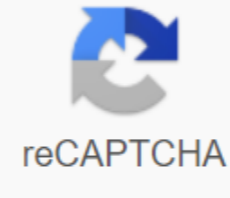

## Ut lady vols basketball

But that could happen to Lady Ocus after the news broke the last two days. On Wednesday, Jasmine Masjil, who started 30 games this year under Kelly Harper, entered the transfer portal. Then came Thursday, when Lai Green, who suffered a season-ending injury two games into the season, announced he would be leaving UT in an Instagram post. Both were fifth-graders at the Tennessee Lady Vols 2018 recruiting class, and they decided to take another big step this year. In theory, Masengil could come back. Maybe she's leaving because she thought there would be a time limit for Green's return next year. At the moment, neither Green nor Masjil are on the program. When it comes to the fact that Evina Westbrook, another five-star guard from a previous class transferred last year to UConn Huskies, a clear trend emerges. At the time, everyone was blaming Westbrook, and given the way he talked about Holly Warlick at the end of last season before the transfer window, it's fair to criticize her. She suggested that Wallick be fired, and when Warlick was fired, she moved on. To engage in something beyond that, the facts are clear. From the moment Warlick was fired, three elite star guards she recruited have moved on. It is worth noting the way Geno Auriemma criticizes the culture of the program during the season and you have to wonder if something is happening that we do not know about. To be fair, maybe they don't like the direction Harper wants to take the program. After all, Harper had the highest team in school history in the past year, and she clearly appreciated the length, starting with two players on the stretch in both and three in Ray Burrell and Renia Davis. Wallick's schemes were much more security. That's certainly possible. It's also possible, as we said, that May could come back. Green, in her Instagram post, noted her actions as well as the actions of the coaches as the reason for her departure, but that was too vague. All we know is that Green and Massiel have superstar potential, and all three of them are gone. Only Jordan Horston, a five-star guard in lady Vos Tennessee's 2019 class, is back. Horston's a star, and Harper's got two guards. But next year, the team may have had Westbrook, Green, Massengill and Horston as the four guards in a two-length rotation. This would be four five stars, one of whom is senior, two of whom are teenagers and one of whom is a sophomore. How epic can it be? Instead, Tennessee Lady Voss will put more pressure on Horston, and they need Jesse Rennie to become the three-point specialist she has picked up. Finally, the lengths of Tamari Key, Emily Saunders, Kasiana Kuskit su and Jayden McCoy are due next year, with Davis and Burrell remaining the star. Next: Vol sports worst affected by COVID-19 end year Harper may be working with this, but it's still important to ask exactly what happened that will prompt Green and Massengill to leave back in the coming days. What about Lady Voss, who was expected to return next year? That's a question he definitely needs to answer. The team has been a contender for national titles for more than thirty years after making every NCAA women's basketball tournament i since the NCAA began sanctioning women's sports in the 1981-82 season. More often than not, it is talked about Lady Voles; The official nickname Volunteers is regularly shortened by many fans of Vols men's and women's teams, and sports media in the U.S. more often refer to Tennessee teams with the abbreviated version. The University considers either Lady Volunteer or Lady Vols acceptable. Lady Vols have won at least 17 times of the SEC championship for the regular season (with the most recent event in 2015), won 17 SEC championships (with the most recent event in 2014), made 18 final fours (with the most recent event in 2008) and won eight national championships (with the most recent event in 2008). Review Lady Volz were coaches by Pat Brett for more than four decades. Under Leifett, Lady Tom won numerous NCAA Finals NCAA titles and four AIAW finals and won eight NCAA titles, including an undefeated season. In addition, Tennessee is the only team to have played in all 36 NCAA tournaments, including 34 Sweet 16s (23 of which were consecutive). [2] Summit teams are known for participating in a exhausting regular-season schedule, often the most difficult in the country to prepare the team for the NCAA Tournament. This difficult schedule has led Tennessee to build a rivalry with many prominent teams, including Texas, Stanford, Louisiana Tech, Star Dominion, and most of all Connecticut. Like other Tennessee teams, the Lady Vols compete in the SEC, which has historically been the most dominant conference in sports. [4] During the conference, Tennessee was a major rival to LSU, Vanderbilt and Georgia, with the series against South Carolina and Mississippi State gaining significance because of the emergence of these schools as national powers. Tennessee won 1,098, with an 84.2% win. The numbers at home are even stronger as Tennessee has won 91% of the hosts and 93.1% of conference hosts. However, most seasons consist of three or four matches. The sport was taken down in 1926 and was not taken again until 1960. Coach JoanNe Crone was 8-10 in two seasons before being replaced by Margaret Hutson, who coached for four years with a 60-18 record. In 1974, Pat Head was announced as the new coach. Before that, Head played basketball for ut-Martin Pacers (now known as the Skyhawks) and had just graduated. Late in the 1970s, in the 1974-75 season, Pat Head took over a 25-2 Lady Oo team. At the start of the season, the Lady Vols won the Eastern District championship for the third year in a row. However, the team finished only 4th overall in the TCWSF (they were 2nd in the last two years) and were not invited to the AIAW women's basketball tournament. After the end of his second season 16-11, he 20 teams with 20 wins, winning back-to-back championships from the region in 2nd. 1978 included Lady Vols, beating the three-time AIAW Delta champion by 20, and Tennessee's top ranking. [7] 1978 saw Lady Vols take part in her first AAV final, where they finished third. Head also recorded his 100th win this season, a 79-66 victory over NC State. Tennessee finished the 1970s by winning its first SEC final and returning to the Final Four, where they finished Star Dominion, 68-53. In 1980, Lady Vols was 25-6, and avenged the loss of her Championship title in the Old Dominion by beating them three times. The team reached the AIAW final for the third year in a row, but earned a runner-up for the second year in a row, losing to Louisiana Technology, 79-59. The coach is known as Pat Padet, who married Tyler, II, in 1980. The 1981-1982 season included the first ever NCAA women's basketball tournament. The Lady Volz are one of 32 teams invited and named two seed in their region. In the region's championship game, lady Volz upset first-round sowing USC 91-90 overtime to advance to the Final Four. They will lose Four games with Louisiana State, which won the tournament. The following season, Lady Pods won the SEC regular-season title, but fell in the SEC tournament to Georgia. Tennessee was invited to the NCAA tournament and received its first 1 seed. Tennessee took the regional championship, but fell to Georgia again, 67-63. A 69-56 victory over St. John's during the Coca-Cola Classic in Detroit. [8] The 1983-1984 season began badly, 6-4. However, The Brumbies rallied from a 22-10 run for their 8th series, which is still going on. Tennessee not only made it to the NCAA Finals for the second time in three tournaments, but also managed to clinch the title. However, Tennessee lost by 11 to USC, which also won the title the previous year. Pat Beckett has won coach of the year award. [2] This season is followed by another 20 winning years in which Tennessee won both the regular SEC title (despite being 4-4) and the tournament title. However, lady volz fell in the NCAA Tournament in Mississippi during the round of 16. Next season is similar to this season – Lady Vols had a decent regular season, playing a major tournament (reaching the final for the second time in three years) but fell before winning the title. In 1986-87, after years of trying, Lady Vols finally broke through and defeated perennial powerhouse Louisiana Technology for its first title, 67-44. Lady Tachsters beat the Lady Vols by 12 ea earlier in the season. Tennessee's Tonya Edwards won the honor of the most outstanding player in the final four. This season, Peake also earned his 300th victory, an 87-66 victory over North Carolina. The following year, the Lady Vols were ready to repeat themselves, with third and top-seeded Tennessee once again qualifying for the Final Four. Louisiana State, however, avenged the championship loss with a nine-point win and went on to win the title. In 1988-89, Lady Vols reached the Final Four for the fourth year in a row and as a single family for the second year in a row. After sending Maryland to 12, Tennessee faces SEC rival Auburn for the title. Auburn lost by two to Louisiana State in the title game the previous year and was given its only loss in the SEC championship game. But that loss was for Tennessee, which won by 15 points over the Tigers. The championship game was similar, and Tennessee took its second title in three years with a 76-60 victory. On record, it was Tennessee's best season since they won 35 games while dropping just two, one to Auburn in the regular season and the other a two-point loss to Texas. In addition, Lady Vols won every NCAA tournament game by at least twelve points. [9] In the final season of Lady Volds was born and won the title. The team, however, fell from one to Auburn in the SEC Championship, then lost in overtime to Virginia in the regional finals, a game shy of making the trip to the Final Four, which takes place in Knoxville. However, this season, he has won his 400th and 70-69 victory over South Carolina on January 25. [8] 1990s Although he did not win either the SEC regular season or the tournament championship, Tennessee received one seed in the 1991 NCAA Tournament. After their win in the regional semifinals against Western Kentucky, Tennessee dispatched Auburn for the second time in three years. In the national semifinals, the Lady Vols beat Stanford, 68-60, to win the opportunity to avenge the previous year's tournament loss against Virginia. As in last year, the game was in overtime, and so was this. Lady Volus tied the match with a 60 by the end of regulation. Tennessee escaped in overtime with a 70-67 victory and its third national title in five years. The following year, the Lady Vols didn't even make it to the regional championship, falling to the same Western Kentucky team they had beaten in the same round of the previous tournament, 75-70. The 1992-93 season was better as Tennessee beat defending champions Stanford twice and started the SEASON for the first time. However, Lady Vols failed to win the tournament title and also fell in the NCAA Tournament in Iowa, losing 72-56 in the regional finals. At the start of the 1993-94 season, The Peake earned his 500th victory, 80-45 at Ohio State on November 21. Tennessee also won both the regular season and tournament conference titles. However, the run of years without a final four stretched to three with a 71-68 loss in the regional semifinals to Louisiana State. Next season will be Tennessee's return to the finals. Tennessee walked the league in the REGULAR SEASON for the third year in a row, but also failed to win the tournament title for the third year in a row. Top seed Lady Vols made her way to her fifth national championship game without being closer than 21. However, in the National Championship, Lady Volds fell to the undefeated UConn Huskies, 70-64. Pat Brett signed high school for Chamika Holdscia. In 1995-96, with freshman Holdsclaw and freshman Michelle Marciniak, Lady Volz won the SEC tournament and made her
