alternative method to unlock it: pull the lock's body and U-shaped ring apart to put pressure on the mechanism inside the lock. Pull the body of the lock from its attachment, or, if the lock is not attached, apply pressure on the U-shaped ring slowly, while maintaining constant pressure on the mechanism. The dial will be difficult to flip three consecutive numbers, and one of these numbers will click. You have to feel and hear this little click and this is the first number of your combination. Repeat the previous step with the middle dial and then the body of the lock. Reset Master Lock, install your own combination, and you can use it properly in the future according to the original instructions. Here's how: Hold the body of the lock so that the numbers face off you. Set the combination and release the U-shaped ring. Turn the U-shaped ring hook 90 degrees counterclockwise before noting on the stem of the hook and a hole on the lock body line. Push the stem of the hook down into the body of the lock as far as it will go. Turn the hook another 90 degrees and lift the stalk out of the castle's body. Page 4 Travelers flying to the United States have only a few options when placing the lock on their bags: they must choose TSA-approved luggage locks or risk that their locks will be destroyed. Transportation Security Administration (TSA) agents have a universal master key for opening agency-approved locks, so they can open and inspect a passenger's luggage without causing any damage. If a passenger decides to travel with a different type of lock, however, the TSA may have to destroy the lock to check the luggage. Tumi luggage comes with TSA-approved locking systems, either with a lock built in the case or attached to the outside. If you're using Tumi luggage, but you don't want anyone else to get there. Suitcases from Tumi's Vapor and Tegra lines have an internal lock system built into the hard shell case. To install these locks, follow these instructions: Set the lock dial on the current code. If it is a new luggage space, a pre-set code is usually 000. Safe lightning pulls into its place on the lock mechanism. Look for a small circular divot in the lower left corner of the castle. Use the ballpoint pen to put pressure on the divot, and keep it as you adjust each number on the dial to create a new three-digit code. Once you've created a new three-digit code, let the pressure on the divot go. Find the large release button to the right of your luggage's Tumi logo. Click on it, and if the zippers pop out of their zipper to pull the place, your lock has been set correctly.
