something special. [34] In 1973, Williams won a full scholarship to the Juilliard School (Group 6, 1973–1976) in New York City. He was one of 20 students accepted into the freshman class, and he and Christopher Reeve were the only two accepted by John Houseman into the Advanced Program at
school that year. William Hurt and Mandy Patinkin were also classmates. [36] According to biographer Jean Dorsinville, Franklyn Seales and Williams were recalled his first impression of Williams when they were new students at Juilliard: He wore tie-dyed shirts with
tracksuit backgrounds and spoke one kilometer per minute. I've never seen so much energy contained in one person. It was like a unscapped balloon that had been inflated and immediately released. I saw in amazement how I practically numbed the walls of the classrooms and hallways. To say it was
'on' would be an important euphemism. [36] Williams and Reeve had a dialect class taught by Edith Skinner, who Reeve said he was one of the world's leading voice and speech teachers; according to Reeve, Skinner was baffled by Williams and his ability to act instantly in many different accents. His
main acting teacher was Michael Kahn, who was equally baffled by this human dynamo. Williams already had a reputation for being fun, but Kahn criticized his antics as a simple stand-up comedy. In a later production, Williams silenced his critics with his well-received performance as an elder in
Tennessee Williams' Night of the Iguana. Reeve wrote: He was just the old man. I was surprised by his work and very grateful that fate had united us. [36] The two remained close friends until Reeve's death in 2004. Reeve had struggled for years to be quadriplegic after a horseback accident. [36]:16 His
friendship was like brothers of another mother, according to Zak, Williams' son. Williams paid many of Reeve's medical bills and gave financial support to his family. [39] During the summers of 1974, 1975 and 1976, Williams worked as a waiter at The Trident in Sausalito, California. [40] He left Juilliard[41]
[42] during his first year in 1976 at Houseman's suggestion, said there was nothing else Juilliard could teach him. [43] Gerald Freedman, another of his teachers in Juilliard, Williams was a genius and that the school's conservative and classic training style did not suit him; no one was surprised
that he left. [44] The stand-up comedy Williams career at a USO show on December 20, 2007 Williams began performing stand-up comedy in the San Francisco Bay Area in 1976. [45] He gave his first performance at holy city zoo, a comedy club in San Francisco, where he made his way from the care
bar. [46] In the 1960s, San Francisco was a hub for a revival of rock, hippie, drug and sexual revolution music, and in the late 1970s, Williams says he learned of drugs and happiness during that period, adding that he
saw the best brains of my time turned into mud. [35] Williams moved to Los Angeles and continued to perform stand-up at clubs such as The Comedy Store. There, in 1977, he was seen by television producer George Schlatter, who asked him to appear in a revival of his show Laugh-In. The show aired in
late 1977 and was his first television appearance. [35] That year, Williams also performed a show at L.A. Improv for Home Box Office. [47] Although Laugh-In's renaissance failed, he led Williams to his television career; He continued to perform stand-up in comedy clubs such as The Roxy to help maintain
his acute improvisation skills. [48] In England, Williams appeared remarkably in The Fighting Cocks. With his success in Mork & England, Williams began reaching a wider audience with his stand-up comedy, beginning in the late 1970s and throughout the 1980s, including three HBO comedy specials:
Off The Wall (1978), An Evening with Robin Williams (1983), and A Night at the Met (1986). [49] Williams won a Grammy Award for Best Comedy Album for recording his 1979 live show at the Copacabana in New York City, Reality... What a concept. [50] David Letterman, who knew Williams for nearly 40
years, recalls seeing him perform for the first time as a new comedian at The Comedy Store in Hollywood, where Letterman and other comedians had already been stand-up. He came in like a hurricane, said Letterman, who said he then thought to himself: Holy shit, there goes my chance in show
business. Williams at Aviano Air Force Base, Italy on December 22, 2007, Williams said that partly due to the stress of stand-up, he began using drugs and alcohol early in his career. He also said he didn't drink or take drugs while on stage, but occasionally it was done when he hung up the day before.
During the period he was using cocaine, he said he did it paranoid when he was acting in Stage. Williams once described the life of stand-up comedians: It's a brutal field, man. They burn. Your toll is charged. In addition, the lifestyle: party, drink, drugs. If you're on the road, it's even more brutal. You have
to go back down to calm your ass, and then takes you back. They shut down because it comes and goes. Suddenly they're hot, and then someone else is hot. Sometimes they get very bitter. Sometimes they take it for a go. Sometimes they have some rebirth and come back again. Sometimes they
break. Pressure's in action. You become obsessed and then you lose that approach you need. [8]:34-35 Some, such as critic Vincent Canby, were concerned that their monologues were so intense that they seemed at any time that their creative process could be reversed to a complete fusion. [53] Her
biographer, Emily Herbert, described her intense and completely manic style of stand-up [which sometimes] defies analysis ... [58] Whoopi Goldberg defended him, stating that it is difficult for comedians not to reuse another comedian's material, and that it
is done all the time. [59] He later avoided going to the performances of other comedians to land similar accusations. [59] During an interview with Playboy in 1992, Williams was ever afraid of losing his balance between his work and his life. He said: There is that fear, if I felt that I was not
getting bored but a rock, that I still could not talk, shoot or talk about things, if I started to worry or was too afraid to say something. ... If I stop trying, I'm afraid. Although he attributed novelist Jerzy Kosisski's recent suicide to his fear of losing his creativity and sharpness, Williams felt he could overcome
those risks. For this reason, he saddened his father by strengthening his self-confidence, telling him never to be afraid to talk about issues that were important to him. [52] Williams' stand-up work was a constant common thread throughout his career, as saw by the success of his one-time show (and later
DVD) Robin Williams: Live on Broadway (2002). In 2004, he was voted 13th on the Comedy Central 100 Greatest Stand-ups of All Time list. After a six-year hiatus, in August 2008, Williams announced a new 26-city tour, Weapons of Self-Destruction. The tour began in late September 2009 and ended in
New York on December 3, and was HBO special on December 8, 2009. [61] Main television article Mork & Englished and appearing in the cast of The Richard Pryor Show on NBC, Williams was cast by Garry Marshall as the alien Mork in a 1978 episode of the
television series Happy Days, My Favorite Orkan. [62] Wanted as a last-minute replacement for an actor who left, Williams impressed the producer with his peculiar sense of humor when he sat on his head when asked to take a seat for the audition. [63] Like Mork, Williams improvised much of his
dialogue and physical comedy, speaking with a loud, nasal voice and doing most of the script ill-considered. The cast and crew, as well as the television network executives were deeply impressed with their performance. Mork's appearance proved so popular with viewers that it led to the television spin-off
Mork & amp; Mindy, which co-starred Pam Dawber, and ran from 1978 to 1982; the show was written to accommodate his extreme improvisations in dialogue and behavior. Although he played the same character as happy days, the series was set in the present in Boulder, Colorado, rather than the late
1950s in Milwaukee. Mork & amp; Mindy in his heyday had a weekly audience of sixty million and was intrigued to turn Williams people as Williams became a man and boy, buoyant, rubber-faced, an
endless gusher of invention. Mork became popular, appearing on posters, coloring books, lunchboxes and other goods. Mork & amp; Mindy was a hit in his first season that Williams appeared on the March 12, 1979 cover of Time magazine. [68] The cover photo, taken by Michael Dressler in 1979, is said
to have [captured] its various sides: the funny assault on camera, and a sweet, more reflective pose that appears on a small TELEVISION in his hands according to Mary Forgione of the Los Angeles Times. [69] This photo was installed at the National Portrait Gallery at the Smithsonian Institution shortly
after his death to allow visitors to pay their respects. Williams also appeared on the cover of Rolling Stone's August 23, 1979 issue, photographed by Richard Avedon. [71] Subsequent appearances Beginning in the late 1970s and throughout the 1980s, Williams began reaching a wider audience with his

credited film is a small role in the 1977 low-budget comedy Can I Do It... Until I need glasses?. His first starring role, however, is as the main character in Popeye (1980), in which Williams showed off the acting skills previously demonstrated in his television work; consequently, the film's commercial
disappointment was not blamed for its performance. [82] He continued to star in the title character in The World According to Garp (1982), which Williams felt may have lacked some insanity on screen, but had a large core. He continued with other smaller roles in less successful films, such as The
Survivors (1983) and Club Paradise (1986), although he said these roles did not help advance his film career. [46] His first break came from his starring role in Director Barry Levinson's Good Morning, Vietnam (1987), which earned Williams an Oscar nomination for Best Actor. The film is set in 1965
during the Vietnam War, with Williams playing the role of Adrian Cronauer, a radio shock athlete who keeps troops entertained with comedy and sarcasm. Williams was allowed to play the role without a script, improvising most of his lines. On the microphone, he created voice impressions of people,
including Walter Cronkite, Gomer Pyle, Elvis Presley, Mr. Ed and Richard Nixon. [46] We simply let the cameras roll, producer Mark Johnson said, and Williams managed to create something new for each individual shot. [83] Dramatic roles Williams and Yola Czaderska-Hayek at the 62nd Academy
Awards in 1990 Many of their later roles were in comedies woven with pathos. [84] Looking at most of his filmography, a writer was struck by the breadth and radical diversity of most of the roles Williams portrayed. In 1989, Williams played a private school English teacher at Dead Poets Society, which
included a final and emotional scene that some critics said inspired a generation and became part of pop culture. [86] Similarly, his performance as a therapist in Good Will Hunting (1997) deeply even some real therapists. [87] In Awakenings (1990), Williams plays an Oliver Sacks-inspired physician, who
wrote the book on which the film is based. Sacks later said the way the actor's mind worked was a form of genius. In 1991, he played an adult Peter Pan in hook film, though he had said he would have to lose 25 pounds for the role. Terry Gilliam, who co-founded Monty Python and directed Williams in two
of his films, The Fisher King (1991) and The Adventures of Baron Munchausen (1988), said in 1992 that Williams had the ability to go from maniac to crazy to tender and vulnerable... [Williams had] the most unique mind on the planet. There's no one like him out there. [52] Other performances Williams
had in drama films include Moscow on the Hudson (1984), What Dreams May Come (1998) and Bicentennial Man (1999). In Insomnia (2002), Williams plays a writer/murderer fleeing a Los Angeles cop (played by Al Pacino) in rural Alaska. [90] Also in 2002, in the psychological thriller One Hour Photo,
Williams portrays an emotionally disturbed photo development technician who becomes obsessed with a family for which he has long developed photos. Williams' last film released during his lifetime was The Angriest Man in Brooklyn, a film that addresses the value of life in which Williams plays Henry
Altmann, a terminally ill man who re-evaluates his life and works to redeem himself. His roles in comedy and drama films earned Williams several accolades, including an Oscar for Best Supporting Actor for his role in Good Will Hunting; [62] as well as two pre-Oscar nominations, by Dead Poets Society,
and as a troubled homeless man in The Fisher King, respectively. [62] Among the actors who helped him during his acting career, he credited Robert De Niro, from whom he learned the power of silence and the economy of dialogue by acting. From Dustin Hoffman, with whom Hook co-starred, he learned
to assume totally different types of characters, and to transform his characters by extreme preparation. Mike Medavoy, Hook's producer, told his director, Steven Spielberg, that he intentionally joined Hoffman and Williams for the film because he knew they wanted to work together, and that Williams
welcomed the opportunity to work with Spielberg. Williams benefited from working with Woody Allen, who directed him and Billy Crystal on Deconstructing Harry (1997), as Allen became aware of the fact that Crystal and Williams had often performed together on stage. [94] The voice plays Williams in
Washington, D.C. in 1996 Williams voiced characters in several animated films. His voice role as it was a Disney film, and
did not want the studio to benefit from selling merchandise based on the film. He accepted the role under certain conditions; I'm doing it because I want to be part of this tradition of animation. I want something for my kids. A deal I just don't want to sell anything, like burger king, like toys, like things,
Williams improvised much of his dialogue, recording approximately 30 hours of tape,[17] and pretended to be dozens of celebrities, including Ed Sullivan, Jack Nicholson, Robert De Niro, Groucho Marx, Rodney Dangerfield, William F. Buckley Jr., Peter Lorre, Arnold Schwarzenegger and Arsenio Hall.
[97] Her role in Aladdin became one of her most recognized and most beloved, and the film was the highest-grossing film of 1992; won numerous awards, including a Golden Globe for Williams. His performance paved the way for other animated films to incorporate actors with more stellar power. He was
named Disney Legend in 2009. Williams continued to provide vocals in other animated films, including FernGully: The Last Rainforest (1992), Robots (2005), and an uncredited vocal performance in Everyone's Hero (2006). He also voiced the holographic character Dr. Know in the live-
action film A.I. Artificial Intelligence (2001). It was the voice of The Timekeeper, a former walt Disney World Resort attraction about a time-traveling robot that meets Jules Verne and takes him into the future. [100] Later films Years after the films, Janet Hirshenson revealed in an interview that Williams had
expressed interest in playing Rubeus Hagrid in the Harry Potter film series, but was rejected by director Chris Columbus due to the British-only edict. [101] In 2006, he starred in five films, including Man of the Year and The Night Listener, the latter being a thriller about a radio show host who realizes that a
child with which he has developed a friendship may or may not exist. After his death in 2014, four Williams-starring films were released: Night at the Museum: Secret of the Tomb, A Merry Friggin' Christmas, Boulevard and Absolutely Anything. [102] Williams' theatrical work at the World GALA USE in
Washington, D.C., on October 1, 2008 Williams appeared alongside Steve Martin at Lincoln Center in an off-Broadway production of Waiting for Godot in 1988. [104] He headlined his own unides show, Robin Williams: Live on Broadway, which he played at broadway in July 2002. He made his Broadway

documentary Robin Williams: Come Inside My Mind that the relationship with Garces began after the two had split up. [113] On April 30, 1989, Williams married Garces, who was six months pregnant with her son. They had two children, Zelda Rae Williams (born 1989) and Cody Alan Williams (born 1989) and Cody Alan Williams (born 1989).
1991). In March 2008, Garces filed for divorce from Williams, citing irreconcilable differences. [115] Their divorce was finalized in 2010. Williams married his third wife, graphic designer Susan Schneider, on October 22, 2011, in St. Helena, California. [117] The two lived at their home in Sea Cliff, San
Francisco, California. [114] Williams said: My children give me a great sense of wonder. Just to see them become these extraordinary human beings. [118] In May 2019, Zak Williams and his fiancée Olivia June announced the birth of their son, McLaurin Mickey Clement Williams, Robin's first grandson.
McLaurin was Robin's middle name. [119] Cody Williams and his fiancée married on July 21, 2019, on what would have been Williams' other interests at BBC World Debate on 27 February 2008 His favorite books were isaac Asimov's Foundation trilogy, [121] with his favorite
book as a child The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, which he later shared with his children. [122] Williams was an enthusiast of role-playing games on pen and paper. [125] His daughter Zelda was named after the main character in The Legend of Zelda, a family-favorite video game
series, and sometimes performed at consumer entertainment fairs. [127] Williams was a big fan of anime and collected figures. His daughter described him as a figure grabber, one of his figures being the fictional character Deunan Knute from the anime film Appleseed of which he was a fan. He also liked
the film Innocence Ghost in the Shell, and received a DVD copy of Paranoia Agent with a signature from its director, Satoshi Kon. [130] He also became a devout cycling enthusiast, having taken the sport in part as a substitute for drugs. Eventually, he amassed a large collection of bicycles and became a
fan of often traveling to racing events, such as the Tour de France, [133] In 2016, their children donated 87 of their Challenged Athletes Foundation, In New York City, Williams was part of the West Side YMCA racing team and showed promising results
with 34:21 minutes in a 10K race at Central Park in 1975. [135] Religion and politics Williams was raised and sometimes identified as an episcopal, but later in life, he did not follow any organized religion. [137] He described his name in a comedy routine as I have that idea of Chicago Protestant,

Democratic Party and donated more than $150,000 in addition to donations to special interest groups. [137] Philanthropy In 1986, Williams teamed up with Whoopi Goldberg and Billy Crystal to found Comic Relief USA. This annual HBO benefit on homeless television has grossed $80 million since 2014.
[141] Bob Zmuda, creator of Comic Relief, explains that Williams felt blessed because he came from a wealthy home, but wanted to do something to help the less fortunate. [142] Williams made charitable appearances to support women's literacy and rights, along with appearing in benefits for veterans.
He was a regular at the DE circuit, where he traveled to 13 countries and acted for approximately 90,000 soldiers. [143] After his death, USO thanked him for all he did for the men and women of our armed forces. [144] Williams and his second wife, Marsha, founded a philanthropic organization called the
Windfall Foundation to raise money for many charities. In December 1999, she sang in French in the BBC-inspired music video of international celebrities making a version of The Rolling Stones single It's Only Rock 'n Roll (But I Like It) for the charity Children's Promise. [145] In response to the 2010
Canterbury earthquake, he donated all proceeds from his Christchurch performance of self-destruct weapons to help rebuild the city of New Zealand. Half of the proceeds were donated to the Red Cross and the other half to the mayoral construction fund. [146] Williams acted with the USO for U.S. troops
stationed in Iraq and Afghanistan. [147] Williams at Naval Support Activity Bahrain on December 19, 2003 For several years, Williams supported St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. [148] Health Addiction During the 1970s and early 1980s, Williams had a cocaine addiction. [149] He was a casual friend
of John Belushi,[52] and the death of the comic Saturday Night Live in 1982 from a drug overdose, which happened the morning after the two had participated together, along with the birth of their own son Zak, led him to give up drugs and alcohol: It was a call for attention? Yes, on a high level. The grand
jury also helped. [62] Williams later said of Belushi's death: I sober my shit. [150] Williams resorted to exercise and cycling to help ease his depression shortly after Belushi's death; according to bicycle shop owner Tony Tom, Williams said cycling saved my life. [153] In 2003, Williams began drinking again
while working on a film in Alaska. [149] In 2006, he checked into a substance abuse rehabilitation center in Newberg, Oregon, saying he was an alcoholic. [155] Years later, Williams acknowledged his failure to maintain sobriety, but said he never used cocaine again, stating in a 2010 interview: No.
Cocaine, paranoid and powerless, what fun. There was nothing about me thinking, ooh, let's get back to that. Useless conversations till midnight, waking up at dawn feeling like a vampire in a day pass. In mid-2014, Williams was admitted to the Hazelden Foundation's Addiction Treatment Center in Center
City, Minnesota, for the treatment of alcoholism. [156] Later health complications In March 2009, he was hospitalized due to heart problems. He postponed his one-man tour for surgery to replace his aortic valve, [157] repair his mitral valve, and correct his irregular heartbeat. [158] The surgery was
completed on March 13, 2009, at the Cleveland Clinic. [159] His publicist, Mara Buxbaum, commented that he suffered from severe depression before his death. His wife, Susan Schneider, said that in the period before his death, Williams had been sober, but was diagnosed with early-stage Parkinson's
disease, which was information he was not yet ready to share publicly. [162] An autopsy revealed that Williams had Diffuse Lewy body dementia, which had been diagnosed as Parkinson's. This may have contributed to his depression. [164] In an essay published in the journal Neurology two years after
his death, Schneider revealed that Lewy's bodily disease pathology in Williams was described by several doctors as one of the worst pathologies they had ever seen. She described the first symptoms of her illness as from October 2013. Williams' initial condition included a sudden and prolonged increase
in fear and anxiety, stress and insomnia; that worsened in severity to include memory loss, paranoia and delusions. According to Schneider, Robin was losing his mind and he was aware of it... I kept saying, 'I just want to restart my brain.' [14] Death On August 11, 2014, at his home in Paradise Cay,
California, Williams committed suicide by hanging himself. His body was cremated in the Chapel of the Hills of in San Anselmo, and his ashes were scattered throughout San Francisco Bay the next day. [166] The final report of the autopsy, published in November 2014, concluded that he died of
suffocation due to hanging. [168] Neither alcohol nor illegal were involved, and the prescription drugs present in his body were at therapeutic levels. The report also noted that Williams had been suffering from depression and anxiety. [13] An examination of his brain tissue suggested that Williams
suffer from Lewy's diffuse body dementia. [163] Describing the disease as the terrorist within my husband's brain, his widow Susan Schneider Williams said that however you look at it: the presence of Lewy's bodies took her own life, referring to her previous diagnosis of Parkinson's. [14] He revealed that
in the year before his death Williams had experienced a sudden and prolonged increase in fear and anxiety, depression and insomnia, which worsened in severity to include memory loss, paranoia and delusions. Medical experts struggled to determine a cause, and eventually diagnosed it with Parkinson's
disease. [14] The Lewy Body Dementia Association (LBDA) clarified the distinction between the term used in Lewy's body dementia, which is most commonly called Lewy's diffuse bodily disease and refers to the underlying disease process, and Lewy's body dementia umbrella,
which encompasses both Parkinson's disease dementia (PD) and Lewy body dementia (DLB). [11] According to LBDA spokesman Dennis Dickson, the report confirms that he experienced depression, anxiety and paranoia, which can occur in Parkinson's disease or Lewy body dementia. ... In early DP,
Lewy's bodies are generally limited in distribution, but in DLB, Lewy's bodies spread widely throughout the brain, as was the case with Robin Williams. [11] Ian G. McKeith, Lewy's body dementia teacher and researcher, commented that Williams' symptoms and autopsy findings were explained by DLB.
[12] Tributes A tribute made by fans to Williams at the San Francisco Pacific Heights home used for Ms. Doubtfire (August 2014) Williams' death instantly became global news. The entertainment world, friends and fans responded to his death through social media and other media. [169] His wife, Susan
Schneider, said: I lost my husband and best friend, while the world lost one of his most beloved artists and beautiful human beings. I'm completely heartbroken. [170] His daughter Zelda Williams responded to his death by saying that the world is forever a little darker, less colorful and less full of laughter in
his absence. [171] President Barack Obama published a statement about Williams' death: Robin Williams was an aviator, a doctor, a genius, a nanny, a president, a professor, a Peter Pan bangarang, and everything else... It came into our lives as an alien, but touching every element of the human spirit.
It made us laugh. It made us cry. He gave his immeasurable talent freely and generously to those who needed him most, from our troops stationed abroad to those marginalized in our own streets. [172] Williams was to be the special blackmail guest for the last night of Monty Python's London stage shows
a month before his death, with his friend, Eric Idle of Monty Python, but cancelled, claiming he was suffering from severe depression at the time. [173] When the show was released on video, it was dedicated to Williams. [173] At United Nations Headquarters on 12 August 2014, Robin Williams was
celebrated during the opening of International Youth Day. In the presence of UN Secretary-General Ban Ki Moon, Under-Secretary-General Thomas Gass paid tribute to Williams by squealing at the pulpit of the ECOSOC Chamber and citing Keating's lines from the 1989 film Dead Poets Society: Dare to
See Things differently! [174] Several fans also paid tribute to Williams on social media with photo and video re-enactments of Oh Captain! Scene. [175] Shortly after his death, Disney Channel, Disney XD and Disney Junior aired Aladdin's commercial-free original over the course of a week,
with a dedicated drawing of genius at the end of each broadcast before the credits. [176] In honor of his theatrical work, broadway lights darkened for the night, the cast of Aladdin's musical honored Williams by making audiences join them in a Song of Friend Like Me,
an Oscar-nominated song originally sung by Williams in the 1992 film Aladdin. [178] The Los Angeles Theater honors Williams fans created makeshift monuments on his star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame[179] and in places in his television and film career, such as the bank in the
Boston Public Garden featured in Good Will Hunting; [180] The Pacific Heights, San Francisco, home used in Ms. Doubtfire; [181] the Parrish Shoes lineup in Keene, New Hampshire, where parts of Jumanji were filmed; [182] and boulder, Colorado, home used for Mork & Empty Mindy. [183] During the 66th
Primetime Emmy Awards on August 25, 2014, his friend and fellow comedian Billy Crystal paid tribute to Williams, referring to him as the brightest star in our comedy galaxy. Afterwards, some of Williams' best moments of comedy were shown, including his first appearance on The Tonight Show,
indicating his great life making people laugh. [185] Talk show presenters including David Letterman, Conan O'Brien, Seth Meyers, Jimmy Kimmel and Jimmy Fallon paid tribute to Williams on their respective shows. [186] On September 9, 2014, PBS aired an hour-long special dedicated to his career, [187]
and on September 27, 2014, dozens of leading stars and celebrities paid tribute to Francis to celebrate his life and career. [188] British heavy metal band Iron Maiden dedicated a song to Williams, titled Tears of a Clown, on their 2015 album The Book of Souls. The song looks at his depression and as
well as how he tried to hide his condition from the public. [189] A rainbow-painted tunnel on Highway 101 north of the Golden Gate Bridge was officially named the Robin Williams Tunnel on February 29, 2016. In 2017, Sharon Meadow at San Francisco's Golden Gate Park, home to annual Comedy Day,
was renamed Robin Williams Meadow. [191] In 2018, HBO produced a documentary about his life and career. Directed by Marina Zenovich, the film Robin Williams: Come Inside My Mind is also screened at the Sundance Film Festival. That same year, a mural by Robin Williams was created on Market
Street in San Francisco. [193] Work on a book biography was initiated by New York Times writer David Itzkoff in 2014, [194] and was published in 2018, simply titled Robin. In August 2020, Vertical Entertainment released a trailer for a new documentary, Robin's Wish, exploring Williams' battle with Lewy's
body dementia. The film, directed by Tylor Norwood, was released digitally on September 1, 2020. [196] Influences Williams intrigued comedians such as Jonathan Winters, Peter Sellers, Nichols and May, and Lenny Bruce as influences, admiring his ability to attract a more intellectual audience with a
higher level of wit. [8]:43 He also liked Jay Leno for his speed in the ad-libbing and Sid Caesar comedy routines, whose acts he felt were precious. [52] Jonathan Winters was his idol early in his life; Eight-year-old Williams first saw him on television and paid tribute to him in interviews throughout his
career. [8]:259[197] Williams was inspired by Winters' wit, realizing, he said, that anything is possible, that anything is fun... He gave me the idea that it can be free-form, that you can get in and out of things guite easily [8]:260 During an interview in London in 2002, Williams told Michael Parkinson that
Peter Sellers was an important influence, especially his multi-character roles in Dr. Strangelove, stating: It's no better than that. British comedy actors Dudley Moore and Peter Cook were also some of his influences, he told Parkinson. Williams was also influenced by Richard Pryor's fearless ability to talk
about his personal life on stage, with topics such as his drug and alcohol use, and Williams added such subjects during his own performances. By mentioning personal matters as a form of comedy, he told Parkinson, who was cheaper than therapy and gave him a way to release his accumulated energy
and emotions. [8]:121 Legacy You can't look at any modern comics and say, That's the descendant of Robin Williams, because it's not possible to be a Robin Williams scam. ... He raised the bar for what it is possible to do, and made a huge of us would like to be comedians. Judd Apatow[199] Although
Williams was first recognized as a comedian and television star, he later became known for in film roles of substance and serious drama. It was considered a national treasure by many in the entertainment industry and by the public. [200] Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame His energy on stage and
improvisational ability became a model for a new generation of stand-up comedians. Many comedians appreciate the way he worked on very personal topics in his comedy routines, especially his honesty about drug and alcohol addiction, along with depression. [201] According to media scholar Derek A.
Burrill, due to the opening with which Williams spoke of his own life, probably the most important contribution he made to pop culture, through so many different means, was like Robin Williams the person. [201] Williams' impressions at Grauman's Williams Chinese Theatre created a free-form comedy
character so widely and unique that new comedians like Jim Carrey passed through him,[202] paving the way for the growing comedians felt more freed on stage by seeing their spontaneously diverse rank: a moment acting like a bright and
mischievous child, then as a wise philosopher or alien from outer space. [203] According to Judd Apatow, eclectic's fast-fire improvisation style was an inspiration as well as an influence for other comedians, but his talent was so extremely unusual that no one else could try to copy it. [199] His film
performances often influenced other actors, both inside and outside the film industry. Director Chris Columbus, who directed Williams in Ms. Doubtfire, says watching him work was a magical and special privilege. His actions were different from anything any of us had ever seen, coming from some
spiritual place and from another world. [204] Looking at most of her filmography, Alyssa Rosenberg in The Washington Post was struck by the breadth and radical diversity of most of her roles, writing that Williams helped us grow.
