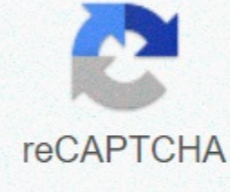

After the stagnation of spring in Europe, when borders were closed, cities closed and tens of thousands of deaths from COVID-19 occurred, early summer signs of normality appeared. On 15 June, some countries in the Schengen area, which comprises the majority of the Member States of the European Union, began lifting their domestic travel bans. On July 1, most US countries also opened their borders to 14 safe countries where infection rates are also low. (The USA was not included in that list). But now, at the end of October, everything is quickly regressing. Several countries see the number of cases eclipse records from earlier this year. In Belgium, for example, the number of cases is almost 8 times higher than the peak recorded in the spring. More than 14 000 new cases were recorded in Germany on Friday , almost tripled from April. Spain and France have kept the mark of one million cases and have been placed in second isolation since this week. Since 12 October, the European Union has adopted general travel restrictions to better regulate travel through Member States. The US remains on the list of nationalities not allowed to enter the bloc. In addition, U.S. citizens who have been denied entry to the U.S. since March 11 are prohibited from entering. As the situation progresses rapidly, we are watching what has been re-opened for local residents and travellers and what has been closed for the second time across Europe. The UK first officially came out of lockdown earlier this summer as shops were allowed to re-open on June 15 and domestic travel resumed on July 4, when hotels and Airbnbs reopened, although cases have been spiked in the past month, forcing some recently reopened spaces (including offices in London) to start closing again. Despite the fact that Britain has the highest number of deaths from COVID-19 on the continent, and a recent study shows that cases in England have now doubled every nine days, the government opposes access to isolation, instead focusing on a more locally led approach when only a few national measures are in place. England uses a three-tier system for local lockdowns (you can find restrictions in any area on the government's website), and national measures that started on September 24 require bars and bars to close at 10am.m. More than six gatherings have been banned since 9/13. Prime Minister Boris Johnson that these rules are likely to apply for six months or the first isolation was fairly uniform across the UK, the effort has since stood out. Scotland is currently developing its own local containment tiers, but both Wales and Northern Ireland have reintroduced suspensions. French President Emmanuel Macron opened its borders to the rest of Europe's Schengen area on 15 June and, for some outside the EU, to international borders. countries (except the USA) on 1 July. By the end of September, the country had begun locking back bits and pieces, with two-thirds of the country subject to a 9p.m curfew by mid-October. However, the number of cases continued to rise.
