Where I came from, you had to have thick skin. It didn't matter who you were. You were going to meet someone mean. You should have taken it. I just shrugged it off. It's nothing but words. But when you went through and saw things, real experience, words can do nothing for you, Jaylen Fisher told Star-Telegram, an interview where he opened up about what he wanted to live with albinism. The talented sophomore from Tennessee wasn't open to the media the first year, but in his second year, he's fair game. He's a rising star in a team that has been leading in assists and averaging 11 points per game, but would rather talk about what makes him different and embraces him. Fisher didn't realize he wasn't like anyone else until he started hanging out with other kids. After people repeatedly asked him about his skin, he decided to ask his mother. This is exactly how God made you, was her answer. And with that, Fisher found strength in his uniqueness. In addition to limiting the amount of melanin in a person's skin, albinism can also make your skin more sensitive to sun exposure and cause possible vision problems. But the 6'2 guard says that the only symptoms he has are his pale skin and white hair, so despite being black, some people assume he is white. He remembers during the AAU game when a player on the opposing team made a comment about him being an albino and it just made him want to go even harder once the ball was tipped out. The Tennessee native knows that with his talents come a great platform to draw attention to his condition, and he knows how hard it will be to just play the ball, but he gets it. How can you miss a black guy who is blonde? For those who have ever hated that they are not like everyone else, listen to Jaylen Fisher. Fisher is a sophomore point guard at TCU that was raised in Bolton, Tennessee, about 30 miles from Memphis. He is an albino, a condition that affects one in 20,000 people. I first found out about it when I was with other kids. Fisher said. The question doesn't stand out until the quest of pigment produced in the skin, hair and/or eyes, according to the National Organization for Albinism and Hypopigmentation. People with albinism are expected to have a normal life. Vision problems are usually associated with albinism, and people with the condition are more sensitive to sun exposure. Fisher was protected for his first year on campus as TCU made it clear that the issue was closed to the media. And it makes sense - as a true freshman, inserted into the starting lineup almost from the moment he stepped foot on campus - Fish had a lot on his plate. But as his profile grew, so did his exposure, and with it the negativity and cruelty on social media. Eventually, the young man realized that he could use his voice to make a difference. Hug, he said. Everyone's different. There are worse things, he said. I am very blessed to even talk about it. While albinism is rare - only 1 in 20,000 people suffer - the willingness of fish to accept its differences is a message that everyone can appreciate. Almost all of us have experienced the sight at one time or another, either by ourselves or with someone we love. There's nothing worse than being on the other side of that look, wondering if you or your loved one is being judged, bullied, or targeted, and feeling helpless to anything about it. But imagine that feeling nationally, and having to deal with the cruel words of strangers on social media every time you log in. This is the position this young man has been in for years. Hopefully, Talking Up Fish can make the best kind of waves, and make a difference for kids struggling to accept their own differences, whatever they can be. Fisher seems ready to take on the fight, and become an inspiration to thousands. He will absolutely have the support of his frog fam every step of the way. Fisher begins to recognize that, as an athlete, he has a great platform to tell his story, a story that can be inspiring to others. He's ready for everyone to hear it now.
