It is he who, in part with Mello's help, finds and shows evidence that Light is Kira. His real name is Nate (Neito Rib?). Mello (Avg., Mero?) Mello is, like Near, one of the candidates to succeed L and also grew up in Wammy's House. His special sign is that he always eats chocolate, a sign that will be taken up by Near at the end of manga in his tribute. Naturally carried away, his goal is to surpass L and Near. His real name is Mihael Keehl, Remu?) Rem is a rather serious and intelligent female god of death. She is very close to Misa, as she has feelings and sacrifices herself for herself in the midst of anime/manga. She is a very calm person and she knows how to keep her cool in any situation. Tsugumi Oba says that Near, at the end of the manga, invites each of us to participate in his reflection [on justice] when he criticizes Kira's actions. Death Note then leaves the audience with the guestion What is justice? Good and evil light is persuaded to act in the name of good since it aims to become the god of an ideal world because it is redacted from all crime. But at the same time, the method used to achieve this utopia is serial murder, and the murder of innocent people who dare to stand in his way. A paradox that can again be interpreted as a desire to relativize these two antinomic notions. The screenwriter, Tsugumi Oba, is more absolute: while defending himself for wanting to convey the slightest ideology or philosophical message, he points out that in his personal capacity he sees light as absolute evil, adding that I am not necessarily better. Beyond that, the issue of corruption of human nature by power is addressed: Light, which initially saw death note as a means of building its utopian world, gradually slipped toward the obsession of becoming a god, to the point, at the end of manga, to sink into madness. Cover-up The detective known as L communicates publicly only in the form of the challenges for the chal arrested, the others not to reveal themselves to Kira. Religion It is also addressed because Light believes he is the god of his new world. In addition, in the animated version, L Light cleans his feet shortly before he dies due to the trick involving Misa and Rem. Light's involvement will therefore be L's Judah.
