For some, it will be natural to write a declaration of faith. For others, it may make more sense to be creative with video, art, dance or music. This is an example of your declaration of faith: Have fun thinking about how best to express your sense of work God in your life. Here are some suggestions or ideas to consider when working on your declaration of faith:1) Don't start by thinking: Ooome how long should it be? The answer is as long as it takes to tell your story.2) Be Be don't worry about saying the right thing or the wrong thing. Your declaration of faith is not noted or corrected, it is an opportunity to express yourself without fear. 3) Be creative; some believers have written poems, songs or children's books. Some have created a work of art and a written description of what inspired you to create it. Other ideas might be to play a piece of music or share a dance with a written description of what inspired you to create it. Here are some topics to consider as you are working on your declaration of faith. Just choose one to think about and think about as you write your own.1) Let others know: What impact did Jesus have on your life? What does confirmation mean to you? Have you ever been transformed or changed by your faith? 2) Think and share: How do people know you're a Christian? How about changing the world because of your faith? Do the relationships you have reflect your faith? How do you spend your time shows your faith? How do you think God and your faith in Jesus will shape your life in four months (one year, ten years) from now on? 10) What help or support do you need from your classmates, parents, family, pastors, godparents, friends and members of the Church to help you grow in your faith and keep your promises of baptism? Be specific. 11) Where do you need God's help to grow your 12) What do you have to offer others to help them grow in their faith and relationship with Jesus Christ? 13) What feelings or emotions do you have when you think about your faith? Remember that faith is a journey of a lifetime. This declaration of faith is not intended to be a final document, but a sort of diary entry along your lifetime of as you prepare for the confirmation ceremony. The inspiration of the Scriptures of the Holy Spirit protected the original writings from error, and thus obtained a trustworthy and true revelation of God regarding Himself and his works in history. The Trinity: I believe that: There is only one true God, infinite in perfection and love. Father, Son and Holy Ghost are co-eternal and co-equals in power and glory. They are an essence and yet three distinct people, distinguished by what they do and by their relationships within the head of God. Person and Work of Christ: I believe that: Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God who has become fully human through incarnation without ceasing to be fully God. He lived a sinless life and gave himself as a perfect sacrifice for the sins at the cross. He rose physically from the grave and ascended into the sky where He made intercession for all the saints. Hi: I believe: We are all born sinners and under the just condemnation of God. There is nothing we can do to save ourselves. We must place our personal faith and trust in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior in order to be saved. When we place our trust in Christ, God just declares us and adopts us as children. God comes to live in us through the Holy Spirit, and we become a new person, who grows in holiness and persevering in our faith. The Church: I believe: There is a universal Church based on the Lord Jesus Christ and set up by the Holy Spirit. God calls the Church to worship, evangelize, take care of God's people, and be light and salt in the world. Each local church must govern itself in accordance with scriptural guidelines. Eschatology: I believe that: Jesus Christ will visibly return to earth in great power and majesty. The dead will be physically raised and judged. The wicked will suffer eternal punishment and the righteous will reign forever, worshipping and serving God the glory of his presence. Baptism: I believe that: Baptism means the union of the believer with Christ in his death, burial and resurrection. Baptism must follow conversion as a testimony of the new identity of the person in Christ and the entry into The people of God. Baptism must be by immersion in water in the name of the Triune God, Lord's Dinner: I believe: The Lord's Supper commemorates the death of Christ until his return. The elements represent the body and blood of Christ given as a sacrifice for believers on the cross. I worked the visitor center at my church and had more than casual visitor stop and ask about our declaration of faith or what we as a church believed. My church was proactive in taking the time to stop and think about the belief system that led its mission and took this statement and created a document. It helped those of us who worked at the Visitor Centre because it was easy to answer that question. And we were able to give the visitor something to take with them. People want to join a church with which they share common beliefs. The drafting of a declaration of faith not only confirms the ministry's belief system, but also helps church leaders stay on the same page when sharing faith with members. 4 Tips for writing and communicating a declaration of faith 1. Confirm Your Belief The Bible is an amazing book that people quote, read stories and try to learn from. However, people have different beliefs about the Bible. Some believe that these are God-inspired writings with a literal interpretation; others think he is inspired by God, but interpret him symbolically rather than literally. While others believe that it is an ancient text that is a source of moral truths that must be respected. To write your declaration of faith, you must be able to determine who is at the heart of your church's belief system. Here are some questions to start with: What do we believe about the Bible? Are the writings of the Bible God inspired? Are the stories in the Bible true? Are there errors in the text of the Bible? What do we believe in Jesus? Was he the Son of God? Was he raised from the dead? What do we believe in God the Father? What role does the Holy Spirit play? Do we believe in the Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit? What do we believe about heaven and hell? 2. Identify Scripture Support your beliefs If your church has beliefs, there should be scriptures to support those beliefs. Every statement you write should have a corresponding reference to the scriptures to validate that belief. 3. Write your statements starting with we believe Take all the points you believe and write a statement. For example, each statement with, we believe Add Scripture to the bottom of the statement to validate the belief. 4. Share your declaration of faith on your website, mobile app and have a document available at your visitor centre. Weaving your statements into sermon messages to reinforce belief and why your church believes what it does. Communion of Christian Athletes Declaration of Faith We believe that the Bible is the only word of God inspired, trustworthy and true, without error. (John 14:15-26; John 16:5-16; Ephesians 1:13-14) We believe in eternal life, and that through belief in Jesus Christ as the son of God, we spend eternity with the Lord in heaven. We believe that by rejecting Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, we receive eternal suffering in hell. (Matthew 25:31-46, 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18) We believe in the spiritual unity of believers in our Lord Jesus Christ, that all believers are members of his body, the Church. Jesus lived a sinless human life and offered himself as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of all men by dying on a cross. He was born from the dead after three days to demonstrate his power over sin and death. He ascended to the glory of heaven and will return to earth to reign as king of kings and lord of the Lords. Man can never compensate for his sin by self-improvement or good works—only by trusting Jesus Christ, for God's offer of forgiveness can save man from the pain of sin. And while baptism is not necessary for salvation, it is a biblical commandment and demonstrates your love and obedience to Christ. Colossians 2:12; Acts 2:41; Ephesians 2: 8-9; Matthew 28:19-20 About Communion, or the Lord's Supper, is an ordinance given to all believers by Jesus Christ to remember his sacrifice for us and to symbolize the new covenant. The elements of bread, wine or juice are symbols of the broken body of Christ and shed blood. Communion is not a means of salvation.
