Keep up with the latest daily buzz with buzzfeed daily's newsletter! A football, used in the sport of American football, is an elongated inflated rubber bladder that narrows to a point at each end. Although a football is often called a pigskin, it is actually covered with stone-grained leather or cowhide. White laces are sewn on one side of the ball so that the suitor can get a better grip on it. Unlike the balls used in most sports, a football is not spherical in form, so there is more of an unpredictability in how it bounces. When thrown, preferably the ball leaves the hand spinning in a spiral motion, which keeps the flight of the ball more aerodynamic. There are different sizes of footballs, with smaller versions available for youth games. At the NFL level, the ball measures from 20 3/4 to 21 1/4 inches around the middle, 28 to 28 1/2 inches around its ends and 11 to 11 1/4 inches from tip to tip. The football also weighs between 14 and 15 ounces and is inflated to between 12 1/2 and 13 1/2 pounds per square inch. The level of inflation in footballs is important. During the 2014-2015 NFL playoffs, most of the balls used in the first half of a game between the New England Patriots and Indianapolis Colts were found to be about 2 pounds below the minimum required inflation level. A complaint from the Colts prompted the judges to test inflation levels and investigate. The Patriots, who hosted the game, were paid some blame for underinflation. The issue even sparked a controversy known as Deflategate, and quarterback Tom Brady eventually received a four-game suspension because the NFL found that Brady may have known about underinflation. When the football was in its infancy, a pig's bladder was often inflated and used as the ball. It may surprise you to hear that footballs were originally inflated with blisters of animals, including those from pigs, notes Big Game Sports, a company that manufactures footballs. In recent years, these animal blisters were placed inside a leather cover, which gave rise to the term 'pigskin'. After Charles Goodyear invented vulcanized rubber in 1844, manufacturers began using the new material to make footballs and players tossed their pigskins and replaced them with the rubber versions. Today, although they are still called pigskins, ... all pro and collegiate footballs are actually made with cowhide leather. Recreational and youth footballs, on the other hand, are often made with synthetic material or vulcanized rubber. (Big Game makes their own footballs with cowhide by the way.) So, the next time you're ready to snag the perfect spiral, remember that the pigskin you keep isn't actually a pigskin, but the ball traveled long before eventually taking on the form, inflation level and material of the football you hold in your hands. From gourmet pies to microbreweries, our guide rounds up a winning selection of cafes, restaurants and boozers, all within walking distance of London's major football stadiums, including the home of English football, Wembley. 01 of 07 Piebury Corner Arsenal play at the Emirates Stadium in Holloway. It is the third largest stadium in England after Wembley and Old Trafford with a capacity of 60,432. The Gooners have played Premiership and Champions League matches here since it opened in 2006. It is located just off Holloway Road and is within walking distance of Islington and Finsbury Park. Snacks: Grab an award-winning pie from Piebury Corner, Britain's first pajei ever. You can enjoy on-the-go snacks or nab a table at the 30-seater café serving an impressive selection of craft beers. Choose from fillings like steak and Guinness and deer and red wine and top things with sauce and a side order mash. Sit-down meal: Trullo is a cosy neighborhood restaurant in Islington serving Italian-inspired dishes, including handmade pasta and meat cooked over a charcoal grill. The menus change daily but pappardelle with beef shin ragu is an audience-pleasing constant fixture. Pub: A 5-minute walk from Highbury & Islington tube station, The Duchess of Kent is a smart pub serving a selection of real ales and classic gastropub dishes such as beer-battered fish and chips. On match days, the kitchen fires up a BBQ outside and dishes up gourmet burgers to hungry football fans. How to get to Arsenal: The nearest metro station is Arsenal on the Piccadilly Line. Finsbury Park and Highbury & Islington are about a 10-minute walk away and are usually less crowded than Arsenal. Continue to 2 of 7 below. 02 of 07 Ian Walton/Getty Images Tottenham Hotspur's White Hart Lane ground is currently undergoing a major revamp and will open as a luxurious 61,000-seater stadium for the start of the 2018/19 season. The club's new home will feature a retractable plan so that Spurs can host NFL games and the capacity will make the ground bigger than the Emirates Stadium, home to local rivals Arsenal. Snacks: In Tottenham's former fire station, Chicken Town is a crowd-funded restaurant and takeaway serving a healthy alternative to fried chicken. The chicken is marinated in buttermilk before steaming and then flashes fried in rapeseed oil. Menu highlights include Korean hot wings and spicy chicken burgers. It is run as a social enterprise with the aim of improving the lives of young people in the local area by offering jobs and training. Seating: Tuck into pizzas served by half-meters and classic Italian pasta at San Marco, family-owned restaurant near Bruce Grove The pizzas are hand-stretched and cooked in a brick oven and most dishes on the menu are less than £10. Pub: The Antwerp Arms is a much loved community-run pub that was saved from closure after a campaign that saw donations flood in from local patrons, MPs and Tottenham Hotspur football club itself. This traditional boozer is a popular venue for match day beer and hosts regular live music events. How to get to White Hart Lane: The nearest tube station is the Seven Sisters on the Victoria Line. The nearest station is White Hart Lane, a 20-minute train ride from Liverpool Street. Continue to 3 of 7 below. 03 of 07 The Malt House Fulham Confusingly, Chelsea's home ground at Stamford Bridge is actually located in Fulham. It has a capacity of 41,631 although there are plans to expand the land to site 60,000 by 2022. Chelsea have played here since the club was founded in 1905. Snacks: Stop for a homemade sandwich, a salt pastry or a cake at Labi Deli, a rustic café with a daily menu on Fulham Road. Sit-down meal: On Fulham Road, Manuka Kitchen is a relaxed neighborhood brasserie serving modern European cuisine from an open kitchen. The cosy 26-seat restaurant offers an affordable set menu at lunchtime, including dishes such as roasted sea bream and wagyu beef bolognese. Pub: The Malt House is a posh pub near Fulham Broadway serving fine dishes as well as casual bar meals such as pulled pork sandwiches served with triple-cooked chips. The building is set from 1729 but the interiors are elegant and modern and there are 6 elegant hotel rooms upstairs. How to get to Stamford Bridge: The nearest tube station is Fulham Broadway on the District Line. The nearest ground stations are West Brompton and Imperial Wharf, both a 15-minute walk from the stadium. Continue to 4 of 7 below. 04 of 07 Bryn Lennon/Getty Images West Ham United moved to the London Stadium (aka the Olympic Stadium) in 2016 from the club's former home at Upton Park, where the Hammers had been playing since 1904. The iconic London Stadium was the star of the show at the 2012 London Olympics and underwent a multi-million dollar transformation after the Games to turn it into a football stadium. It has a capacity of 60,000. Snacks: Head into Westfield Stratford City, a mega-mall overlooking the Olympic Park. Quick food options on the go include burgers from Shake Shack, savory pies from Square Pie and burritos from Tortilla. Sit-down meal: On the banks of the Lea Navigation Canal, Crate Brewery & Pizzeria is a hip bar and restaurant in a converted warehouse. Order a hand-rolled pizza and wash it down with a pint from the hotel's microbrewery. The interiors feature more cycled furniture made of wooden pallets and railway sleepers. Pub: Just south of the Olympic Park, Bow Bells is a traditional east end boozer serves real ale, craft beer and pie and mash on the weekend. The pub welcomes football fans but asks players to show a game ticket upon entry on match days. How to get to the London Stadium: The nearest tube station is Stratford on jubilee and central lines, as well as dlr and overground networks. Continue to 5 of 7 below. 05 of 07 Bush Hall Dining Rooms West London club Queens Park Rangers (QPR) has been calling Loftus Road home since 1917. Shepherd's Bush Stadium has a capacity of 18,439 and provided a home for local rivals Fulham between 2002 and 2004 while Craven Cottage was renovated. All the seats are undercover and the supporters are close to the pitch so this small stadium feels even more intimate. Snacks: Duck into the food court in Westfield London, a large mall near Shepherd's Bush station that is said to cover an area the size of 30 football pitches. There are dining options to suit all tastes including Lebanese dishes from Comptoir Libanais, Sushi from Itsu and Crepes crepes from Crepeaffaire. Sit-down meal: Owned by the people behind Bush Hall, an intimate music venue in a 20th-century dance hall, bush hall dining rooms right next door is a modern food that serves affordable comfort food. Many of the dishes are under £10 and there is a daily special menu offered for lunch and dinner. Pub: On the bustling Uxbridge Road, Princess Victoria is a restored gin palace with a beautiful horseshoe-shaped bar. Order a pint from the impressive real ale menu and stock up on classic bar snacks like scotch eggs and sausage rolls. During the summer months you can drink outside in the small courtyard garden. How to get to Loftus Road: The nearest metro station is White City on the Central Line. Wood Lane station on Hammersmith and City Line are also nearby. Alternatively, Shepherd's Bush on the Central Line is about a 15-minute walk away. Continue to 6 of 7 below. 06 by 07 Christopher Lee/Getty Images This south London club was founded in 1905 in the iconic Crystal Palace Exhibition building. The team has been playing at Selhurst Park since the stadium opened in 1924 and the club has been in and out of top flight football in England throughout its history. The land has a capacity of 25,456. Snacks: You can take fast Mediterranean dishes at Blue and Orange, a Turkish restaurant on Thornton Heath High Street. Don't miss the deep-fried Borek pastries or the grilled shish kebab. Sit-down meal: Mantanah is a South Norwood favorite serving excellent Thai food. The décor is as traditional as the dishes served by the staff in silk clothing. Menu highlights include masaman beef and signature roasted duck cooked in tamarind and palm sugar sauce. Pub: The Railway Telegraph near Thornton Heath station is a family-friendly pub that welcomes home and away fans. The building dates back to 1877 but the interiors are modern and you will find pub grub and a range of real ale on the menu. Jerk BBQ dishes are served from the patio garden on match days How to get to Selhurst Park: The arena is not served by a metro station. You can get an overground train to Selhurt or Thornton Heath Station, both a 5- to 10-minute walk from the ground. Trains take about 25 minutes from either Victoria or London Bridge stations. Alternatively, hop on the 468 bus from Elephant & Castle or x68 from Russell Square. Continue to 7 of 7 below. 07 of 07 Peter Macdiarmid/Getty Images Built in 2007, Wembley Stadium is home to English football and is the largest ground in the UK with a capacity of 90,000. Its iconic arch frames a retractable roof and measures 315 meters in length. It is the longest single-span ceiling structure in the world and can be seen from viewing points all over London. The modern layout is designed so that there are no obstructed views from any location in the arena. In addition to hosting major cup finals and international games, Wembley is also a venue for top rugby games, NFL fixtures and major music events. Snacks: Grab a tasty can (a crispy rice crepe) from Sarashwathy Bavans, an authentic South Indian vegetarian restaurant near Wembley Central Station. There are 35+ different varieties to choose from, including a six-foot family box and a cheese masala dosa. Sit-down meal: You don't have to go far to find good Indian food in Wembley. The neighbourhood has an impressive range of restaurants, cafes, sweet shops and supermarkets. Wembley Tandoori serves a special day menu of meat dishes cooked over charcoal in a clay oven and a number of traditional Nepalese options. Pub: The Green Man pub is located at the top of Wembley Hill and its beer garden offers panoramic views of the stadium. The bar serves real ale and traditional pub grub is available on match days. Although the atmosphere can get quite lively, it is a family-friendly place with a playground so it will never be too hoarse. How to get to Wembley Stadium: The stadium is served by Wembley Park Station (on jubilee and the Metropolitan Lines); Wembley Central Station (at Bakerloo, London Overground, London Midland and Southern Lines) and Wembley Stadium Station (a Chiltern Railways service). All three stations are about a 10-minute walk from the stadium. Stadium.

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
