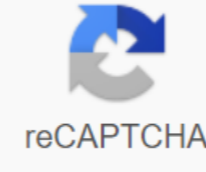

## Seneca high school nj football

The district serves students in grades nine through twelve from Shamong Township, Southampton Township, Tabernacle Township, and Woodland Township. [6] Seneca High School serves students from four communities: Shamong Township, Southampton Township, Tabernacle Township, and Woodland Township. [7] Seneca is the latest of four Lenape Regional High School high schools. The school has been accredited by the United States Association of Colleges and Schools Elementary and Secondary School Commissions since 2008. [4] In the 2018–2019 school year, the school had enrollment of 1,137 students and 109.5 grade teachers (based on FTE), for a student-teacher ratio of 10.4:1. There are 106 students (9.3% of enrollees) eligible for free lunch and 34 (3.0% of students) are eligible for lower-cost lunches. [2] History Seneca opened in 2003 as the district's fourth high school. [8] The school's opening allowed enrollment rates at Lenape High School and Shawnee High School to drop, helping to ease the crowds the school faced. Based on the number of students who chose to switch to Seneca, there will be 150 students in 2005 in the school's first graduating class. [9] The award, recognition and ranking of the School is the 111th-ranked public high school in New Jersey out of 339 schools statewide in the September 2014 New Jersey Monthly magazine cover story in the state of High School, using a new ranking methodology. [10] The school ranked 119th in the state with 328 schools in 2012, having been ranked 135th in 2010 out of 322 enrolled schools. [11] The magazine ranked 134 schools in 2008 out of 316 schools. [12] The school was ranked 258th in the September 2006 issue of the magazine, which surveyed 316 schools across the country 82nd school ranking of 381 public high schools across the state in the 2011 rankings (an increase of 14 positions from the 2010 rankings) based on the combined percentage of students classified as proficient or above proficient in math (89.5%) language arts literacy (95.9%) high school proficiency assessment (HSPA). [14] The Seneca High School Golden Eagles athletics[3] participated in the Olympic Conference (New Jersey), which consisted of public and private high schools located in Burlington County and Camden County and operated under the auspices of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association (NJSIAA). [15] With 945 students in grades 10–12, the school is classified by the NJSIAA for the 2015–16 school year as South Jersey, Group III for most athletic competition purposes, which includes schools with enrollment of 794 to 1,076 students in that class range. [16] The football team competes in the Constitution Division of the 95-team West Jersey Football League superconference[17][18] and is classified by NJSIAA as Group III South for football for 2018-2020. [19] Seneca has many activities available to its students through its sports programs. The school was passed by the moniker Golden Eagle, which narrowly defeated other competing names, such as Sacagawees, Apaches and Squantos. The men's track team trained by Rich Watson, a physics teacher at Seneca, has had such standout success as the 2006 shuttle hurdles team, and record-setting performances by Drew Kanz-Oshea in High Jump: 7'1 (2009), and Michael Maira in pole vault: 15'0 (2008-2010). Both are multiple state champions. The 2006 football team reached the final of Group III South Jersey and lost to Lacey Township High School 12–0. [20] The defeat ended the team's unbeaten season. The team finished 11-1, ranked #1 among South Jersey Large Schools by the Courier-Post. [Citation needed] The 2006 women's tennis team won the Group III South Jersey section championship with a pair of 5–0 victories, beating Ocean City High School in the semifinals and Shawnee High School in the final. [22] The baseball team won the Group III state championship in 2007 (beating CRANFORD High School in the tournament finals) and 2011 (vs. Paramus High School). [23] The baseball team won the 2007 Group III title, beating Ocean Township High School 5–4 in the semifinals and CRANFORD High School 5–2 in the group finale. [24] The team also won the Group III state championship in 2011, beating Paramus High School 12–3 in the tournament final. [25] The women's track team won the Group III state championship of indoor track in 2009 (joint champion) and 2010. [26] The women's track team won the Group III state indoor relay championship in 2009. [27] The 2014 boys' lacrosse team and to the South Jersey Group II state championship game. [28] Attackman Kevin Gray named the 2015 US Lacrosse High School All American. [29] In 2016, Joe Manchio became the school's first individual state champion in wrestling at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City. He won the 106-pound state title, beating Nick Duca of Paulsboro High School 5-4. [30] The field hockey team won the Group II Central Jersey section championship in 2017–19.
