Here are four new items, including rumors and leaks surrounding the World of Warcraft movie, Super Smash Bros., and more. 1. Is the World of Warcraft movie trailer leaked? Source: Blizzard A movie based on the hugely popular fantasy game World of Warcraft is scheduled to launch in June 2016. So far we've only caught a glimpse of it in the form of teasers and movie posters. A full trailer for the film is not expected to debut until BlizzCon, which takes place in November. That didn't stop anyone from taking some off-screen footage of what appears to be a trailer for the movie. The videos are removed from the internet, but you may be able to catch a working leak here on Reddit. The video quality leaves a lot to be desired, but it gives you a good sense of what to expect from the apparently CGI-heavy film. Is Shovel Knight coming to Super Smash Bros.? Source: Yacht Club Games Lately, online rumors have surfaced that the grainy hero of the game Shovel Knight could be coming to Super Smash Bros. on Wii. There wasn't much to substantiate the murmur until this week, when Nintendo announced that the Shovel Knight itself would be the first official third party Amiibo figurine. To date, most Amiibo characters represent characters from Super Smash Bros., so it's not a big leap to imagine Shovel Knight entering the game at some point. But for now, Nintendo is just promising that the Shovel Knight Amiibo will work with the Shovel Knight game. Platformer fans may want to keep their fingers crossed. 3. Is voice chat coming to a Nintendo console? Source: Nintendo Nintendo has been in a patent-filing mood lately, and one of those patents, as reported by Destructoid, sounds suspiciously like it has to do with voice chat for either the Wii U or the upcoming NX hardware. Amid a bunch of technical jargon in the patent filing is this golden clog: ... and information processing methods that enable chat between users in distant locations. To date, unlike recent generations of Microsoft and Sony's gaming hardware, Nintendo has never supported voice chat in its gaming systems. And that omission will only become more difficult to overlook as more and more games online multiplayer. For example, the recent Nintendo game Splatoon was widely praised as a unique take on the shooter genre, but criticized for its lack of voice chat. After all, it's hard to coordinate team-based gameplay if you're not talking to your teammates. Voice chat on any Nintendo system would be a welcome addition. 4. Is XCOM: Enemy Unknown coming to PS Vita? Source: 2K Games The turn-based strategy game XCOM: Enemy Unknown was originally launched in 2012 to very positive reviews. In it, you lead and develop military forces as they fight aliens who want to wipe out all of humanity. Since its initial release, the game has been ported to a variety of platforms, from consoles to PC and even mobile. According to a leaked entry on the Entertainment Software Rating Board, an improved edition of the game may well be heading to the PS Vita soon. The game is called X-COM: Enemy Unknown Plus, and it is rated M for Adult, thanks to the image of Blood and Gore, Strong Language, and Violence. This port in particular is unusual because the PS Vita has struggled to get a foothold in the handheld gaming space, and Western publishers have usually been completely ignored. Whiskey Tango Foxtrot Tina Fey's post-30 Rock career continues to roll. Whiskey Tango Foxtrot tells the story of female journalist embedded with the army in Afghanistan, as she navigates the troubled waters of war and dated misogyny. Margot Robbie (Suicide Squad) stars alongside Fey, creating a surprisingly cohesive comic duo. The latest trailer gives us a good look at the two actors' on-screen chemistry and a solid overview of the film's overarching story. 2. Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice DC is just now getting her movie franchise off the ground, kicking things off in March with Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice. The movie pits the Man of Steel against the Dark Knight, as the gladiator contest to end all gladiator matches. The last trailer was widely criticized for giving away what appeared to be the entire movie. For the latest teaser, however, we get more action and less spoiled story, leading us to wonder why this isn't the one Warner released in the first place. 3. House of Cards, Season 4 House of Cards is a show that has seen its fair share of ups and downs. The first two seasons were in dramatic stories, marred by a disappointing third that left many fans scratching their heads. More focused on Frank Underwood's marital marital then the political intrigue that originally made it great, it was a substandard effort by a show that set the bar high in its early years. Season 4 seems like a welcome return to form based on what we see in the first trailer, so here's hoping it can deliver on that promise. 4. Tom Hiddleston's high rise star is one that seems to rise with every movie he is attached to. High Rise is his latest project, in an Eyes Wide Shut-like thriller about a living community that has gone wrong. The trailer paints a picture of a movie that equals social satire and horror, mixing all sorts of different tones together into a single story. 5. Broad City, Season 3 In recent years, Comedy Central has become ground zero for innovative, genre-bending satire. Shows like Key and Peele and Inside Amy Schumer are widely considered one of the best comedies on TV, and an argument can be made for Broad City as well. Season 3 begins next week, and the latest trailer teases at all the madness we've come to expect from Ilana Glazer and Abbi Jacobson. A new short film now online is aimed squarely at that second group-one that keeps trailers sacred. The History of the Movie Trailer is a 15-minute video that traces the evolution of the subject of the silent movie era to today's blockbusters. In doing so, the video positions movie trailers as a unique medium that is halfway through the ad and cinematic art form that is occasionally as impressive as the film it promotes. So it's strange to think that trailers were initially self-produced by theaters until the 1960s, when studios took over. Once you see how trailers first started, it can change your perspective on today's trailers, some of which are considered events expected months in advance. And yes, of course, the video begins with those three words, In a World, which are so synonymous with trailer narration that they served as the title of Lake Bell's recent film about voiceover artists. Apple iMovie makes it easy to create movies and movie trailers on your macOS and iOS devices: choose a genre, complete a simple outline, and choose your movie clips. We used a clip of Santa Claus Conquers the Martians, a low-budget sci-fi film from the early years to show you to take your iMovie trailer to the next level. Instructions in this article article to iMovie 10 and iMovie '11. Please note that iMovie 10 is more recent than iMovie '11. Whether you're an aspiring filmmaker, posting your creations on YouTube or Vimeo, or working on a school project, trailers help entice your potential viewers. The most difficult or at least most time consuming part of making a movie trailer is finding the right images to use. iMovie offers 29 templates to get you started. These templates include original movie scores, movie studio logos, and customizable cast names and credits. Animated drop zones help you choose the videos and photos you want to use in your trailer. We used a clip from an old movie for this example. But you'll find plenty of copyright-free movies on the Internet Archive website to experiment with or use one of your own movies to make a movie trailer. If you've already imported the movie you want to use for your trailer, select it from the library. If you didn't, follow these steps: Import the media file you want to use in your trailer: If the images you want to use on your computer are on your computer, select File > Import Media. If the images you want to use are in iCloud, select File > Import iMovie iOS projects. Browse to your media file and select Import Selected. iMovie imports the file or files you selected into your iMovie library. Depending on the size of the file, this process may take several minutes. Under iMovie Library, select your movie. Now you're ready to get started with your movie trailer. Choose from 29 iMovie templates (or genres), including Action, Adventure, Blockbuster, Documentary, Friendship, Romance, Romantic Comedy, Sports, Spy, Supernatural, and Travel. There are also some more esoteric choices, such as Bollywood, Coming of Age, Film Noir, Indie and Retro. How could Apple have left out bad sci-fi, you ask? To be honest, there is a Supernatural template, but we have selected the Adventure template for our trailer. Because each template contains different information, templates are not interchangeable. Once you select a template and start working, you're committed to that template. If you want to see your trailer in a different template, you'll need to recreate your trailer from scratch. To choose and apply a template for your movie trailer, follow these steps: Select New Trailer from the File menu. In the Create window, select the trailer template you want to use, and then select Create. When you hover over a template, the Play icon appears. Select Play to see an example of a trailer in that template. Three tabs appear below the trailer: Storyboard and Shot List. The fields on each tab sheet vary based on the template you chose. Follow these steps: Select the Overview tab to give you the details your movie trailer needs. The tab is divided into four sections: Name and DateCastStudioCredits Each field information. If you leave a field blank, it will be returned to the default text. In the Name and Date section, enter a movie name and release date. Enter a name for the movie star in the cast section. Then, in the Gender Male or Female list, select. In the Studio section, enter a name for your studio. In the Logo Style list, select how your studio's logo appears in the trailer. When you select a logo style, such as Snowy Mountain Peak, your logo will appear with that theme above. You change the logo style and all other information on this tab at any time, but you don't change the logo. In the Credits section, enter information about your production crew and movie score. Select the Storyboard tab. A storyboard is a visual map of the sequences of your film. Here, edit the text on the screen and select clips from your movie that fit the storyboard. For example, the second part of the storyboard for the Adventure template is set for an action photo and a medium shot. Add a video clip for each placeholder in the storyboard by following the following steps: Select a Placeholder in the Navigation Pane, under Libraries, select a photo or video. Don't worry about the length of a clip: iMovie adjusts it to the allotted time. If you change your mind about a clip you chose for a placeholder, delete it or drag another video clip or photo to the same placeholder. If you do this, you will automatically replace the previous video clip or photo. Select the Shot List tab. Here's the clips you've added to your movie trailer, organized by type, such as Action or Medium. On this tab or on the Storyboard tab, change one of your selections. To watch your movie trailer, select Play under the video window. The Play icon plays the trailer in the video window. To view the trailer full screen, select Full Screen; To close full-screen mode, press the Esc key on the keyboard. If you're happy with your movie trailer, you can share it by selecting the trailer in the Projects view and then selecting File > Share. Sharing options include email, YouTube, Facebook and Vimeo.
