If you're having trouble finding an error, consider viewing your choice of answers. You can spot differences in responses and isolate groups to quickly eliminate incorrect answers. Final ThoughtsOnce you feel comfortable with the grammar rules of standard written in English, your goal is to slow down and pay attention to small details. Stick with your systematic approach and resist the urge to rush through sentence correction issues. Remember that doing as many practice questions as you can help you to start noticing patterns of how sentences are written and where errors tend to appear. 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
