Store models of handbag models are full-size patterns that are spread over several sheets of A4 or U.S. paper. A template can be downloaded as a PDF document and is available in 4 different sizes: Small, Medium, Large and Extra Large. Once a template is printed, the sheets can be pasted and cut. Then you can use the model to track it in fabric, leather, metal or other material. There are models available for most fancy parts. The templates are exported from the same program used to make the templates for the tutorial, so that the difference between the models you find in this store and used in a tutorial is almost nothing. Each model will cost only a small amount. This value is used to keep this site running and buying new materials for new fancy tutorials. After you've purchased a template it's linked to your account and available for download as many times as you want. Why do you offer templates and not just complete fantasies? Every week there are a lot of requests for full costumes. Assassin's Costume is not a great company that can make many fantasies. I just don't have the resources and time to create a fantasy for all requests. The model store gives people the opportunity to create their own fantasy. By creating it yourself, you can customize it however you want. Plus, it gives you more satisfaction than just buying a ready-to-wear :) Below is a list of all the costumes I've made so far, click on one to see all available models related to the costume. Click on the bag (=cart) to see all your selected models and check out. At this time, only PayPal is supported as a payment method. PayPal is commonly used all over the world and offers a save paying envoirement for both buyer and seller. Prices are in euros, but payments can be made in any valuta. Watch an instructional video about the model store and how models work. Hey, everybody! This week I finished a commission of Assassin's Creed for an amazing friend of mine! Here's a picture of the jacket. This was done for her fiancé. Below is what she gave me for the first time to look out for. With this jacket I used blue and black cotton fabric that she bought in fabric.com. This fabric is really the first medium/heavy fabric with what I've ever sewed; this wasn't a screen. (You'll see that later). I know that originally the jacket should be red instead of blue, however she wanted these colors because her fiance's favorite color is blue. This is one of her wedding gifts for him. I used this pattern for the killers' creed jacket. The Butterick 4929 jacket. You can see all the different modifications I made with this pattern: Captain Hook, Peter Pan, Vest and one more that will be posted soon! Below you can see me holding on to the assassins creed logo on the right side of the jacket. To make the emblem I just handed delivered Arresting this thing was a very difficult time because I had to make sure the assassins creed emblem matched the overlapping flaps on the front of the jacket. Here's the back being arrested. Putting the zipper on was the scariest part because I needed to make sure the killers' emblem matched when the zipper was closed. I was really surprised to have made it work on the first try!! It was the first time I saw a jacket zipper. In fact, it was the first time I actually make a jacket! The next two photos are of the heavy photos I put in this jacket for a removable hood. I realize that's not how the image dictated that the hood was stuck, however, I didn't see the picture from the back of the jacket until I had already cut it all off. I still think this looks pretty good! I had a hap-error with the first snap I tried to apply. The first snap I put backwards, OOPS, so I had to take my pliers and essentially rip the dang thing off. But now I know how to use it! There were a lot of first son with that jacket. The image above is how the snap is when they are together. Below is that the outside of the hood looks like the snap. I went ahead and got black snaps to make sure the final look was professional. Here's the jacket again! The only other part with which I really had a problem was the look from the inside out of the bottom liner. What I ended up doing was cutting the blue fabric so I could sew it by hand to make that look folded. I think it turned out pretty good. And here's a view from behind so you can see that too! Sorry about the bad pictures this time with guys. I finished it at night and had to give it to her the next day so I couldn't wait for daylight. But this is my DeVassa Creed Jacket. I have a feeling you might be seeing another one soon. A lot of my boyfriends' friends want one now, too. Oh, no, no, no, no, no, no, Here's a picture of my designer label! I am super excited about all the business I have received with changes and custom work. I'm getting an embroidery machine in May to increase sales!
