Clayton Kershaw won't get free agency until after the 2015 season, but the Dodgers don't want to waste any time locking their ace southpaw. ESPN's Buster Olney reported Saturday that the Dodgers offered what was essentially a life contract to pitcher Clayton Kershaw earlier this season, for a bargain range of \$300 million - an A-Rod deal, according to one source with knowledge of the scope and structure. Both sides were unable to finalise negotiations on the agreement, sources said, because Kershaw was initially uncertain whether to commit to an agreement covering that change and about contract negotiations during the season. While the two sides could not reach an agreement, Olney notes that the talks have gone enough to give confidence among some with knowledge of the negotiations that a long-term deal will be concluded this winter. Despite a lack of starting against the NLCS In Game 6, the Cardinals shut down the Dodgers' 2013 posteason run, there is almost no doubt that Kershaw is worth the money. In 2011, he returned home for the National League Cy Young Award, and in 2012 was a prestigious award runner. He is considered the front runner home of the coveted trophy again this season after going 16-9 with a 1.83 ERA and 232 strikeouts in 33 starts this season. Kershaw's production speaks for itself, but offering such money for any hand, regardless of skill or reputation, is dangerous. Johan Santana was the best pitcher in baseball when he signed a six-year, \$137.5 million contract with the Mets in 2008. However, injuries have kept Santana from starting 30 games in total, but his first season in the Big Apple. The 25-year-old Kershaw is cut from a rare fabric. His deadly repertoire, longevity and youth makes him a candidate to be the game's leading hand in the coming years. As Olney notes, the Dodgers nearly tripled their wages a year after Stan Kasten, Mark Walter and Magic Johnson took over the team's reins. It's hard to say what number Kershaw and the Dodgers will eventually settle down at all, but it's pretty clear that this ownership group has an aggressive approach to lock the game's premier left-arm up long range. Everyone is trying to make it sound as if it's easy to win a title when you've had almost 1.5 decades to do it, but so many players are finishing their careers without one. Kershaw's been through the gauntlet, and while his overall body of work in the postseason shows that he's not destined for the big stage, all he needed was one World Series victory to end this debate. And it's hard to even pin all the blame on him. Let's not forget that the offense failed to sustain it in big games for most of his career. And, please, show us a pitcher, especially in the modern era, which was completely intact in October. Madison Bumgarner (unfortunately) can only be one. And consider this: how many pitchers would you like to have than Kershaw? Among the top-15 best-paid pitchers in baseball, you're probably just (at the moment), with Gerrit Cole and Jacob deGrom taking their age and the fact that they're their premiers. Early life Kershaw was born in Dallas, Texas. His parents divorced when he was 10 and raised by his mother. He played in youth sports leagues as a kid, including Minor League Baseball. [13] [14] Kershaw attended nearby Highland Park High School, where he played baseball and was also part of the future Detroit Lions quarterback Matthew Stafford's center varsity football team. [15] After a growth spurt and further expansion of his squares in 2006, he established himself as an elite high school prospect[15] when he posted a 13-0 record with an average driving average (ERA) of 0.77 and recorded 139 strikeouts from 64. [37] Sportswriter Tony Jackson named Kershaw's debut as the most anticipated starting Dodgers pitcher since Hideo Nomo's MLB debut during the 1995 season. He made his MLB debut on May 25, starting with the St. Louis Cardinals. He struck out the first batter he faced, Skip Schumaker, the first of seven strikeouts in a game in which he pitched six innings and allowed two runs. [39] When he debuted, Kershaw was the youngest player in MLB, a title he had one year ago. [40] Kershaw won his first MLB game against the Washington Nationals on July 27, 2008. He pitched six-plus closing innings, allowing four hits, a walk, and he struck out five. [41] [42] Kershaw finished his rookie season 5-5 with a 4.26 ERA in 22 games (21 starts). [43] 2008 In the National League Championship Series (NLCS), he also came out of the Dodgers against the Philadelphia Phillies with two burns, scoring 13 batters and allowing only one kick (a solo home run) against the rival San Francisco Giants. He was the youngest Dodger ever to strikeout 13 or more batters in a game since Sandy Koufax did it in the 1955 season. [45] 17 May 2009 Kershaw didn't let it hit against the Florida's Cody Ross. [46] In 2009, despite a 8-8 record, he led the major leagues in opposing batting average (.200), resisting a sluggish percentage (.282) and nine hits (6.26). He also posted an ERA of 2.79 and 185 strikeouts. Kershaw made his debut in the playoffs against the St. Louis Cardinals in 2009. National League Division Series (NLDS). He went 6 of 2-3 innings, striking out 4, walking 1, and ended up getting without a decision (the Dodgers went on to win the game in the 9th inning). [48] At the age of 21, he started the playoff series opener, behind only Fernando Valenzuela in the NLDS in 1981 and Rick Ankiel in the NLDS in 2000. [49] Kershaw started the 2010 season with a 3.07 ERA in April, but that's walk 22 batters in 29 innings. On May 4, he had his worst start of his career against the Milwaukee Brewers at Dodger Stadium, throwing only 57 pitches in 1 1-3 burns, while retiring only four of the 13 batters he faced, including a pitcher. He was booed loudly after being pulled out of the game. Kershaw said after the game, I didn't give our team any chance. It's just not a good feeling to let down teammates, let everyone down. He's going to be stiff, he's hurting. I have to figure it out. [50] Kershaw rebounded his next start by pitching an 8-inning two-hitter and outdueling then undefeated Ubaldo Jiménez. [51] He has read the control of his slider, which is the main turning point for him. He was suspended for five game. The incident occurred after both teams were given a warning after Giants ace Tim Lincecum hit Matt Kemp earlier in the game. [53] He threw his first career completion of the game close on September 14, 2010, also against San Francisco and finished the season with a 13-10 and 2.91 ERA record in 32 starts, pitching 204 in 1-3 innings and recording 212 strikeouts. [54] 2011 season: 1st Cy Young Award After finishing the 2010 season strong, the Dodgers named Kershaw the opening day starter of the 2011 season. On May 29, he finished second in a complete career shut out, shutting down 10, winning two hits against the Florida Marlins, 8-0. He also had two singles and an RBI, scoring twice in the game. [56] He produced his third career shutout on June 20, a two-hit, 11-strikeout effort against the Detroit Tigers. Kershaw became the first Dodgers starter to strike out of the 9th inning of the side since Sandy Koufax's perfect game. [57] In another start on June 26, Kershaw started another full game (against the Los Angeles Anaheim Angels). He became the first Dodger starter to have back-to-back full-game victories since Jeff Weaver's 2005 season and the first Dodger to have double-digit strikeouts in consecutive starts since Chan-Ho Park's 2000 season. He was awarded the National League Player of the Week award for the week of June 20-26. [58] Midway through June, Kershaw scored 32 career victories, a 3.15 ERA and 593 career strikes over 568.2 innings. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Kershaw was the first 23-year-old pitcher to make many victories, an ERA that's low and more than one strikeout per inning average since the ERA became an official statistic in 1910. [59] Kershaw won numerous awards for his 2011 campaign, Kershaw was selected to the National League team in 2011, Major League Baseball's All-Star game, his first All-Star selection, Kershaw was 4-1 with a 2.02 ERA and an NL-leading 45 in July, earn him the National League Pitcher of the Month award. On August 23, he knocked out Matt Holliday of the St. Louis Cardinals for his 200th strike of the season and became the 10th Dodger pitcher to record back-to-back 200 strikeout seasons and the first since Chan-Ho Park did so in the 2001 season. [62] During the season Kershaw is the two-time Cy Young Award winner and three-time defending NL strikeout leader Tim Lincecum of the San Francisco Giants in four particularly memorable matchups. Lincecum posted a 1.24 ERA over 29 innings in four games, but failed to record the win as Kershaw objected with a .30 ERA over 30 1-3 innings and was the winning pitcher in each game. Each game was decided by a final score of 1-0 or 2-1, with many writers describing matchups as historic and reminiscent of epic pitching duels in the bygone eras. [63] [64] Kershaw finished the 2011 season, leading the NL with 21 wins, 248 strikes and a 2.28 ERA, winning the NL pitching Triple Crown winner since Jake Peavy of the San Diego Padres in 2007 and the first Dodger since Koufax won it in the 1966 season. [65] Justin Verlander of the Detroit Tigers won the American League Triple Crown the same season, marking the first major league season since 1924 to feature the Triple Crown the American League Triple Crown the same season. [71] Kershaw was the Dodgers' opening day starter for the second year in a row, where he pitched three innings for closing the ball against the San Diego Padres at Petco Park before being eliminated from the game due to flu-like symptoms. On April 27, he could have lasted over eight innings for his second victory of the season against the Washington Nationals. The win was also his 12th straight home win, tying him with Ed Roebuck (June 1960 - August 1962) and Orel Hershiser (September 1984 - October 1985) the longest home winning streak since the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles. [73] Kershaw won the National League Player of the Week Award for the May 14-20 week after he made two starts that week and pitched 16 scoreless innings, including his fourth career shut out. [74] Kershaw was selected to appear in the 2012 Major League Baseball All-Star Game, the second straight year he made the team. On August 11, he went over 200 innings during the season, becoming the 12th Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher to have three or more seasons with 200 or more burns, and the first since Hershiser did it five times from 1985 to 1989. (76) Kershaw finished 2012 with a 14-9 record, 2.53 ERA (leading league), 229 strikees and 227 2-3 innings, both of which are second in both categories. He became the first pitcher to lead the ERA league in a row since Arizona's Randy Johnson from 2001 to 2002. It also marked his fourth consecutive year with a sub-3.00 ERA, making him the first to do so since Randy Johnson from 1999 to 2002. [78] He finished second in the NL Cy Young for R.A. Dickey, receiving two first-place votes. [79] 2013 season, the first Dodger starter to do so since Derek Lowe (2005-2007). During that opening day start he pitched the entire game, four hits, shut down over the Giants and also hit his first career home run. He was the first pitcher to throw a close and hit a home run on opening day since Bob Lemon of the Cleveland Indians did so against the Chicago White Sox on April 14, 1953. (80) Kershaw picked up his 1.000th career strike on April 17, 2013, when he struck out Yonder Alonso of the Padres. He was the second youngest Dodger to reach this mark, behind only Fernando Valenzuela. 14 May Kershaw passed the 1,000-inning mark of his career mark. He also threw 130 yards that day for most of his career and the most Dodger pitcher since Odalis Pérez's 2003 season. [82] Kershaw was selected in 2013. Major League baseball its third straight selection. In July, he set a 4-1 record with a 1.34 ERA in six starts and was awarded the second national league of the month award. [84] September 2 Kershaw picked up his 200th strike in 2013, joining Hall of Famers Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale as the only starters in Dodgers history, having had at least four consecutive seasons on more than 200 strikes. [85] Kershaw finished the season with a 16-9 record, 236 innings pitched (career highs) and a Major League best 1.83 ERA and 0.92 WHIP. [86] He was the third player in history to lead the Majors ERA for three consecutive years, joining Greg Maddux (1993-95) and Lefty Grove (1929-1931). His ERA was the first sub-2.00 ERA since Roger Clemens did so in the 2005 season and the lowest total since Pedro Martínez's 2000 season. He was only the third Dodger pitcher to have an ERA of 3.00 for five consecutive seasons (Koufax and Nap Rucker). During the first In a game of the National League Division series, Kershaw struck out 12 batters from seven burns. It was the third most strikeouts by a Dodger pitcher in the 1953 World Series). His six straight strikeouts in the game tied the MLB postseason record set by Tim Belcher in the second game of the 1988 World Series. He picked up his first career postseason victory in this game. (88) Kershaw won the Warren Spahn Award for 2013, the second time he won an award that honors the best left-handed pitcher in the major leagues. [89] He was also selected for the Sporting News NL All-Star team, the fourth Dodger pitcher to be named to the team twice (after Koufax, Valenzuela and Don Newcombe). On November 13, he won the NL Cy Young Award for the seasons in a row. [91] After the season, Kershaw and the Dodgers agreed to a seven-year contract extension of \$215 million. The deal was the richest pitcher in MLB history, eclipsing a seven-year, \$180 million was also the largest ever baseball player, beating the \$28 million Roger Clemens received in 2007 and a 10-year, \$275 million contract that Alex Rodriguez signed the same year. [93] 2014 season: 3rd Cy Young Award and National League MVP Kershaw during his 20th victory in 2014. (97) [98] Kershaw was 6-0 with a 0.82 ERA in June and was awarded the third pitcher of the month of his career. [99] He was elected to the National League squad in 2014. Major League Baseball's All-Star game, his fourth straight choice. He was the sixth Dodger pitcher, and the first since Fernando Valenzuela to make the All-Star team four years in a row. [100] Kershaw had a 41-inning scoreless streak that ended at the top of the sixth inning on July 10 when, with two outs, Chase Headley homered to left field at Dodger Stadium. Kershaw's streak was, at the time, tied for the fifteenth-longest scoreless inning streak in MLB history. [101] He won the pitcher of the month award again in July, the third Dodger (along with Don Sutton and Burt Hooton) to win two months in a row. He was 4-0 with a 1.10 ERA per month with 48 strikeouts and only 10 walks. [102] He picked up his 200th strike of the season on September 2, the fifth consecutive year, when he reached that number, reaching only six consecutive seasons with Sandy Koufax among Dodger starters. [103] He also became only the fourth pitcher since 1893 to make at least five 200-strikeout seasons during the age-26 season (Bert Blyleven, Walter Johnson and Sam McDowell are others). (104) Kershaw finished the season 21-3 with a 1.77 ERA in 27 starts. He has once again led the National League in many categories, such as ERA, ERA+, Wins, Win %, WHIP, IP/GS, SO/9, Strikeout-to-walk ratio, complete games, FIP and Wins Above Replacement for both pitchers and all NL players. He also finished third in strikeouts despite missing most of the first month of the season. He was the first pitcher in history to win four ERA titles in a row. [105] Many experts have named their 2014 season one of the best step seasons in recent memory. [104] [106] But in his first playoff start, Game 1 of the Division Series against the Cardinals, Kershaw became the first pitcher in history to strike out 10, allowing eight runs. The next day, he was voted NL MVP, the first National League pitcher to win an award since Bob Gibson in 1968, and the first Dodgers player to win an award since Kirk Gibson in 1988 [115] in the 2015 season: 300 strikes a season for Kershaw with the Dodgers in 2015. He became the 22nd pitcher in franchise history and the second-youngest active pitcher to reach the mark (118) Kershaw won his sixth career NL Player of the Week of June 1-7, 2015, when he allowed only two runs in 10 baserunners in 15 innings while striking out 18 in two starts. [119] Kershaw did not make the original NL list in 2015. For the All-Star game, though, he was included in the Final Vote vote, which he lost to Cardinals pitcher Carlos Martinez. However, he was added to the roster to replace Nationals pitcher Max Scherzer, who was unavailable for pitching Sandy Koufax and Fernando Valenzuela as the only Dodgers pitchers to accomplish that feat. [120] Kershaw struck a season-high 14 batters in eight closing innings on July 18 against the Washington Nationals. He became the first Dodgers pitcher with back-to-back games for double-digit strikeouts and no walks since Dazzy Vance in 1930. On July 13-19, he shared his weekly NL player with teammate Zack Greinke and won the NL Pitcher in July. (123) Kershaw picked up his 200th strike of the season on August 12, tying Hideo Nomo for the 1995 season with the fastest mark in Dodgers history with 156 innings. It was the sixth straight 200 strikeout of the season for Kershaw, tying Sandy Koufax for the most in Dodgers franchise history. 4 October Kershaw became the 11th major league player. Strike out 300 batters a season, the first player since Randy Johnson did so in 2002. He finished the season with a 16-7 record, a 2.13 ERA and 301 strike in 232 3 innings. [47] He led the big leagues in pickoffs, with nine. [126] In Game One of 2015 In the National League Division series, Kershaw struck out 11 of 6 in 2-0 innings, but allowed three runs in his fifth straight postseason loss. He and New York Mets starter Jacob deGrom were the first pair of starters each to throw at least 11 strikeouts in the same postseason game in MLB history. [127] He rebounded in game four, earning the rest of the game by allowing one run and three hits against eight strikeouts in seven innings on October 13. [128] Kershaw finished third in the National League Cy Young Award voting, placing behind teammate Zack Greinke and eventual winner Jake Arrieta. [129] 2016 season: In an injury-plaqued year, Kershaw delivers a pitch during nics game 6 against the Chicago Cubs, Kershaw started his sixth straight opening day in 2016, when the Dodgers won 15-0. It also marked the first time the Dodgers have won six straight opening day games, all of which he started. [130] On May 12 against the New York Mets, he struck out 13 while pitching a three-hit full game shutout. He set an MLB record with six consecutive starts with at least 10 strikeouts. On May 29, he picked up his 100th strike, and walked only five batters during that period. It was the smallest walk total for a pitcher to reach 100 strikeouts in the modern era, beating Cliff Lee, who had seven walks in the 2010 season. [132] 30 June 2016 Kershaw was placed on the 15-day disabled list due to back pain. He received an MRI, which revealed that there was a mild herniated disc in his back, and received an epidural injection to treat pain. [133] It was named in 2016. Coast Dodgers in his first minor league season in 2006. [138] He next pitched seven closing innings, allowing only two hits in game two of 2016. National League Championship Series v Cubes. [139] He fought Game Six, allowing five to five innings to pick up losses as the Dodgers were eliminated from post-season contention. [140] 2017 season: Kershaw made his seventh straight opening day appearance in the World Series, tying Don Sutton for most consecutive starts on opening day, while Sutton and Don Drysdale begin most of the opening day for the Dodgers. On June 2, he knocked out Jonathan Villar of the Milwaukee Brewers for a 2,000th career strike. He was the fifth youngest player in major league history to reach this mark, as well as the second fastest pitcher before 2000 strikeouts, to accomplish a feat in 277 games (behind Randy Johnson's 262 games). [142] [143] He was named in his seventh straight All-Star game, the second most in Dodgers history after Drysdale. 23 July Kershaw left the game because of back tightness. On the same day, he was placed on the 10-day disabled list. [145] On September 1, he returned to lead the National League with an average run and wins. [47] At 27, he was 18-4 with a 2.31 ERA and 202 strike. [47] He led all major league pitchers on the left-hander with a base percentage, sizing in 87.4 percent of base runners. He also led all major league pitchers with first-stroke percentage (69.4%).[148] In the 2017 NLDS opener against the Arizona Diamondbacks, he allowed four solo home runs in 6 1-3 innings, but still picked up the victory. [149] Four home runs were tied for the most allowed in the posteason game. [150] He made two starts in the 2017 NLCS against the Chicago Cubs, both Dodgers wins, including clinching game five. He allowed three runs in 11 innings in two games with nine strikeouts and only two walks. [151] Kershaw started in 2017. The Opening Game of the World Series for the Dodgers against the Houston Astros. He struck out 11 batters a game without walking anyone and only allowed one run (solo homer) on three hits to pick up the win. [152] His 11 strikeouts were the third by a Dodgers pitcher in a World Series game, followed by Sandy Koufax (15 in 1963) and Carl Erskine (14 in 1953). [153] He made another start in the fifth game of the series, but this time he also missed, allowing six runs on four hits in 4 2-3 innings. [154] He returned to game seven pitch with four scoreless innings relief in the game, and in the process, he broke Orel Hershiser's Dodgers post-season record with his 33rd strikeout. But the Dodgers lost the game and the series. [155] Kershaw was selected as a starting pitcher for the Baseball America All-MLB Team[156] and finished second world series in 2018. He allowed only one run in six innings with strikeouts against the Giants, but still lost the game 1-0. It was his first opening day day 6 May Kershaw was placed on the disabled list on 23 June. [161] In 2018, he had a record of 9-5 with a 2.73 ERA and 155 strikeouts, his lowest winning streak and the highest ERA since 2010 and the fewest strikes since his rookie season. [167] Kershaw's contract allowed him to opt out and become a free agent after the 2018 season, but on November 2, he and the team agreed a new three-year, \$93 million contract by one year and \$28 million. [168] 2019 season: More injuries and an early playoff exit, Kershaw suffered left shoulder inflammation at the start of spring training, so he was shut down and he didn't start throwing in the spring until late. As a result, the Dodgers chose to put him on the injured list to start the season, ending their Dodgers record streak of eight straight opening day starts. [169] He was selected for the 2019 MLB All-Star game, his eighth all-star performance. (170) Kershaw picked up his 165th career win on August 14 against the Miami Marlins, tying Koufax the most ever Dodger left-handed pitcher. He also struck out the first seven batters of the game, breaking a Dodger record previously held by Andy Messersmith (1973) and one short of a major league record. In Game 5, he entered the game in relief of Walker Buehler with two outs in the seventh inning and struck out Adam Eaton. In the eighth inning Kershaw allowed home runs on back-to-back pitches by Anthony Rendon and Juan Soto to give up a 3-1 lead, and the Nationals won the game and series. [190] He is also known for moving to first base one and being considered one of the better field pitchers in the game. [191] [192] Al Leiter's 2018 season data shows that the average rotation rate of his curve ball was reported as just above the league average (2,497 rpm, 2,484 rpm average), but he can still effectively use the pitch for better control and location and similar release action to Sandy Koufax.
