Corporations earmark funds ahead of time for sponsorship opportunities throughout the year. Non-profit organizations must understand how to approach a corporation to secure corporate sponsorships, and how to nurture those relationship to foster future growth. Corporations look at sponsorship as good for the community and good for business. It is important for organizations to properly introduce themselves to corporations, which need to know an organization's goals and other basics before they decided to donate funds. By following the steps below, you can create invitations to help your organization attract corporate sponsors. Determine the size of the card you would like to send to potential sponsors.Obtain card stock in the desired size, texture and color from office merchandise retailers or print shops, such as Kinko's or FedEx.Type and insert event and sponsorship information on a post-card template.Print invitation information, including details of the beneficiary organization and the services that are provided to the community.Print sponsorship levels, benefits and amount for each. For example, you might have a "Gold" level of sponsorship, which would cost \$1,000 and provide one table for 10 guests, cost of admission and dinner for an evening event. Specifically, boxes of animal crackers or Cracker Jacks can make for cute invitation templates.Simply cut out card stock large enough to cover one side of the snack box. Then, print the party details on the stock and glue it onto the boxes. It may be a wise idea to hand these out in person. You won't want to run the risk of the snacks getting broken in the mail, nor will you relish paying a hefty amount of postage to mail the invitations. But as always, remind your child to be discreet when distributing invitations at school.Complementary Party Themes: zoo, safari, jungle, baseball, camping.Designing an invitation in the form of an event ticket or gift certificate can add a cute twist to many birthday party themes. For instance, if a guitar-loving boy wants to have a rock 'n' roll themed birthday party, the invitation could take a cue from a concert ticket. Your home address can be highlighted as the concert venue, and you can create a tear-away section on the side of the invitation for a free piece of cake or goodie bag.You can also incorporate the smaller "admit one" tickets into larger invitations. Perhaps fold up a side of the invite to form a pocket, and tuck a ticket inside of it for guests to show upon arrival.Complementary Party Themes: movie magic, rock 'n' roll, Hollywood glamour, carnival, circus.Hear ye, hear ye! Birthday invitations with old world charm are a great option for birthday kids who want to be swept back in time. If the guest of honor has a knack for drawing as well, maybe have him or her draw out a treasure map with the party location as the destination. Pick up some parchment paper at an office supply store, singe the edges with a match (parents only!) and crumple it up to form some time-induced wrinkles in the paper.Bonus points for using Old English fonts and applying a gold seal to envelopes before handing out the invitations!Complementary Party Themes: pirates, shipwreck, princess, knights.Spy-themed birthday parties are a popular idea, particularly for young boys. Amp up partygoers' anticipation for the top-secret fiesta by sending out spy-worthy invitations. If the invite list isn't too long, the guest of honor could cut out ransom note styled lettering from old magazines and paste them in the invitations.For a little more fun, mix up some invisible ink or squeeze a bowl full of lemon juice. Have the birthday boy or girl carefully dip a fine paintbrush into the juice and write an invisible invite message. Since it would probably take too much time to write out all of the party details in the invisible ink, just scrawl a phone number, e-mail address or Web site URL that guests can use to get more details about the party.And don't forget to include instructions on the envelope on how to read the secret message: Simply hold the paper up to a heat source.Complementary Party Themes: spy, scavenger hunt, mystery.If a kid's birthday party is going to be activity-oriented, a party favor can double as an invitation. For instance, if you have an adolescent Picasso who's hosting a painting party, send invitees a paint brush with their names written along the handle. From over 2K miles away I followed those twittering the fine details, longing for a way to easily get to the West Coast. This expo captivated my attention because the world live web, by its very nature, invites each of us to learn. Watching party2.0 unfold from afar reminded me of work on invitation leadership from William Purkey, Betty Siegel and John Novak who identify four ways people attend to life. No Party People Some people go through life telling anyone who listens, "There is no party." At work they say things like, "I know how this will play out. Why bother?" At home they nod in agreement to the awfulizing spewed on around-the-clock newsTV. They brighten a room when they leave it. Their words and actions intentionally disinvoke others, implying people are irresponsible and incapable, while demeaning, diminishing, and devaluing the human spirit. In a live web world, they are static pages without even a contact_us link. Parties Not For Me A second group of people mope, "There is a party, but I can tell I'm not invited." While often hard on themselves, they are frequently harder on others: obsessed with policies and unaware of people's feelings, disorganized, boring, and busy. At work they spend more time on us than them. At home the neighborhood Jones' are eternally out of reach. In tech-terms, they're frenetic mailinglists you didn't sign on to receive. Not Going to the Party A third group announces, "There's a party, I'm invited, and I'm not going." They think, "I'm not good enough. I'm not smart enough. I'm not interesting enough to go the party." Although it may seem counterintuitive, I know several charismatic leaders (and parents) who can only unintentionally invite others. Undemeath their confident demeanors, they're uncertain and afraid because when whatever accounts for their success fails them, they don't know how to proceed. If they were software they'd be promising fantastical upgrade flops. Party Time The fourth group of people know, "There's a party and I'm invited, and I'm going. I may not be good enough but I might, I may not be with-it enough but I might, I may not be smart enough, but I might." People who intentionally invite themselves and others risk going to life's party. They are the ones who show up time and again; persistent, imaginative, resourceful, and courageous even when the going get tough. They are firm, flexible, and friendly, deliberately choosing fairness over equality and mindfully working toward the big picture rather than swatting at this moment's gnats. At home they are raising adults, not children. At work they appreciate relationships and value divergent perspective. Think social networks at their best. Leading and learning in this evolving world requires us to personally invite ourselves, personality invite others, professionally invite ourselves, and professionally invite others. We do that through optimism, respect, trust, care, and intentionality. From this will emerge a fifth group: those who see, "There's a party I can't attend physically, yet people will participate with me as if I were these."
