However, when you start, you can do most of the gardening with just a few basic things. Shear is a multifunctional cutter. It comes in a wide range of shapes and sizes. This convenient tool can cut twigs, small branches, roots and leaves. The most important aspect is the sharpness of the tool: the sharp shear cuts precisely and cleanly without damaging the tree. Concave branch cutter: When the branch you want to remove grows from the trunk, you need a concave (rounded) tool to be able to cut into the trunk. If you do not cut into the trunk when removing the branch, the tree will form a swollen scar as it heals. Wire cutter: Although it might be difficult to find an inexpensive bonsai tool that involves a wire cutter, it is an essential tool because you need to cut the wire used to form the trunk and branches of the tree. If you use a shear cutter or concave branches to cut the wire, you will destroy the sharp edge of the tool. In addition, the rounded end on the bonsai wire cutter means that you will not inadvertently damage the tree while cutting the wires. Potting stick: If your kit doesn't come with a stainless steel potting stick to work in the soil around the roots of your tree, that's fine. Instead, you can use bamboo sticks. Other tools Tools in the previous section are enough to get you but if you have more concrete tools, you will be better prepared to try more advanced bonsai techniques. Here are some other tools that might be handy depending on your level of expertise. Leaf cutter: If you want to remove leaves from the bonsai tree to stimulate growth, you can use any cutting tool in your kit. However, the leaf cutter is specially designed for work, which facilitates the decoloth of your tree. Root cutter: When the root ball of your bonsai tree needs to be thinned a little, you can use shear for work. However, since the roots are firmer than the branches, and when cutting you can accidentally catch a piece of soil or gravel, the task is more easily accomplished if you have a root cutter in the toolkit. Doorknob cutter: If you have not used a concave branch cutter to remove the branch, eventually the swollen lump will grow where the branch used to be. These heavy bulbous forms are called doorknobs. The button cutter gives you a second chance, allowing you to bite deeper into the tree, remove the button and leave the wound that can heal flush with the tree instead of producing another doorknob. Jin Pliers: Jin is a branch that is bare. Jin pliers allow you to crunch the growing outer layer of the branch (a layer of cambium) to easily remove it, leaving behind a bare branch. This technique can also be used on the trunk to remove bark. Jin carving tools: Instead of a set of pliers, you can remove a layer of cambium of the tree with a scraping tool that is somewhat reminiscent of a vegetable peeler. Jin carving tools come in different forms and can be used as an alternative or next to jin pliers. Bonsai keyhole saw: If you have particularly heavy branches or roots to remove, a tiny bonsai keyhole saw is the best tool for the job. Sharp teeth allow you to quickly slice even stubborn taproot if necessary. Transplant knife: Sometimes you need to connect two trees or parts of trees together. Although there are several techniques that can achieve this, the transplant knife allows you to form two parts so that they intertwine. In addition, the transplant knife can be used in any situation where a sharp knife is needed. Trunk partings: If the trunk of the bonsai tree is not aesthetically pleasing, trunk partings can help solve this problem. Tree branch bender: As it sounds, this tool is used to shape different parts of your bonsai tree. The best are coated with vinyl to protect the tree. For most trees, the best time to trim is during the growing season, in spring and summer. If two branches grow from the same area, a good rule is to prune one of them. The most unnatural look is a bonsai tree with thick upper branches. Be to crop them away. Defoliation works. One technique to get The tree to grow better leaves is to reduce all existing ones during the summer so that new leaves are encouraged to grow. Use the wire to form a tree. Wrapping wire around the branches or trunks of your tree will allow you to shape the way your tree grows. But remember that the wire is temporary. If you leave the wire too long, it will damage the tree. Repot your tree about every two years. Repotting is necessary. Although there is no standard time to repotting bonsai trees, in order to continue to thrive, you should repot it approximately every two years for growing trees and less often for mature trees.
