Park for Major League Wrestling in the United States and Lucha Libre AAA Worldwide (AAA) in Mexico. He is best known worldwide as La Parka, especially for many years in the promotion of American World Championship Wrestling. He has worked for all major and many minor wrestling promotions in Mexico, and has also participated in many wrestling routes in Japan. He is a three-time world heavyweight champion who once won the world heavyweight championship, IWC World Hardcore and IWL World Heavyweight. Tapia was forced to change the name of the ring from La Parka to L.A. Park (short for La Auténtica Park; The Original Park) in early 2003, when AAA owner Antonio Peña confirmed his copyright to the character La Parka, banning Tapia from using the name when he promoted his own version of the grip (the new La Parka AAA is commonly known as La Parka II among fans). In March 2010, L.A. Park returned to AAA and began the storyline with La Parka AAA, the original pit and the new La Parka and won the rights to be again known as La Parka. However, the result was later kicked out. Tapia's uncle changed his character to Super Park after Tapia gained worldwide fame. Several other members of Tapia's family are or have been professional wrestlers, including his sons El Hijo de L.A. Park and L.A. Park Jr., brother El Hijo de Cien Caras, nephew Volador Jr. and great nephew Flyer, among others. The L.A. Park family is referred to in Mexico as La Familia Real. Professional wrestling career Adolfo Tapia's career debuted in 1982 at the age of 16, using his real name. Later He fought as the masked El Gringo in Monclova, Coahuila and as El Minero in Mexico. Tapia lost his first Lucha de Apuesta, or bet match, to Climax II and was forced to take off his El Minero mask and reveal his real name, according to Lucha libre traditions. In 1988, he changed his ring character to El Asesino de Tepito (Tepito's Assassin), a redhead (villain) he used in 1988. In 1988, he lost to Asesino de Tepito against Astro de Oro. After losing his mask, Tapia took on a character called Prince's Island, a character he used until 1992. On November 21, 1987, he lost his principe mask to El Hijo del Santo as Principe mask, he began working as a masked Invasor del Norte I, and also continues to accept bookings as Prince's Island. The double booking ended on June 26, 1991, when Stuka unmasked the character Invasor del Norte, revealing that Tapia was playing both characters. Asistencia Asesoría y Administración (1992-1996) In 1992, Antonio Peña founded a new wrestling promotion called Asistencia Asesoría y Administración (AAA), signing tapia at the start of his contract. Peña came up with the idea to repack Tapia as La Parka (a revised spelling of La Parca, Spanish for the Reaper, a character who wore a full bodysuit and mask that resembled a skeleton like those used in Mexico's Day of the Dead celebrations. The character was an almost instant success with fans, the photos combined with Tapia's charisma and extravagant actions in the ring made him a big crowd favorite, despite La Parka initially being a rude character. One of his initial feuds was against Lizmark, which resulted in a fight for the Mexican National Light Heavyweight Championship at the inaugural Triplemania AAA event, in which Lizmark defended his title against La Parka. In August 1993, La Parka won his first championship, defeating Lizmark for the www. The title lasted until October 23, 1993, when Lizmark won the title. On June 20, 1994, La Parka defeated Lizmark for the WWA title. La Parka was one of the wrestlers who worked on When Worlds Collide, a joint pay-per-view AAA/World Championship Wrestling (WCW) show where he worked with Jerry Estrada and Blue Panther, losing to Pegasus Kid, 2 Cold Scorpio and Tito Santana. On September 9, 1994, La Parka won the Mexican light heavyweight championship, which he chased for more than a year when he defeated Lizmark for the title, ending the story line between them. La Parka won the title days of losing him to Jerry Estrada. In 1995 and 1996, La Parka played twice in the Mexican light heavyweight division, and in 1996 lost his belt to Pimpinel Escarlata. [2] La Parka won the World Championship Wrestling (1996-2000) when WCW began using many AAA wrestlers for their cruiserweight division in the middle to the end of 1996. La Parka often fought with other AAA Luchadors such as Juventud Guerrera or Super Caló and often collaborated with Psicosis (known in WCW as Psychosis). Because of his more comedic style, La Parka stood out from the rest of the AAA wrestlers, who were generally high aileles. He was called president of WCW due to the fact that he often wore a chair in the ring, played air guitar during his entrances and generally used it both in matches and in post-match celebrations. At one point he and Psychosis were led by Sonny Onoo, although the band did not achieve much success as a unit. He later abandoned Onoo as a manager and began competing with Psychosis and Disco Inferno. While La Parka often struggled with Monday's WCW Nitro performance, his ppv appearances were rare. On July 13, he and Psychosis and Villano IV faced WCW Bash on PPV Beach, losing to Héctor Garza, Juventud Guerrer and Lizmark Jr. La Park's greatest achievement at WCW did not even concern Adolfo Tapia. One night in a match against Randy Savage, La Parka suddenly made Dallas Page's Diamond finisher, Diamond Cutter on savage and gained pinfall. After the game, La Parka unmasked to show that it was Savage's diamond rival Dallas Page under the hood, using a ruse to get back to Savage. A few weeks later, Savage fought the real La Parka, defeating him for a little revenge. In October 1998, La Parka became part of eddie Guerrero's Latino World Order (LWO), a group that also included Psychosis, Juventud Guerrera, Villano V, El Dandy, Silver King, Héctor Garza, Damián 666 and the reluctant Rey Mysterio Jr. The group competed mainly with Konnan and Perry Saturn. In January 1999, Guerrero was injured in a car accident and the LWO group was subsequently abandoned. In late 1999, Vince Russo and Ed Ferrara took over the creative part of WCW, the duo had Ferrara's voice dub English on the intercom, while La Parka interviewed in Spanish. This often ended with a confused Gene Okerlund exclaiming, What the hell was that?! Including. that La Parka was a fan of Skeletor from Masters of the Universe and other comments. During this time, he teamed up with Kaz Hayashi, a Japanese wrestler who also used the comedic grip of the voice over and called La Parka the Skull Captain. La Parka left WCW in 2000. Second La Parka (1996-2003) See also: La Parka (AAA) While La Parka Jr. since late 1996 and forward, earning La Parka popularity in the states. Initially, Peña and La Parka did not argue over the use of the name La Parka because Tapia worked mainly for various independent American promotions. He changed his name to La Parka Jr. and had a court order that prevented Tapia from being accounted for as La Parka in Mexico, claiming that Peña had copyright to the character. The legal battle between Tapia and AAA forced Tapia to change its name to L.A. ParK, short for La Autentica ParK (K pronounced Ka). In the years that followed, the two parties submitted different legal requests for their copyright claims. For a time, Tapia could not appear on television in the black and white outfit he wore for years. This led to tapia wearing a modified version of the outfit in other color combinations such as black and yellow, white and black or even a variety of silver. He had previously modified La Park's original costume to distinguish himself from the AAA version by adopting a mask that looked less like a skull and more like Darth Maul's face from Star Wars: Episode I – The Phantom Menace. Later, Tapia returned once again to wear black and white outfits. Consejo Mundial de Lucha Libre (2003-2008) In 2003, L.A. ParK started working for CMLL, although it was often kept out of their television broadcasts due to ongoing legal battles with Peña and AAA. In January 2004, L.A. Park teamed up with shocker to defeat Los Guerreros del Infierno (Último Guerrero and Rey Bucanero) and won the CMLL World Tag Team Championship. [18] L.A. Park challenged Último Guerrero to defend the CMLL World Light Heavyweight Championship against him at the 71st Anniversary Show CMLL, a match in which L.A. Park lost two relegations to one. Tapia worked for CMLL in more places without being reserved for CMLL for a long time. During one of those periods off again, L.A. Park won the Mexican National Light Heavyweight Championship for the fourth time when they defeated El On October 15, 2004, he became one of two wrestlers to win the title four times. In early 2007, La Parka returned to CMLL full-time and began a storyline with Perro Aguayo Jr., a storyline that saw the two face off in a singles match at Sin Piedad in 2007, where L.A. Park won by disqualification after Los Perros del Mal interfered in the match. The story ended in mid-2008 without a satisfactory end, instead L.A. Park began competing with Dr. Wagner Jr. Initially, L.A. Park was tecnico in contention, but fan reactions began to turn against L.A. Park when the CMLL crowd began betting on Dr. Wagner Jr. This led to a double turn between competitors. The game at Rudo L.A. Park was disqualified several times for excessive violence, including for a match at the CMLL 75th Anniversary Show, which L.A. Park lost to disqualification. In the months following the show's anniversary, both L.A. Park and Dr. Wagner Jr. left CMLL. [22] Independent track (since 2000) LA Parka in 2007 While working for CMLL La Parka could also fight for independent promotions in Mexico, usa and Japan. During his time on the independent circuit, L.A. Park developed a long-running and highly intense rivalry with El Hijo del Santo and Blue Demon, creating a rivalry that foreshadowed various shows throughout Mexico and included three of the most famous masks of the 1980s. Tapia played for Total Nonstop Action Wrestling (TNA) as both L.A. Park and La Parka. He fought in the glove for gold for the TNA X Division Championship in one of the weekly PPV TNA and then appeared in the next X Division glove match at the inaugural monthly PPV Victory Road TNA, losing in both cases. On May 7, 2005, L.A. Park made his debut for Revolucha's Detroit's Independent Wrestling Revolution (IWR), working with the American Kickboxer in a loss to El Hijo del Santo, culminating on October 29, 2005 in Revolucha 2: Dia de los Muertos in lucha en la Jaula (steel cage match). Both Park and Santo wore torn masks and bled profusely during the match. In February 2006, L.A. Park began a fierce feud with then IWR champion Conrad Kennedy III (CK3). On August 27, 2006, at Brawl at the Hall 6, he defeated CK3 to defend the IWR Heavyweight Championship on October 14, 2007 at Revolucha 4. After leaving CMLL in 2008, L.A. Park worked regularly for the newly launched Perros del Mal shows also allowed Tapia to help his son start wrestling. Originally, Tapia's son fought as Spirit without relationship between L.A. Park and Black Spirit. In early 2010, Tapia officially acknowledged that Black Spirit was his son, announcing that he would fight as El Hijo de L.A. Park (Son of L.A. Park) since then. In 2011, Tapia was part of Lucha Libre USA as LA Park. Xtreme Latin American Wrestling (2004, 2009-2010) L.A. Park won the Xtreme Latin American Wrestling (X-LAW) Heavyweight Championship [25] on Friday, April 9, 2004. The fight was a fight for the vacancy title against Rey Misterio in an x-law show co-promoted from Baja Stars Wrestling at Auditorio Fausto Gutiérrez Moreno, in Tijuana. In the following years, X-LAW was closed, leaving L.A. Park as the last X-LAW heavyweight champion. In 2009, X-LAW owner Ernesto Ocampo, publisher of Súper Luchas Magazine, decided to resume promotion, [26] promoting the return show on August 8, 2009, headed by Tapia v. The Sandman for the title. Tapia praised the program in Ocampo magazine and on its website a week in advance as a return to hardcore ECW style. The next concert took place on March 20, 2010, and L.A. Park defeated Sabu after Super Parka, hit Tapia with a steel chair, fell on the sabu to win. Super Parka then took the belt and ran away with it. This storyline is unresolved because after Tapia's transition to AAA, in subsequent X-LAW shows, Sabu was promoted to star of X-LAW. On October 30, 2010, Sabu defeated Damián 666 to win the Xtreme Latin American Wrestling's International Championship. [31] But there is no word on the fate of heavyweights. Back to AAA (2010-2013) La Parka during wrestling on March 12, 2010, during rey de Reyes in 2010, Dorian, would take control of the promotion and that he would help a little. This help turned out to be L.A. Park, the original La Parka return to AAA after years and years of legal battles and threats. After unveiling himself at the show, L.A. Park announced that he was siding with Konnan and Dorian Roldan against crook Parka. In order to maintain the illusion that L.A. Park didn't really work for AAA, L.A. Park claimed to have come to AAA to beat La Parka, and since he had already done so, he wasn't sure if he wanted to return to AAA at all. However, L.A. Park returned to the AAA ring because he had another fight with La Parka on their April 18 television tape. During the event, La Parka challenged I.a. Park for the match in Triplemania XVIII, under every order that the original Parka wanted. On April 30, 2010, L.Park accepted La Park's challenge for a match in Triplemania XVIII. At the AAA press conference on May 12, 2010, it was announced that the match between the two would be the name La Parka. At Triplemania XVIII, L.A. Park faced La Parka in the main event. At the end of the match Park used a tombstone piledriver, a move that is illegal in Lucha Libre. Joaquin Roldan entered the ring when L.A. Park tried to use a steel chair on La Parka. When L.A. Park teased using a chair on Joaquin instead, Dorian entered the ring to protest, but was pushed by Park, who then hit Joaquin with a chair, which caused Dorian to turn him on, hitting him with a steel chair three times. Halloween and Damián 666 with Perros del Mal wrestling promotion run into the ring chasing Dorian Roldan away. They then drag L.A. Park atop La Parka before rúdo referee Hijo del Tirantes hopes for three to give LA Park a victory. After the bell rings the rest of Los Perros del Mal, (including the son of Park Hijo de L.A. Park) came to the ring to celebrate with LA Park, which won the rights to the name La Parka. After a few minutes, a group of AAA wrestlers led by Octagón came to the ring and, combined with the arena security, managed to remove Los Perros del Mal from the ring. La Parka was taken from the ring on a stretcher, not moved since L.A. Park used a piledriver. A little later it was announced that the results of the match had been thrown out due to interference by Los Perros del Mal, but the next morning it was confirmed that Tapia had indeed won and would now be known as La Parka once again. [37] However, on June 10. AAA announced that it would respect the Mexico City Boxing and Wrestling Commission's decision to throw out the match and, as a result, both L.A. Park and La Parka would retain their names. Park said that for him, the Triplemania match was a source of pride for him, not names, not that he proved who the real La Parka is, regardless of the names they now go through. On July 4, La Parka defeated L.A. Park in a rematch, L.A. Park then adaptede to Dorian Oldan's La Sociedad, a superstable consisting of La Legión Extranjera. La Milicia. Los Maniacos and the attacking stables of Los Perros del Mal. [42] On December 5 at Guerra de Titanes L.A. Park defeated El Mesías to become the number one contender for the AAA Mega Championship, although in the same case his La Sociedad stablemate El Zorro became the new champion by beating Dr. Wagner Jr. [44][45] In February 2011, another title shot was awarded to Charly Manson to set up an injury match between Park and Konnan. On February 28, Park took part in the Rey de Reyes tournament in 2011 to cement his place as the number one contender, defeating Dr. Wagner Jr., Halloween and Nicho el Millonario in their semifinal match. During the match. During the match to his promotion to the tournament, but instead the interference dispersed Wagner Jr. and cost him the match. On March 18 at Rey de Reyes, Park was eliminated from the tournament final after a double-calculation match against rival El Mesías. The following month, when El Zorro caught the wind in park's intentions to challenge for his title, seemingly began interfering in Park matches under his old mask, costing him back-to-back multi-man tag team matches on April 27 and 30 TV tapings, escalating dissension in La Sociedad, eventually leading to the group's inclusion of El Zorro, after which it was revealed that the masked striker was charly Manson and it was all cibernético's plan to cause desens in the ranks of La Sociedad. [48] [49] On May 18. Park accepted el Mesías' challenge at Mask vs. Hair on Triplemanía XIX. [51] Park added to the match stakes, announcing that he would retire if he lost his mask. On July 31 at Verano de Escándalo, Park faced the Stable of La Sociedad and the new AAA Mega Champion Jeff Jarrett and Dr. Wagner Jr. in a three-way title match, and Konnan stated that Park's job was to ensure that the title remained with Jarrett. After Wagner Jr. was eliminated from the match, Jarrett pinned Park to retain his title when someone disguised himself as El Zorro and hit him with a guitar. [56] This person was later revealed as a member of La Sociedad Chessman, whom Konnan sent to interfere in the match to make Park follow El Zorro instead of further chasing the title of his stablemate. After turning on Jeff Jarrett and eliminating him from the match, Park was again attacked by a masked El Zorro, which led to Electroshock defeating him to win the match. Héroes Inmortales also saw La Parka turn on AAA and join La Sociedad, leading to him and L.A. Park building an unlikely tag team on December 1 when they defeated Dr. Wagner Jr. and Electroshock in the main event. On December 16 at Guerra de Titanes, Park defeated Dr. Wagner Jr. for the AAA Latin American Championship. The rivalry between Park and Jeff Jarrett continued on March 18, 2012 in Rey de Reyes, where Jarrett's intervention eliminated Park from the Rey de Reyes tournament. During the main event of the evening, Park in turn cost Jarrett the AAA Mega Championship in his match against El Mesías. On April 30, Park officially left La Sociedad and joined AAA to continue his rivalry with Electrochock as Joaquín Roldán in Hair vs. Hair, they faced Dorian Roldán (Jeff Jarrett and Kurt Angle) with Roldáns' hair on the line. Electroshock won the match for his team, pinning Angle, forcing Dorian to sedusten his head bald. However, after the game, rudos overpowered technicos and shaved Joaquín bald. April 23, 2013 Park announced that he had left AAA, citing a desire to be free. Even after leaving AAA, he continued to promote the possibility of lucha de Apuestas' match against Dr. Wagner Jr., possibly promoted by El Hijo del Santo Todo X el Todos (TxT). On June 16, Park appeared at AAA at Triplemanía XXI to present Blue Demon Jr. the AAA Latin American Championship belt and officially announce his departure from the promotion. Back to CMLL (2014, 2015) L.A. Park in the ring during a show in Cuernavaca on October 31, 2014 during the CMLL bit his son. At that time, no one took up the challenge. The following week, it was announced that Park was not joining CMLL, but was there only to promote the partnership between CMLL and the new independent Elite League promotion. that she severed ties with Park for violating CMLL rules by insulting the Arena México crowd. [69] His second return to AAA (2018-present) on June 5, 2018, L.A. Park was revealed as one of the unexpected players in the AAA Poker de Ass (Poker Aces) match at Triplemanía XXVI, betting his mask against Psycho Clown, El Hijo del Fantasma and Pentagón Jr. in the show's main match. Park won the battle by winning the Hijo del Fantasma mask. On July 21, 2018, at AAA vs. Elite, L.A. Park teamed up with Electroshock and Puma King as representatives of the Elite League, defeating Team AAA (Psycho Clown, El Hijo del Fantasma and Rey Wagner). In April 2018, L.A. Park was announced to return to MLW as a member of the Dorado Promociones, headed by Salina de la Renta. He continued to compete with the two, as well as other men such as Sami Callihan and Mance Warner, before losing to the Pentagon and Fenix in November for the MLW Rise of the Renegades. Park received a push in early 2019 after winning his second MLW Riot, winning another title against mlw world heavyweight champion. On September 15, 2019, Salina de la Renta announced that L.A. Park would take on the title of Battle Riot against Jacob Fatu in saturday night superfight. [76] Tapia's personal life works with her son, El Hijo de LA Park Adolfo Tapia is part of an extended wrestling family that also includes his brother Eustacio Jiménez Ibarra, who fought as El Hijo de Cien Caras (Son of Cien Caras) before his death on November 29, 2010, and his son, who fights as El Hijo de L.A. Park (Son of L.A. Park). Three of Adolfo Tapia's parents are also wrestlers working under the super park ring, Johnny Ibarra and Desalmado. Super Parks' son, Tapia's cousin, fights for CMLL as Volador Jr. in January 2019. Park introduced L.A. Park and become a professional wrestler. Until then, he worked under the ring name Último Sadox. It is unclear whether L.A.
