The Colorado Education Association (CEA) is a Colorado state affiliated with the National Education Association. Mission according to the organization's tax documents, cea mission statement is: promoting quality public education and advocating for the interest of public education staff. [2] The Colorado Education Association was founded in 1875 and is a public school teachers' union that focuses on professional interests and the development of public school staff. [3] Before 1960, the SI was only open to administrators, with teachers belonging to local associations and the N. [According to the Colorado Springs Education Association, this policy changed in 1968, when NEA, along with a number of local teacher associations, pressured CEA to allow teachers to join. [4] Professional employment services are focused on continuing education for Colorado teachers. The organization trains members at their summer leadership conference, which offers workshops for teachers on a wide range of issues, and through a series of theoretical workshops to practice focused on classroom practice. [5] According to its website, CEA lobbied Colorado General Assembly members and other elected and appointed public officials to support the following causes:[6] Student-focused economic investment economic excellence in public education safe education and educational environments respect for school staff in the organization's 2016 policy guide, and the group wrote, for more than 135 years, our mission has been to promote good public education and advocate the professional interests of public education staff - teachers, supportive professionals, and private service providers. Our goal is to work collectively with all stakeholders in education to provide the best public education for every student. [7] Senate Bill 191, 2010 in 2010, the Colorado Legislature passed the Senate Bill 191, a law that changed the way teachers and administrators evaluate public education. [8] CEA was strongly opposed to the bill when it was under discussion because the legislation allowed teachers with long holdings to lose job protection and potential employment if they were found to be ineffective for two consecutive years. According to the Denver Post, CEA softened its stance on the bill when the bill allowed for a permanent appeal process for teachers with two consecutive ineffectual ratings. [9] In 2014, CEA sued to repeal some reforms in S.B. Mutual consent between the headmaster of the new school and the teacher. CEA filed a lawsuit, claiming that the ruling gives administrators too much power to oust a teacher with high ratings and strong student test scores, reports CBS Denver.
