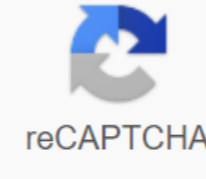




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Goldilocks and the three bears story printable

For those of you who want it as a children's craft, boredom buster, painting page, etc., or who like to color themselves (I need to meet you IRL) the black and white coloring page is FREEEEEEEE!!! What you need for these Goldilocks and the Three Bears Stick Puppets Craft: The template (download it here) printed on cardboard (recommended for a more robust puppet, but not necessary for kids just having fun) How to assemble your Goldilocks and the three Bears printable puppets: Watch the time-lapse video below if you want, or scroll down for step-by-step instructions. 1. Print your Goldilocks and the Three Bear Printable Puppets. 2. Color them. Be ambitious, or not. 3. Cut 'em out. (Young children can simply cut a rough oval around the general perimeter – you have my permission.) 4. Glue to a craft stick and let it dry completely before you try a show (yes, I was so stupid.) Enjoy! Simply keep them in a folder on your bookshelf – you can even laminate them if you want them to last longer! What do you do with these free Goldilocks and the three bear printable puppets?
