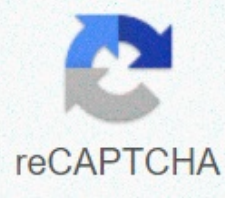

He helps run Elite Pro Wrestling Training, a professional wrestling school in his hometown of Cincinnati, Ohio, with Ricky Steamboat and, until his death on August 1, 2019, Harley Race. He is also a board member of the Cauliflower Alley Club. He won several regional team championships with several partners, including Nelson Royal and Roger Kirby. He shakes hands with the individual competition as a junior heavyweight. Thatcher was born in Cincinnati, Ohio. [2] She first saw wrestling when she was eight while she was at a friend's house, stating: The action on this small black and white ten-inch screen just arrived and grabbed me. [3] In his youth, he played basketball, baseball and football. He started fighting at his local YMCA when he was twelve. He attended Central High School in Cincinnati. Wrestling career Thatcher heard about Tony Santos, a promoter and owner of a wrestling school in Boston, Massachusetts. [2] Shortly afterwards, he began training in February 1960. On July 4, 1960, Thatcher made her professional wrestling debut against Cowboy Ronnie Hill in Blue Hill, Maine. [2] In 1966, Thatcher began working as part of a cousin faction. He was a member of the team with Roger Kirby and Dennis Hall. They used this gimmick in various southern territories until 1969. In the 1970s, Rudy Kay brought Thatcher to maritime territory. [1] This was the only time in his career that he worked as a heel (bad character). It was in the Maritimes that Thatcher also began announcing matches. [1] He then with Jim Crockett's Mid-Atlantic Championship Wrestling, announcing with Gordon Solie. [4] In the 1970s, Thatcher also announced Wrestling Championship. [4] Throughout his television career, he also worked with Bob Caudle, Lance Russell and Jim Ross. During his tenure as a announcer/accommodation, he worked for companies such as Georgia Championship Wrestling. In 1994, Thatcher worked as a broadcaster for Smokey Mountain Wrestling in East Tennessee. [4] He also led the Heartland Wrestling Association from the 1990s. [2] [1] He also created and produced the Brian Pillman Memorial Show. [1] It also operates professional wrestling training seminars and weekend camps under the banner Elite Pro Wrestling Training. [1] Other pursuits from 1955 to 1966, he competed in NHRA drag races, winning 100 trophies and two regional championships. [2] In the late 1940s and early 1950s, she competed as a bodybuild with the NPC Masters Bodybuilding. [2] He helped produce the first wrestling shirt in 1972 and helped publish the first color edition of wwwf magazine in 1978. [2] In 1999 Thatcher appeared in an episode of the MTV series True Life called I'm A Pro Wrestler. He was elected to the board of directors of the Cauliflower Alley Club. Thatcher co-hosted a weekly wrestling radio show with Doc Young called Wrestling Weekly from 2005 to 2008.
