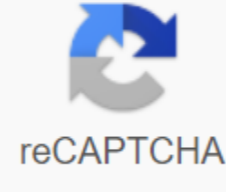

In addition to the core trio, the Astronomical Tower has Slughorn, Lavender Brown, Draco Malfoy, Neville Longbottom, and Luna Lovegood minifigures. No Dumbledore, which is weird considering the astronomical tower is where... Also. Know. Hedwig One for Owl-G. Don't be blinded by a small picture, this possible Hedwig has a wingspan of 13 inches and stands tall on her screen. Putting Harry's fallen feathered friend on the display stand somehow attracts the possibility that Harry came back and had it stuffed, doesn't it? Is the wizard moving like their pictures? Yikes. Unlike other new sets coming up, this one focuses on the events of Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets. Dobby's doing everything he can to keep Harry from coming to Hogwarts by ruining the cake for dinner, Ron getting rid of the rescue in his father's flying Ford Anglia and Petunia's terrible taste in upholstery. The attack on Burrow The Weasley's charming, crooked house was the target of a deadly attack in Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince, but for the most part this series looks like the usual Burrow. A fan can build and play through scenes of gentle magician familiarity if they want, but the set also comes with Fenrir Greyback and Bellatrix Lestrange And a few optional flames to simulate the all-enthuling battle of good and evil in Molly's kitchen. Forbidden Forest: Umbridge's Encounter OK! The highlight of this set is a gigantic Grawp figure and centaur (which would also fit neatly into an astronomical tower set if you choose to be one of them a star-gethd-divination Professor Firenze). It appears that the next book in the Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix series may not hit the bookstore until 2002, and the first film will not be released until November. You have two options: Go crazy or read this article. Like many entrepreneurs, Harry Potter author J.K. Rowling started out in modest excavations and with big dreams. She had to retype the entire manuscript for [the first] book because she couldn't afford to be photocopied, notes Jeff Blackman, a business growth specialist in Glenview, Illinois and author of The Successors. Now more than 30 million [Harry Potter] books have been sold. It's an extraordinary witness to [her] perseverance and passion. Rowling studied French and literature, not business, in college. But for a few years she worked in the Chamber of Commerce in Manchester, England. Maybe something's rocked, because young Potter can teach us how to take care of our businesses. Book one: Harry Potter and the Wizarding Stone Book Two: Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets Book Three: Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban Book Four: Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire Book One: Harry Potter and the Sorcerer Stone Plot: A decade-old Harry Potter orphan lives in a closet under the stairs in the house of his insecure relatives, G.i.g.i.g.d. Dursleys and their stunned son, Dudley. Harry learns he has the blood of a magician and has to go to the train station on Kings Cross 93 4 to travel to Hogwarts, the school of wizards. There, first, Harry with friends. Face the enemy, Lord Voldemort, too. Business lesson No 1: You understand the different cultures in your company. On Harry's first day in Hogwarts, he and other first-year students meet Sorting Hat, who tells the audience: Try me and I'll tell you where I should be. And I wouldn't even have Harry Potter. When you're trying to create a work environment that makes people enjoy coming to work, it should be treating people as people at the top of the list. Read Manage your employee better to learn how to do it. Just as entrepreneurs rarely stick to the 9-5 regime. Harry breaks the clock to go after school and fight evil. When he flies on a broomstick against orders, he is not really punished, but rewarded with a rewarding place in the Quidditch team. For? Business owners often fire someone because it's the easiest [route] without realizing that it creates an environment where people are afraid and unproductive. Hogwarts includes everything. If you don't make it, you're not grounded. Poor Neville [one of the students] difficult but never quite makes it and is still part of the group. The focus is on how he contributes rather than how not to. Book three: Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban Conspiracy: Our Hero Returns to Hogwarts, hoping to avoid the sweat of the misplaced killer of Sirius Black. Business lesson No. 5: Network work. This theme runs throughout the series, but seems best illustrated in this installment. Harry and Hermione are good at the contacts that pay off. Before the book begins, Hermione has agreed with one of the teachers to take three classes at a time (via time travel) and get on academically ahead. But Harry is the king of the net. In the Chamber of Secrets, he meets Dobby, a house elf who later saves his life with tips in the Fire Cup. In Azkaban, Fred and George Weasley (Ronnie's brothers and Harry's classmates) provide Harry with a map of Hogwarts showing where individuals are at any given moment. In Goblet, Harry helps his opponent Cedric Diggor during the Triwizard Tournament; Later, Cedric returns the favor. If it wasn't for his contacts, Harry would have been done a long time ago. Do you need to brush for your networking skills? Let Link tell you what you need to know to meet and greet the best of them. Business lesson No. 6: When necessary, abandon the business plan.
