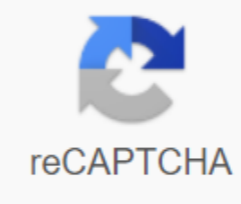

Founded in 1831 by Albert Gallatin as an institution to admit based on merit rather than birthright or social class, the historic NYU campus is in Greenwich Village. [13] In the fall of 2019, the university has a total of 51,848 registered students, including 26,733 undergraduate students and 25,115 graduate students. [10] Admissions are highly selective, with an acceptance rate of 15%. [15] NYU is classified as R1: Doctoral Universities - Very High Research Activity. NYU is the largest independent research university in the United States by enrollment. [16] The university also has two overseas degree-granting campuses (NYU Abu Dhabi and NYU Shanghai), and has university centers in Accra, Berlin, Buenos Aires, Florence, London, Los Angeles, Madrid, Paris, Prague, Sydney, Tel Aviv, and Washington, D.C.[17][19][20] NYU is organized in 25 schools, including 10 undergraduate schools and numerous undergraduate schools. [21] The university has many research efforts, including founding the American Chemical Society and holding research partnerships with the Inception Institute of Artificial Intelligence and with major technology companies such as Twitter and IBM. [22] [23] The university has also since launched various internal research centres in the fields of artificial intelligence, history, culture, medicine, mathematics, philosophy and economics. NYU is one of the best research schools for careers in finance and investment banking on Wall Street, accounting for 3.9% of hirings in major financial institutions. [25] In October 2020, 38 Nobel laureates, 8 Turing Prize laureates, 5 Champs Champs 31 MacArthur Scholars, 26 Pulitzer Prize winners, one U.S. Supreme Court justice,[26] five U.S. governors, 37 Oscar winners, 30 Emmy Award winners, 25 Tony Award winners, 12 Grammy Award winners, 17 billionaires and seven Olympic medalists have been professors and alumni. [33] [34] [35] [36] History Main Article: History of New York University Albert Gallatin (1761–1849) by Gilbert Stuart Albert Gallatin, Secretary of the Treasury under Thomas Jefferson and James Madison, declared his intention to establish in this huge and rapidly growing city ... a rational and practical education system that is adapted and graciously open to all. [1] A three-day literary and scientific convention held at City Hall in 1830 and attended by more than 100 delegates debated the terms of a plan for a new university. These New Yorkers believed that the city needed a university designed for young men who would be admitted on the basis of merit rather than birthright or social class. On April 18, 1831, the institution that would become NYU was established with the support of a group of prominent New York City residents of the city's merchants, bankers and merchants. Gallatin was elected first president. On April 21, 1831, the new institution received its charter and was incorporated as New York City University by the New York State Legislature; older documents often refer to it by this name. The university has been popularly known as New York University since its inception and was officially renamed New York University in 1896. In 1832, NYU held its first classes in rented four-story Clinton Hall rooms, located near City Hall. In 1835, the Faculty of Law, the first vocational school at New York University, was established. Although the impetus to found a new school was in part a reaction of evangelical Presbyterians to what they perceived as the episcopalian of Columbia College,[39] nyu was created non-denominational, unlike many American colleges at the time. The American Chemical Society was founded in 1876 at New York University. NYU Building in Washington Square, 1850 The University Heights campus, now home to Bronx Community College Shortly after its founding, became one of the largest universities in the country, with enrolment of 9,300 in 1917. NYU had had its Washington Square campus since its founding. The university bought a campus at University Heights in the Bronx because of overcrowding on the old campus. NYU had the desire to follow the development of New York city highest. New York University moved to the Bronx in 1894, spurred on by Chancellor Henry Mitchell MacCracken. The University Heights campus was much more spacious than its predecessor. As a result, most of the university's activities as well as The College of Arts and Science and the School of Engineering were housed there. Nyu's administrative operations were moved to the new campus, but the university's colleges remained in Washington Square. In 1914, Washington Square College was founded as the undergraduate college of downtown NYU. [citation needed] In 1935, NYU opened the Nassau College-Hofstra Memorial at New York University in Hempstead, Long Island. This extension would later become a fully independent Hofstra University. In 1950, NYU was elected to the Association of American Universities, a non-profit organization of leading public and private research universities. [43] The financial crisis gripped the New York government in the late 1960s and early 1970s, and unrest spread to the city's institutions, including New York University. [45] Sensing the pressures of imminent bankruptcy, New York University President James McNaughton Hester negotiated the sale of the University Heights campus to the City University of New York, which took place in 1973. In 1973, the New York University School of Engineering and Science merged with the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn,[47] which eventually merged with NYU in 2014, forming the current Tandon School of Engineering. After the sale of the Bronx campus, University College merged with Washington Square College. In the 1980s, under the leadership of President John Brademas,[48] NYU launched a \$1 billion campaign that was spent almost entirely on updating the facilities. The campaign was supposed to end in 15 years, but it was eventually completed in 10 years. In 1991, L. Jay Oliva was inaugurated as the 14th president of the university. After his inauguration, he moved to form the League of World Universities, an international organization of rectors and presidents of urban universities on six continents. The league and its 47 representatives meet every two years to discuss global education issues. In 2003, President John Sexton launched a \$2.5 billion campaign to focus on faculty resources and financial assistance. Under Sexton's leadership, NYU also began its radical transformation into a global university. In 2009, the university responded to a series of interviews in the New York Times that showed a pattern of work abuse at its nascent Abu Dhabi location, creating a statement of labor values for workers on the Abu Dhabi campus. A 2014 follow-up article found that while some conditions had improved, multi-billion dollar university entrepreneurs were still submitting their workers on third-world working conditions. The article documented that these conditions included confiscation of workers' passports, forced overtime, recruitment fees and cockroach-filled dormitories where workers had to sleep under beds. According to the article, workers who attempted to protest against the were quickly arrested. [54] Reports also stated that those arrested by the police were subsequently ill-treated at the police station. Many non-local workers were then deported to their countries of origin. [55] The university quickly responded to the reports with an apology to the workers. In 2015, nyu compensated thousands of migrant workers at its Abu Dhabi compound. From 2007 to 2018, nyu saw a 114% increase in applications in its university system, from about 35,000 to nearly 85,000 in 2019. This has also led to a significant decrease in the acceptance rate, with a record acceptance rate of 15% in 2020. Along with the expansion of New York University in the early 1900s, the university also grew vigorously in the early 2000s, becoming the largest private university in the United States with a combined number of undergraduate and graduate students of more than 59,000 students in 2018. In August 2018, the New York University School of Medicine announced that it would offer full scholarships to all current and future students as part of its medical program, regardless of need or merit, making it the only medical school among the top 10 in the United States to do so. [59] University Logo The university logo, the confirmed torch, is derived from the Statue of Liberty, meaning NYU service in New York City. The torch is represented on both the NYU seal and the more abstract NYU logo, designed in 1965 by renowned graphic designer Tom Geismar of the brand and design company Chermayeff - Geismar. There are at least two versions of the possible origin of the academic color, purple. Some believe it may have been chosen because violets are said to have grown abundantly in Washington Square and around the foothills of the former university building. Others argue that the color may have been adopted because violet was the flower associated with Athens, the learning center in ancient Greece. The cultural setting Washington Square and Greenwich Village have been hubs of cultural life in New York City since the early 19th century. Much of this culture has crossed paths with NYU at various points in its history. Artists from the Hudson River School, the first leading school of painters in the United States, settled around Washington Square. Samuel F.B. Morse, a renowned artist who was also the pioneer of the telegraph and created the Morse code, was the first president of painting and sculpture. He and Daniel Huntington were the first tenants of the old university building in the mid-19th century. (The university has leased studios and residential buildings in the academic building.) As a result, they had a notable interaction with the cultural and academic life of the university. In the 1870s, French sculptors Augustus Saint-Gaudens and Daniel Chester lived and worked near the square. In the 1920s, Washington Square Park was recognized nationally as a focal point and moral rebellion. As such, the Washington Square campus has become more diverse and driven by urban energy, contributing to academic change at New York University. Eugene O'Neill, John Sloan and Maurice Prendergast were the famous residents of that time. In the 1930s, abstract expressionists Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning, and realists Edward Hopper and Thomas Hart Benton had studios around Washington Square. In the 1960s, the area became one of the centres of the beat and folk generation, when Allen Ginsberg and Bob Dylan moved there. This led to tensions with the university, which at the time was in the midst of an aggressive expansion phase of the facilities. In 1975, the university opened the Grey Art Gallery at 100 Washington Square East, home to the NYU art collection and featuring museum-quality exhibitions. [60] [61] Budget and NYU fundraiser successfully completed a seven-year, \$2.5 billion campaign, exceeding expectations by raising more than \$3 billion over the seven-year period. Launched in 2001, the campaign was the largest in its history, in which it planned to raise \$1 million a day for scholarships and financial assistance, the creation of professors, new university initiatives and the improvement of New York University's physical facilities. [63] The campaign included a \$50 million donation from the Tisch family (after which a building and art school are named) and a \$60 million donation from six trustees called the Partner Fund to hire new faculties. [63] On October 15, 2007, the university announced that the Silver family was donating \$50 million to the School of Social Work, which was renamed as a result. It is the largest donation ever made to a social work school in the United States. [66] The 2007-2008 school year was the most successful fundraising year to date for NYU, with the school raising \$698 million in the first 11 months of the year alone, representing a 70% increase in donations from the previous year. [67] The university also recently announced plans for nyu's call to action, a new initiative to ask alumni and donors to support financial assistance for students at New York University. [68] The university has announced a 25-year strategic development plan, which is expected to coincide with its bicentennial in 2031. The NYU 200 plan includes increasing the space of residents and academics, hiring additional professors and involving the New York community in a transparent planning process. In addition, nyu hopes to make their buildings more environmentally friendly, which will be facilitated by an evaluation of all campus spaces. As part of this plan, NYU purchased 118 million kilowatt hours of wind energy in the 2006-2007 academic year - the largest purchase of wind power by a university in the country and any institution in New York[70] For 2007, the university expanded its purchase of wind power to 132 million As a result, the EPA ranked NYU as one of the greenest colleges in the country in its annual College - University Green Power Challenge. NYU consistently ranks among the top fundraising institutions in the country, raising \$506.4 million in 2015 and \$648 million in 2016. NYU is also america's 19th richest university with \$5.3 billion in cash and investments in fiscal 2014. [74] Campus Main Article: Campus of New York University NYU's New York City campus includes more than 171 buildings spread between Manhattan and Brooklyn. [74] [75] Most of the school's buildings in Manhattan are located on an area of approximately 930,000 square metres bounded by Houston Street to the south, Broadway to the east, 14th Street to the north and Sixth Avenue (Avenue of the Americas) to the west. The core of NYU consists of buildings that surround Washington Square Park. [77] [78] In addition to its New York campus, NYU has 49 additional overseas buildings located on two portal campuses and 12 global university centers. NYU Transportation is the university's shuttle service, connecting all campuses to major transit centres. The Washington Square Park campus, with its gateway arch, is surrounded largely by New York University buildings and plays an essential role in the life of the University Campus. A Street Corner on the Washington Square Campus Since the late 1970s, the central part of New York University has been its Washington Square campus in the heart of Greenwich Village. The Washington Square Arch is an unofficial symbol of NYU. Until 2007, NYU had held its opening ceremonies in Washington Square Park, but moved the ceremonies to Yankee Stadium in 2008 due to renovations in Washington Square. In the 1990s, NYU became a two-square university by building a second community around Union Square, near Washington Square. NYU's union square community consists primarily of priority residences at Carlyle Court, Palladium Residence Hall, Alumni Hall, Coral Tower, Thirteenth Street Hall, University Hall, Third North Residence Hall and Founders Hall. NYU operates theatres and performance facilities that are often used by the university's conservatory of music and the Tisch School of the Arts. NYU's largest performance accommodations are the Skirball Center for Performing Arts (850 seats) at 566 LaGuardia Place, just south of Washington Square South, and the Eisner-Lubin Auditorium (560 seats) in the Kimmel Center. The Skirball Center hosted important foreign policy speeches by John Kerry[81] and Al Gore. The Skirball Center is the largest performing arts facility south of 42nd Street. [83] [84] [84] Gould Plaza A view of Gould Plaza facing the Stern School of Business Gould Plaza, located between Washington Square East and Mercer Street on the west west Street, is surrounded by buildings from some departments of the University of Arts and Sciences of New York University, the Stern School of Business and the Current Institute of Mathematical Sciences. Other nyu buildings near the square include NYU's Student Health Center, NYU's admissions center, Goddard Hall, Warren Weaver Hall, Frederick Loewe Theatre, NYU's Elmer Holmes Bobst Library, Kimmel Center for University Life, and NYU Steinhardt's main building, as well as unrelent religious institutions such as Judson Memorial Church, the Islamic Center at NY, and Hebrew Union College - Institute Jewish of Religion. Due to its high student traffic during the school year, Gould Plaza has become a popular meeting place for nyu students and a performance area for street musicians and buskers. Bobst Library Main Articles: Elmer Holmes Bobst Library and New York University Library A view from the bobst Library View of the Atrium of the Bobst Library The Elmer Holmes Bobst Library, built between 1967 and 1972, is the largest library at New York University and one of the largest university libraries in the United States. Designed by Philip Johnson and Richard Foster, the 12-story, 425,000-square-foot (39,500-square-metre) structure sits on the southern edge of Washington Square Park (at 70 Washington Square South) and is the flagship of a system of eight libraries, 4.5 million volumes. Bobst Library offers a multidisciplinary reference center, a research center, 28 miles (45 km) of open-battery shelves, and about 2,000 seats for student study. The library is visited by more than 6,800 users every day and distributes more than one million books a year. Bobst's Avery Fisher Center for Music and Media is one of the world's largest university media centers, where students and researchers use more than 95,000 audio and video recordings per year. [86] The Digital Studio provides an ever-evolving state-of-the-art resource for faculty and student projects and promotes and supports access to digital resources for teaching, learning, research and artistic events. [87] Bobst Library also houses many special collections. The Fales Collection houses collections of English and American fiction in the United States, the unique Downton Collection, documenting New York's literary avant-garde art scene from the 1970s to the present day, and the Food and Cookery Collection, which documents the history of American gastronomy with an emphasis on New York. The Bobst Library also houses the Tamiment Library, which holds collections of labour history, socialism, anarchism, communism and American for scholarly research. Tamiment includes the Robert F. Wagner Archives of Work, the Archives of Irish America, the Center for the Cold War and the United States, and the Frederic Ewen Academic Freedom Center. [88] Bobst Library made headlines in the early 2000s when Steven Stanzak, who is also known as the Bobst Boy, won a for living at the Bobst Library after he was unable to pay for the board at the university and began writing about his life on a self-published blog. The story was reported by Washington Square News before becoming an overnight national sensation, which helped Stanzak receive financial assistance from nyu until graduation. [89] The Brooklyn Bern Dibner Library of Science and Technology campus on the Brooklyn 6 Metrotech Center campus, home to the Tandon School of Engineering and the Brooklyn campus of NYU MakerSpace NYU, is located at the MetroTech Center, an urban university and industrial research park. It is located at the top of Jay Street-MetroTech Station, is only a few blocks from the Brooklyn Bridge, and is connected to the Manhattan campus of NYU via the NYU shuttle system. [91] It is home to the Tandon School of Engineering, the Center for Urban Science and Progress, and several of the programs of the Tisch School of the Arts[93] and the Steinhardt School of Culture, Education, and Human Development. MetroTech Commons, the 14,000-square-metre (14,000-square-metre) private public space in the heart of the MetroTech complex, functions as a quad bike for students on the Brooklyn campus in the same way as Washington Square Park for students on the main campus, hosting events such as concerts, health fairs, chess tournaments and holiday celebrations. Bounded by Lawrence and Duffield streets, the square is often decorated with modern art exhibitions. Two pieces entitled Alligator and Visionary are part of the permanent commons public art collection of renowned sculptor Tom Otterness. The Brooklyn campus is home to NYU's Game Center Open Library, which is the largest collection of games organized by any university in the world.[93] as well as the NYU MakerSpace and Design Lab, which allows all New York University students who attend training sessions to access advanced 3D printing, prototyping , CNC machining and stress testing devices. In 2014, NYU Langone Medical Center acquired a 125,000 square foot (11,600 m2) health facility in Brooklyn. [96] Shortly after this announcement, NYU announced in 2017 that it would invest more than \$500 million in the coming years to renovate and expand its Brooklyn campus, including 370 Jay Street, which opened in December 2017. [97] Other Facilities in the New York Metropolitan Area The James B. [99] [100] In Mineola, Long Island, the campus of NYU Winthrop Hospital is home to second medical school, the NYU Long Island School of Medicine. [101] The Silver School of Social Work (formerly Ehrenkranz School of Social Work) manages branch campus programs in Westchester County at Sarah Lawrence College and in Rockland County at St. Thomas Aquinas College. [102] At Sterling Forest, near Tuxedo, nyu has a research centre that contains various institutes, including the Nelson Institute of Environmental Medicine. The Midtown Center at 11 West 42nd Street is home to the NYU Schack Institute of Real Estate. The Woolworth Building in the financial district is home to New York University's vocational studies and education programs. [104] NYU has two units located on the Upper East Side. The Institute for the Study of the Ancient World, a discrete entity within New York University, independent of any other school or department of the university, is located on East 84th Street.[105] while the Institute of Fine Arts, a graduate school of art and fine arts history, is located at the James B. Duke Building at 1 East 78th Street. NYU also has international homes on its Washington Square campus, including the Deutsches Haus, The French House, Casa Italiana Zerilli Marimo, Glucksman House Ireland, King Juan Carlos I of Spain Center, the Hagop Kavorkian Center, an African House and a House of China. [107] Most of these international homes are located on Washington Mews, a private street north of Washington Square Park. Global Campuses and NYU sites has a host of foreign facilities used to study outdoor programs, called Global Academic Centers. In 2012[update], NYU operates 12 university sites in Africa, Asia and the Middle East, Australia, Europe, North America and South America, including undergraduate programs of the academic year and summer in Accra, Berlin, Buenos Aires, Florence, London, Los Angeles, Madrid, Paris, Prague, Sydney, Tel Aviv, and Washington, D.C.[108] One of the most notable is the 57-acre (230,000 m2) campus of NYU Florence, located in Villa LaPietra, Italy. The estate was bequeathed by the late Sir Harold Acton to New York University in 1994, and at the time it was the largest donation to a university in history. In the spring of 2014, NYU Paris moved to a new campus, formerly occupied by the Special School of Public Works (ESTP Paris), in the student space of the Latin Quarter, where NYU Law also set up a European regulatory policy clinic in partnership with HEC Paris, taught by Alberto Alemanno and Vincent Chauvet. In addition to the World Academic Centres, NYU also operates 10 Global Research Initiative Institutes, 9 of which are located in the university centers of Berlin, London, Madrid, Paris, Prague, Shanghai, Tel Aviv and Washington DC, the other being located in Athens. [111] Aimed at providing faculty and graduate students with infrastructure nyu support while conducting international international research those who are interested can apply for scholarships at all sites during the school year and a limited number of sites during the summer. [112] Abu Dhabi campus NYU Abu Dhabi In the fall of 2010, NYU Abu Dhabi (NYUAD) opened as the first of the university's overseas Portal Campus with an inaugural class of 150 students. [113] Unlike NYU's other foreign study centers, NYUAD operates as a separate liberal arts college within a university, offering comprehensive diploma programs to students admitted directly to NYUAD. NYUAD recruits students from around the world and describes itself as NYU's Honor College. NYUAD's main campus is on Saadiyat Island and opened in 2014. Until then, the school operated from a campus in downtown Abu Dhabi. [114] The construction costs of the campus were fully funded by the Abu Dhabi government, as were operational costs and future expansions. [115] Shanghai campus NYU Shanghai In 2011, NYU announced its intention to open another portal campus, New York University Shanghai, for the fall semester of 2013. There were to be about 3,000 undergraduate students, the majority of whom would be Chinese. It was approved by the Ministry of Education of the People's Republic of China in January 2011. [116] NYU's local partner would be the Normal University of East China (ECNU). UNC PRESIDENT Yu Lihong would be the chancellor and play a major role in government relations, while Jeffrey S. Lehman, former president of Cornell among other positions, would serve as vice-chancellor and free rein to academic affairs. Since the end of summer 2014, NYU Shanghai is based in Pudong, Shanghai, at 1555 Century Ave. The main campus is contained in a single building, the Academic Center, a new 15-storey building with two underground floors. On May 30, 2019, the inauguration ceremony was held for the new campus building in the Qiantan International Business Area. The Qiantan campus building will also be located in Pudong, and is being designed and built by the architectural firm Kohn Pedersen Fox (KPF). The design features four buildings arranged in a pinwheel shape reminiscent of the NYU Shanghai logo, which are connected like a building above the fifth floor. The university hopes to bring up to 4,000 undergraduate and graduate students to the new campus by 2022. Former world campuses Tisch School of the Arts, Asia was the first nyu branch campus abroad. The result of a partnership between the Tisch School of the Arts and the Singapore government, it has offered master's degrees in fine arts in animation and the arts drama writing, film and international media production. The campus opened in the fall of 2007 with the intention of enrolling approximately 250 students. [120] The expected enrollment figures were not reached, financial irregularities were alleged, and President Patti Sara Shiraz was dismissed from her post by nyu in November It subsequently announced its intention to take legal action against nyu alleging unfair dismissal and defamation. In a letter to the Tisch Asia community dated November 8, 2012, Dean Mary Schmidt Campbell announced that the campus would close its doors after 2014 with the recruitment and admission of new students suspended with immediate effect. In 2016, three former students of the now defunct Tisch Asia sued NYU. [124] Before moving to its current location on the former CAMPUS of ESTP Paris, NYU Paris was located in a small building in the historic district of Passy. [126] Main Residences Articles: New York University Residences Washington Square Village, home to New York University faculty and graduate students University Hall, one of New York University's many undergraduate residences, home to approximately 12,000 undergraduate and graduate students,[127] and had the seventh largest university housing system in the United States in 2007[update] , and one of the largest private schools. [128] The nyu undergraduate housing system consists of more than 20 residences and is governed by the Inter-Residence Hall Council (IRHC), a student council executive body. [127] [129] Only many of NYU's residences are converted apartment complexes or old hotels. In general, nyu residences receive favorable ratings, and some are opulent. Many rooms are spacious and contain facilities considered rare for college living rooms, such as kitchens, toilets, living rooms and common areas. [130] The university operates its own transit system to transport students by bus to its campus. Some of the residences are considered among the most beautiful in the nation, being furnished with granite countertops, stainless steel appliances, gymnasiums in the lobby, wooden floors, marble bathroom accessories, large floor-to-ceiling lounges, floor-to-ceiling windows and stunning views of lower and central Manhattan. [132] Undergraduate students are guaranteed accommodation while enrolling in nyu and are divided into two categories, FYRE (first year of residential experience) and TRUE (The Residential Upperclassmen Experience). Most of the FYRE rooms are located near the Washington Square area. While almost all TRUE rooms are located near the Union Square area, two former residences were located in the financial district and one is still in use in chinatown. [133] Two residences are located in and around the MetroTech Commons, intended to serve the Brooklyn campus of New York. In 2007, the National Association of College and University Residence Halls (NACURH) named the IRHC National School of the Year and the NRHH's energetic efforts over the past year. In addition, nyu was named National Program of the Year for UltraViolet Live, the annual inter-hall competition that raises funds for Relay For Life. [135] NYU Sustainability has made the greening of campus a high priority. For example, nyu is the largest university buyer of wind energy in the United States since 2009. [136] With this shift to renewable energy, NYU achieves equivalent benefits of removing 12,000 cars from the road or planting 72,000 trees. In May 2008, New York University's Sustainable Development Working Group awarded \$150,000 in grants to 23 projects that would focus research and efforts on energy, food, landscape, awareness, supply, transportation and waste. [137] These projects include a student-led bike-sharing program modelled on the Vélib de Paris program with 30 free bikes for students, staff and faculty. NYU received a B rating on the 2010 College Sustainable Development Bulletin from the Institute of Sustainable Endowments. NYU purchased 118 million kilowatt hours of wind energy in the 2006-2007 academic year - the largest purchase of wind energy by a university in the country and any institution in New York[70] For 2007, the university increased its purchase of wind energy to 132 million kilowatt hours. [71] The EPA ranked NYU as one of the greenest colleges in the country in its annual College - University Green Power Challenge. [72] NYU 2031 In 2007, NYU created a strategic plan for a six billion dollar, 25-year, 6,000,000 square foot (560,000 sq sq m) expansion planned to conclude the university's bicentennial in 2031. Details of the plan include 2,000,000 square feet (190,000 square metres) of additional campus housing and 3,500,000 square feet (330,000 square metres) of modern university space spread across the New York campuses of nyu. The expansion began in earnest in 2017 with the opening of 181 Mercer Street, a new multi-purpose building that will serve as a flagship sports facility for nyu, while accompanying a 350-bed lobby residence, 58 multi-purpose classrooms and a 350-seat theatre. [139] The approximately 800,000 square feet (74,000 sq m) building is directly adjacent to the southeast corner of the Washington Square campus and represents a significant focus on the owner of the university's super blocks. Work on the second project, 370 Jay Street, a 500,000 square foot (46,000 m2) plus at the Brooklyn campus is scheduled to be completed in 2019. The building will house digital arts and sciences such as the engineering departments of the Tandon School of Engineering of Computer Science, Electrical and Computer Engineering, the Tisch School of the Arts Clive Davis Institute for Recorded Music and Game Center and various other New York University initiatives such as the Center for Urban Progress (CUSP) and NYU Wireless (5G research). [140] To date, NYU has confirmed specific construction details for its NYU 2031 plan to the tune of 1,300,000 square feet (120,000 m2) at a cost of \$1.6 billion with about 12 years to go before the bicentennial of universities. In order to achieve the stated objectives in time, the university significantly increase spending, fundraising and construction over the next decade. Admission to New York University is highly selective. For the 2024 undergraduate first-year class, 15% were admitted to a pool of candidates over 85,000. [15] The College of Arts and Sciences had an acceptance rate of 9% and the Stern School of Business had an acceptance rate of 7.6% for the class in 2023. Of those admitted, approximately 6,500 represented the total number of enrolments for the class, representing 88 countries and 50 states. Most first-year students have a typical unweighted PGP MOYENNE of 3.7/A (90-95%) and are in the top 10% of their graduating class. The median SAT score was 1500 out of 1600 (in the 9th percentile). [15] The student-faculty ratio on the New York campus is 10:1, and less than the Abu Dhabi and Shanghai campuses. The average amount of scholarships awarded to first-year students is more than \$35,000, and 18% of first-year students have received Pell grants. [142] In 2016[update], NYU colleges have acceptance rates of 1.8% at the School of Medicine, 23% at the School of Business,[143] 28% at the School of Engineering,[144] 29% at the Graduate School of Arts and Science,[145] and 34% at the School of Law. [146] The average MCAT score of medical school students is 36/45,[147] the average GMAT score of graduate students at the school of business is 710/800,[143] and the median LSAT score of law school students is 169/180. [148] Schools and leadership flags identify NYU buildings around the city. This flag is for the Gallatin School of Individualized Studies. NYU is a private, global, non-sectarian, not-for-profit higher education institution organized into 10 undergraduate and 15 graduate/professional schools, with a roughly equal division of students across divisions. Arts and Science is currently the largest academic division at New York University. It has three subdivisions: the College of Arts and Sciences, the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences and the Liberal Curriculum. [13] The College of Arts and Sciences and Liberal Studies program are undergraduate divisions, and the first exists since the founding of New York University. The orle campuses are at NYU Shanghai and NYU Abu Dhabi function as full-fledged colleges, allowing students to study the four years of their undergraduate studies and receive a degree, having never set foot on what would be considered the traditional campus of New York University. The university sites of Accra, Berlin, Buenos Aires, Florence, London, Los Angeles, Madrid, Paris, Prague, Sydney, Tel Aviv and Washington, D.C. function as study sites outside, allowing students to spend up to a year away from their original campus. NYU, citing a report by the Institute of International Education, says it has sent more students abroad and brought more international students than any other university for five consecutive years.
