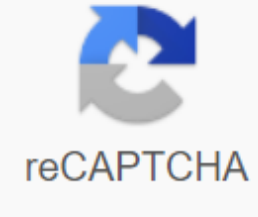

August 4, 2009 2 min read Brought To You Touring and Tasting Brutocao Cellars Hopland, California Soon after the Brutocao family released their first wine in 1980, they chose Leo St. Mark, modeled after a lion on top of St. Mark's Cathedral in Venice, Italy, as their symbol of family tradition and quality. Today, the family combines its Italian heritage with its 400-acre vineyards in southern Mendocino County. Winemaker David Brutocao follows a time of revered, minimally invasive methods of producing complex and memorable wines. Taste is paramount with Brutocaos who believe in producing wine with food in mind. Their restaurant, right next to the hopland tasting room, proves it. Crushed Grape Grille offers a complete palette of fine dishes to enjoy. The crushed grape offers excellent Italian cooking and evening evening dishes, from wood-burning oven pizzas to fresh pasta. Guests can dine on the indoor or outdoor terrace overlooking the 6 authentic championships of the wine cellar. The restaurant and tasting room consists of just part of the seven-acre Brutocao Cellars Schoolhouse Plaza, which was originally from Hopland High School from 1922 to 1963. The historical photographs displayed in the tasting room pay homage to the school that Leonard Brutocao transformed into a complex dedicated to wine and food. Special events are regularly held here. The former high school gymnasium was transformed into bliss's room, a party room/conference center for up to 200 guests. A popular spot for spring and summer weddings and fall and winter conferences, the venue recently hosted the California Sustainable Grape-Growing Alliance conference presented by UC-Davis. The building has special shops and offices on the second floor and two conference and special event rooms on the second floor. Here we look at career opportunities for the most interesting creative players at all levels and disciplines and gain insights from them on how they did it then now. Judy Greer's party jokes that her mother keeps inviting her to get a manicure license for something to fall back on, but in fact the character actress is having one heck of a good summer in the entertainment business. She played a movement-catching chimpanzee at dawn on planet of the apes, hosts a Yahoo web series reluctantly healthy, jumps at night as the beat mom of Sprint's heavy rotation of Family TV commercials, and published her first book I Don't Know Me From: Confessions of a Co-Star (Random House). And, oh yes, Greer is enjoying another billing raunchy new sitcom Married airing Thursdays on FX. She's Lena Bowman, a mother of three, and a woman from Nat Faxon's logard man for the city. I like Lena because she's not like, Honey, you're going to work and I'm going to stay here and be perfect, she says. Our house is messed up. He doesn't cook very well. She's trying to keep it all together and be a good woman, but at the end of the day, Lena is as exhausted as she is. They're best friends who sometimes can't stand each other. I think it's a real relationship. Chatting with Co.Create between gigs, Greer recounts the turning point in her career and explains why she loves auditioning, what she learned about making a supporting character in pop and how George Clooney taught her to tone it down when there's a serious job to do. In doubt, Sing LoudGrowing up in suburban Detroit, Greer learned his first big show biz lesson when he tried out a high school musical. My high school choir teacher said to me, If you doubt it, sing out loud, and he meant it literally, Greer recalls. I was performing in the Pajama Game and singing very gently, I know the darkness. He said, Judy, I'm singing you right now, we can't hear you, you don't have confidence. If you're in doubt, sing out loud. So I started my song over and really belted it. I don't think I pressed any notes, but I got the part. It was great advice, and I think about it all the time. From Hip Pocket to Big CheckGreer studied acting at the Theater School at Depaul University, then moved in 1997 from Chicago to Los Angeles, where he slept on the carpeted floor of a friend's apartment while discovering the world of hip-pocketing. I found an agent who didn't sign me, but he sent me to audition. look what my feedback was, greer recalls. They call it hip pockets. Within a week, I got a movie, a pilot and another movie. I was in such shock, and when I got my paycheck pilot, I was like Woah! It was a lot of money, so I said, Okay, I guess I can't live in L.A. maybe like a year and not do anything but act and see what happens. But I was never like I'm going to be a star! I've never had that I've done this moment probably because I've always expected it to end. Greer mocks himself for missing Chicago's famous improv scene during his earnest student actor stage. Oh, I'm doing Shakespeare in Lincoln Park. I could have met Amy Poehler and Tina Fey, but I didn't even go to see improv. But when Greer became the cast of consecutive best friend roles in sitcoms and romantic comedies such as Wedding Planner (2001) and 13 Going on 30 (2004), she instinctively began advertising libbing. I learned early on that if you do something funny it stays in the movie and if you don't, it's not, Greer explains. Everything needs comic relief. Everything was great. I did it out of necessity, he continues, if you want to make your day at work more fun you have to find a way to throw a few jokes out there. I've rarely worked on something where directors didn't want me to decorate or improvise. These are boring lines. Just take out the information, but say whatever you want. I get a lot of that direction. In Susan Sarandon's Crying Advice In 2005, Greer picked up such a practical hint they didn't teach at school. She recalls: We worked on Elizabethtown, and Susan Sarandon told me whenever she had to do crying scenes, she'd scrape a bottle of water beforehand. I started doing it, and it's totally working. I have a lot of parts where I have to cry so now I drink a lot of water. It may not sound super-inspiring, but just technically speaking, it's golden. Rejection? Get Drunk and Get Over ItGreer finally landed on his sitcom Miss guided in 2008. ABC canceled the show after three episodes. How'd he handle the rejection? The night your show's canceled, or when your movie opens and nobody goes to see it, I usually go out and get drunk. When Miss Guides was canceled, I was so sad. But there are so many factors out of my control that I can't take it too seriously. I'm sorry about myself overnight, I've got a couple extra glasses of wine, and then, I'm back the next day. My father always said, If you ever got a car accident, you should drive it, and I think of it as a metaphor for my career: Go back and get behind the wheel right now. Just keep going. Getting Serious George ClooneyGreer's experience on the set of 2011's Oscar-nominated offspring proved a creative turning point star George Clooney and Oscar-winning writer-director Alexander Payne fed their strengths to the dramatic actor. I really appreciated the set that director Alexander Payne created. When I had a breakdown scene in the hospital room, Andrew kept set very quiet and calm all day. And George is as easy as going as an actor. I saw him making fun of other people, but he left me alone because he knew I had to be in a certain main room for two days while we were filming this stuff. Removal? Greer says: I'm usually very social on set, so it was a lesson for me, and a reminder to be aware of the actors around me and what their needs are. For the dramatic scene it is very useful to keep the vibe going, so you can get in and out of it. Zen auditioning (and Auditioning and Auditioning)Many established actors dread auditions but Greer sees the casting office as another place for performance. Sometimes her audition fizzle, like when she couldn't get a role in Bridesmaids. But in 2013, he successfully broke out of his rom-com and character-driven drama the wheelhouse of The Land of the Dawn of the Planet of the Apes after he was read by director Matt Reeves. Greer says: I get a little high from auditioning, almost like going on the first date where I'm challenging someone like me, Greer says. And when I do two pages of a weird scene in front of a room full of strangers, it's still acting and it's also good practice,Even now, with projects in the pipeline including Jurassic World and movies by Brad Bird and Jason Reitman, Greer continues to audition in the form of a show of business discipline. She says: 'If I've been working for a while and haven't had many auditions I'll ask my manager if there are things I can't go on that don't matter, so when a big one comes up again I'm not like, I haven't done an audition in three months I don't know what I'm doing!'
