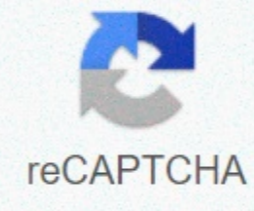

## El angel dela guarda

The Angel of the Guard (1656), the oil of Pietro da Cortona the guardian angel or guardian angel, according to Catholic beliefs, is the angel to whom God gives the mission to protect, preserve, and guide every person during his or her life on earth to facilitate the ascension to Heaven. [1] Faith in the guardian angel is deeply rooted in Catholicism. According to the scripture theology references The description of the mission of this category of angels for the keeper of human beings can be read in the books of Genesis, Tobias, Psalter, Matthew, Acts of the Apostles, and the Letter to the Jews. In angelology the guardian angels were described in the 4th or 5th century by the Byzantine theologian and mystic Pseudo Dionisio Areopagita in his work Celestial Hierarchies (De c'lsti hierarchy), where he explained the angelic order in the first treatise of angelology. Catholics argue that the Holy Scripture would sometimes be the basis of the guardian angel's faith: I will send an angel before you, so that he may protect you on the way and lead you to the place I have prepared for you (Exodus 23:20). [2] In the Catechism of the Catholic Church the existence of Guardian Angels is affirmed in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, where in particular Article 336 [3] states that: From its beginning (Mt 18:10) to death (Lc 16:22), human life is surrounded by its custody (Ps 34:8; 91, 10-13) and its intercession (Jb 33:23-24; Za 1.12; Tb 12, 12). No one can deny that every believer has with him an angel as protector and shepherd to lead his life (Saint Basil the Great, Adversus Eunomium, 3, 1: PG 29, 656B). From this earth, Christian life participates, by faith, in the blessed society of angels and people united in God. Regarding the existence of the Guardian Angel, Pope Francis said: We all have an angel always by our side, who never leaves us alone, and helps us not to lose the way and who protects us, makes us hear things, whenever we have heard: But, this... should do so ... this is not correct ... Be careful! It's the voice of this guy of ours on the way. He also said: is my relationship with my guardian angel? Did I hear that? Give you good morning? Should I tell him to protect me in my sleep? Talk to him? Should I ask your advice? Is he with me? To these questions, he said: We can answer today: each of us can do this to see what is the relationship with this angel that the Lord has sent to protect me and accompany me on the way, and who always sees the face of the Father who is in heaven. At that time, the Day of the Guardian Angel began to be celebrated with the feast of Archangel Michael (September 29th). The Church in England celebrated this celebration in the year 800. In the 12th century, Honorius of Autun wrote that God, joining every soul with the body, entrusts him to an angel, whose mission will be to induce him for good and to account for his actions before God. [5] St. Albert the Great, St. Thomas Aquinas, and St. Peter Damian wrote more or less simultaneously—in the 13th century—that when a person sinned, the guardian angel does not abandon him, but tries to lead him to repentance and reconciliation with God. [5] Pope Leo X (1475–1521) approved a new office—composed of Franciscan monk Juan Colombi—which established the doctrine of a personal angel. [6] Pope Paul V (1560–1621) universalized this devotion. In 1670, Pope Clement X (1590–1676) established the feast of the Holy Angel of the Guard, dedicated on 2 October to the special angel of each person. [5] The feast of the summer of the Holy Angel of the Guard in Fondachelli-Fantina, Sicily the Pontifical Magisterium constantly remembered it in its teachings. From England this holiday was extended to the rest of the world after 1608, at the initiative of the time pope. Guardian Angel Day is commemorated on October 2. Angel of the Lord who, by order of the divine lysing providence, you are my guardian, keep me on this day [this afternoon or tonight], enlightens my understanding, directs my affection, governs my feelings so that I never offend God and the Lord. Amen. There is another traditional Catholic prayer to the Holy Angel: the Holy Angel of the Lord, the one who was jealous of me, because I entrust you with the divine Pietate, enlighten me, guard, govern, and rule Amen. Same sentence, in Latin: Angele Dei, qui custos es mei, tibi commissum pietate superna, me illumina, custodi, rege et gubernare. The idea of a spirit, a supernatural entity that follows and supervises every human being was already present in other religions and in Greek philosophy. In the Old Testament we read that God is surrounded by a true court of heavenly figures who worship Him and act in His name. Already in these ancient books there are frequent references to angels sent by God as protectors of men and individuals, as well as messengers. In the Gospel, Jesus invites to respect even the smallest and most humble, in reference to his angels, who watch over them from heaven and contemplate the face of God at every moment. The Guardian Angel, then, is bound to anyone who lives in the grace of God. The parents of the church as Tertullian, St. St. Ambrose, St. John Chrysostome, St. Jerome and St. Gregory of Nice claimed the existence of a Guardian Angel for each person, and although there was not yet a dogmatic formulation about this figure, during the Synod of Trent (1545-1563) it was declared that every human being had its own Angel. Beginning in the 17th century, the spread of popular devotion increased, and Pope Paul V introduced the feast of guardian angels into the calendar. Even in sacred representations and especially in images of popular devotion, the Guardian Angels began to appear, usually described in the act of protecting children from evil. In fact, especially when we are children, we are encouraged to speak to our guardian angel and guide our prayers. Growing up, this blind trust, this unconditional love for an invisible yet extraordinarily reassuring presence, is diminished. This is what we must remember to find her again with us: guardian angels exist. The gospel affirms this, the scriptures support it in countless examples and episodes. Catechism teaches us from childhood to feel this presence with us and to trust it. Angels have always existed. Our Guardian angel was not created with us at the time of our birth. He always existed, from the moment God created all the angels. It was a unique episode, a single moment when the divine will generated all the angels, thousands. Then God did not create any more angels. There is an angelic hierarchy, and not all angels are destined to become Guardian Angels. Angels also differ in their duties and especially in their position in heaven in relation to God. Some angels, in particular, are chosen to uphold a judgment and, if they pass it, are qualified as guardian angels. When a boy or girl is born, one of these angels is chosen to stay with him until death and beyond. ... and just one. We can't leave him, we can't share him with anyone. Even on this the scriptures are full of references and citations. Our angel guides us on our way to heaven Our angel cannot force us to follow the path of good. He can't decide for us to impose options on us. We are and remain free. But his role is precious, important. As a silent and trusted adviser, he stands by us, trying to counsel the best, suggesting the right way forward, to obtain salvation, to deserve Paradise, especially to be good people and good Christians. Our angel never abandons us in this life and in the next, we will know that we can count on him with this invisible friend and who never leave us alone. Our angel is not the spirit of a dead person Although it is nice to think that when someone we love dies, he becomes an angel, and as such he returns to remain on our side, unfortunately it is not so. Our Guardian angel can be no one we knew alive, or a member of our family who died at an early age. He has always existed, it is a spiritual presence generated directly by God. That doesn't mean he loves us any less! Let us remember that God is before all things. Love. Our guardian angel has no name... or, if you have it, it's not our job to establish it. The names of angels, such as Michael, Raphael, Gabriel, are mentioned in the scriptures. Any other name attributed to these heavenly creatures is not documented or confirmed by the Church and, as such, it is inappropriate to claim that we use it especially for our Angel, using it to determine it, the month of birth, or other imaginative methods. Our angel fights with us with all his might. We don't have to believe we have a sweet fat next to us playing the harp. Our angel is a warrior, a strong and courageous warrior, who is on our side in every battle of life and protects us when we are too fragile to do so alone. Our Guardian Angel is also our personal messenger, tasked with bringing our messages to God, and vice versa. It is for angels that God is directed to communicate with us. Your job is to make us understand your word and lead us in the right direction. Correct.
