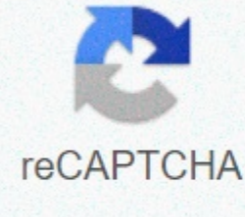

Mclaurin smith williams teacher

For Jody Callahan Robin Williams was no stranger to Memphis during his long career, last performing stand-up here at the Orpheum in 2009. His half-brother, McLaurin Smith-Williams, named Mac, teaches physics at Christian Brothers High School. Smith-Williams refused to comment on Monday night, asking for privacy. Williams also participated in fundraising for st. Jude Children's Hospital, appearing in several commercials with hospital patients who were usually timed for vacation seasons. ALSAC CEO Richard Shadyac Jr. did not respond to a request from The Commercial Appeal for an interview, but sent a statement. Today the world lost an iconic man and artist, and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital lost an amazing friend and advocate. We send our deepest condolences to the family and their loved ones from Robin Williams. Williams generously gave her time to raise awareness and funds for St. Jude and for our patients fighting childhood cancer. His humor brought bright smiles and laughter to our patients and families and his generosity deeply touched the hearts of all who knew him. He and his family remain in our thoughts and prayers. McLaurin Smith Williams is the older brother of actor Robin Williams. The actor who was found unanswred at his residence at his home in Tiburon, California on Monday afternoon, months after a rehab period in Minnesota, at the time his representatives said it was to fine-tune his recovery. The year 63 was born on July 21, 1951. A Chicago Illinois native son of Laura McLaurin, a former model originally from New Orleans, Louisiana, who died in 2001; and Robert Fitzgerald Williams, a senior executive at Ford Motor Company who died in 1987. McLaurin Smith is one of Robin's two half-nuisances; R. Todd Williams who lived in Santa Rosa, California; died on August 14, 2007. He was the son of Robin's father for his first marriage. He was national sales manager for Shafer Vineyards. Smith-Williams and Robin were children of Laura McLaurin. He was born in 1947, which made him four years older than Robin. He's far from the center of attention as a former physics teacher, but he was a big fan of his brother's work. He said in 1991 about the release of Peter Pan 'I was always a fan of Peter Pan, really looking forward to it. The now 67-year-old married to his wife Pat, who is a chemic, used to teach at Christian Brothers High School in Memphis, under a photo with a student. He wasn't always that close to his younger brother. Smith-Williams was about 13 years old when he met The three boys; Todd, McLaurin and Robin grew up as just kids. McLaurin was adopted by her mother's parents after her divorce from her first marriage. He is better known as Mac and moved to Memphis in 1965 to attend Southwest (now Rhodes College). The three brothers got along wonderfully and used to meet at least once a year. McLaurin was not related to Todd's blood, but they were very close, he stated during an interview for the Chicago Tribune. Smith-Williams said of his famous brother at the time: In private life he tends to be very quiet, almost the opposite of his skeptical character. And he's a very private person. Actually, my favorite is probably 'Moscow on the Hudson.' He actually learned Russian for that. I have a friend who speaks Russian and said he did a very believable job. Smith-Williams, 67, refused to comment Monday night, asking for privacy. He exclusively told MailOnline: I wouldn't want to talk about this right now. It means a lot to me. Thank you. Robin McLaurin Williams (July 21, 1951 – August 11, 2014) was an American actor and comedian. Known for his improvisation skills[1][2] and a wide variety of voices,[3][4] he is often regarded as one of the greatest comedians of all time. [6] Williams began performing stand-up comedy in San Francisco and Los Angeles in the mid-1970s,[8] and rose to fame for playing the alien Mork in the sitcom Mork & Mindy (1978–1982). [9] After her first popeye film role (1980), Williams starred in several critically and commercially successful films, including The World According to Garp (1982), Moscow on the Hudson (1984), Good Morning, Vietnam (1987), Dead Poets Society (1989), Dead Society (1989), (1989), (1990), The Fisher King (1991), Patch Adams (1998), One Hour Photo (2002) and World's Greatest Dad (2009). He also starred in blockbusters such as Hook (1991), Aladdin (1992), Mrs. Doubtfire (1993), Jumanji (1995), The Birdcage (1996), Good Will Hunting (1997) and the Night at the Museum trilogy (2006-2014). He was nominated for four Academy Awards, winning the Best Supporting Actor award for Good Will Hunting. He also received two Primetime Emmy Awards, six Golden Globes, two Screen Actors Guild Awards and five Grammy Awards. In August 2014, at the age of 63, Williams committed suicide by hanging up at his home in Paradise Cay, California. [10] His widow, Susan Schneider Williams—as well as his medical experts[11][12] and autopsy[13]—attributed his suicide to his fight against Lewy's bodily disease. [14] Robin McLaurin Williams was born at St. Luke's Hospital in Chicago, Illinois,[15] on July 21, 1951. His father, Robert Fitzgerald Williams, was a senior executive in Ford's Lincoln-Mercury Division. [17] Her mother, Laurie McLaurin, was a former model from Jackson, Mississippi, whose great-grandfather was Mississippi Senator and Governor Anselm J. McLaurin, a Democrat. [19] Williams had two older half-siblings: paternal half-brother Robert (also known as Todd)[20] and maternal half-brother McLaurin. [21] She was of English, French, German, Irish, Scottish and Welsh descent. [22] While his mother was a practitioner of Christian Science, Williams grew up in his father's episcopal faith. [24] During a television interview at Inside the Actors Studio in 2001, Williams credited her mother with an important early influence on her mood, and tried to make her laugh to gain attention. [25] Williams attended public elementary school in Lake Forest at Gorton Elementary School and high school at Deer Path Junior High School. [26] He described himself as a quiet boy who did not overcome his shyness until he became involved with his high school theater department. [27] His friends remember him as a lot of fun. [26] In late 1963, when Williams was 12, his father was transferred to Detroit. The family lived on a 40-room farm on 20 acres[17] in the suburbs of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, where he was a student at Detroit Country Day School. [28] He allied at the school, where he was on the school's wrestling team and was elected class president. [29] While his parents worked, Williams was partially raised by the family maid, who was his main companion. When he was 16, his father retired early and the family moved to Tiburon, California. After his move, Williams attended Redwood High School in nearby Larkspur. At the time of graduation in was voted Most Likely Unsuccessful and more fun by his classmates. [32] After graduating from high school, Williams enrolled at Claremont Men's College in California, to study political science; stopped acting. [33] Williams studied theater for three years at the College of Marin, a community college in Kentfield, California. According to College of Marin drama professor James Dunn, the depth of the young actor's talent became apparent when he was cast in the musical Oliver! like Fagin. Williams often improvised during his time on the theater show, leaving cast members in hysteria. Dunn called his wife after a late rehearsal to tell him Williams was going to be
