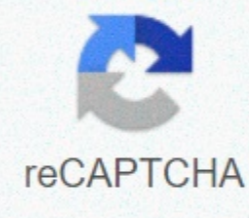




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Chapter 4 great gatsby audio

On this occasion Gatsby offers Nick his long-awaited biography, pledging that he is the son of wealthy parents in the Midwest and that he attended Doubting Gatsby's way of saying it, Nick wonders, If there wasn't something a little sinister about him after all, (69). But Gatsby continues to detail how all Allied governments honored his achievements after his elevation to the majors in World War I. Gatsby's oxford-era war medal and photography presentation suddenly seems to convince the story of Nick's peers. At lunch, Gatsby introduces Nick to Meyer Wolfsyem. After told a story about the brutal murder of one of his associates, Wolfsiem accidentally asks Gatsby if Nick exists to negotiate some unnamed business. Gatsby quickly corrects him and mysteriously answers. This is not a man (75). At the end of lunch, Nick looks at Tom Buchanan and introduces Gatsby, who acted embarrassingly when Nick turned his head and quickly became unremarkable. The rest of Chapter 4 is devoted to explaining Gatsby's hasty exit, as Jordan Baker repeats the story Gatsby told her to Nick. Five years ago, Jordan and Daisy Buchanan knew each other in Louisville. One day, Jordan saw her in the car with an unknown lieutenant who looked like Daisy in the way all the young girls wanted to be seen one day (80). The young lieutenant's name, Jordan, reveals that he was Jay Gatsby. But by the following year Daisy was engaged to Tom Buchanan. On the night of the bridal dinner, Jordan, the wedding bridesmaid, found Daisy drunk and crying, clutching a mysterious letter and declaring that she had changed her mind. Despite the outburst, she married Tom Buchanan 'without shivering' and began with a three-month trip to the South Seas (81). Jordan continues when Nick asks if he knew Gatsby, who lives in West Egg, Buchanan's party says Daisy heard Gatsby's name for the first time in four years. Jordan then claims Gatsby bought his West Egg mansion for the sole purpose of crossing the bay from Daisy's house - with a green light at the end of the dock - with an East Egg. Using Jordan as his messenger, Gatsby demands that Nick invite Daisy to his house and then allow Gatsby to stop by and meet her.
