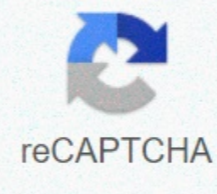

According to the 2010 U.S. Census, the population was 45,058. Its county seat is Grand Rapids. The county is named after Lake Itasca, which in turn is a shortened version of the Latin words veritas caput, which means truth and head, a reference to the source of the Mississippi River. Parts of the Forte And Leech Lake Indian Reserves are located in the county. History Itasca County was first formed in 1849, when the Minnesota Territory was created. It was originally a much larger county, which covered many counties in northeastern Minnesota today. The original county of Itasca extended over Cook, Lake, St. Louis, Koochiching, Eastern Lake of the Woods, Eastern Beltrami, Itasca, North Aitkin and North Carlton Counties, now in Minnesota. Itasca County was originally named for Lake Itasca (which is no longer within the county's current boundaries), which was determined to be the true source of the Mississippi River. After many disputes over the search for the source of the Mississippi River, Henry Schoolcraft began to find its true source in 1832. Once he came to his true source, he decided to name this Lake Itasca. The Mississippi River flows from its early days to Lake Itasca, where it can be crossed on foot. [4] It flows beyond Bemidji, through Itasca County, and continues towards the Gulf of Mexico. Geography The land of Itasca County is hilly, heavily wooded and dotted with lakes and ponds. [5] It generally descends to the east, with its highest areas on its upper western border, at 1,437' (438m) ASL. [6] The county has a total area of 2,928 square miles (7,580 km2), of which 2,668 square miles (6,910 km2) is land and 260 square miles (670 km2) (8.9%) it's water. [7] It is the third largest county in Minnesota by land zone. The landscape of Itasca County varies considerably. Low plains, hills and wetlands are located where there was glacial activity in the past. This is well known for being wooded, and has been for centuries. The different forests are made up of trees such as pines, spruce, deciduous, cedar and tamarack. The many large forests of forestry and forestry are important sectors of the economy. In Itasca County, there are many different bodies of water, from large lakes to small streams, in addition to large rivers. More than 1,400 lakes are located in the county. These bodies of water help support many different wildlife species such as different birds and small mammals. The county's main water bodies include Winnibigoshish Lake, Pokegama Lake, Deer Lake, mississippi River, Bowstring Lake and Blandin Stationery Reservoir. The population density was 16.5/m2 (6.37/km2). There were 24,528 dwellings with an average density of 9.19/m2 (3.55/km2). The racial composition of the county was 94.64% white, 0.16% black or African American, 3.40% Native American, 0.27% Asian, 0.02% Pacific Islander, 0.16% of other races, and 1.34% of two or more races. 0.60% of the population was Hispanic or Latino of any race. 25.6% were German, 13.8% Norwegian, 7.7% Finnish, 7.2% Swedish, 6.2% Irish, 5.0% American or American and 5.0% english descent. There were 17,789 households, of which 29.20% had children under the age of 18, 58.30% were married couples, 7.60% had a housewife without a husband and 30.40% were non-families. 26.00% of all households were individuals and 12.20% had a single person aged 65 or over. The average household size was 2.43 and the average family size was 2.91. The county's population was 24.40 per cent under the age of 18, 7.60 per cent aged 18 to 24, 24.40 per cent aged 25 to 44, 26.70 per cent aged 45 to 64 and 16.80 per cent aged 65 and over. Median age 41-year-olds. For every 100 females there were 99.70 males. For 100 18-year-old women plus, there were 98.20 men. The median income for a household in the county was \$36,234, and the median income for a family was \$44,025. Men had a median income of \$37,066 versus \$22,327 for females. The county's per capita income was \$17,717. Approximately 7.70 per cent of families and 10.60 per cent of the population were below the poverty line, including 13.60 per cent of those under the age of 18 and 8.80 per cent of those aged 65 and over. The county chose the Democratic Party's nominee in each presidential election between 1932 and 2012, as in neighboring St. Louis County, Carlton County and Lake County. However, in 2016, the county, like much of northern Minnesota, swung hard for Donald Trump, who became the first Republican presidential candidate to win the county since Herbert Hoover.
