The transition between the present perfect and the past is one of the most complex aspects of English learners. There are several reasons for this: Students use language, such as German, French or Italian, which uses their past version of simple and present perfectly alternately. It is difficult for students to distinguish between specific past experiences (the simple past) and the overall experience (current perfect). Students speak a language in which strenuous consumption is much free, such as Japanese. This tutorial focuses on the switch, first narrowing the choices to the present perfect or past simple.
