Maybe you think Taxi Driver should have won the best picture on Rocky in 1977, or private saver Ryan should have won the best picture than Shakespeare in Love in 1999, or maybe you're a fan of blockbusters and wonder why so many box office hits never win-whatever your gripe is, you've probably wondered who the Academy voters really are. When it was founded in 1927, the Academy consisted of only 26 members are often announced by the Academy and independent counters have managed to create lists of thousands of members. Join the Academy only by invitation. The Academy was recently ridiculed for its lack of diversity among its members - in late 2012, the Los Angeles Times revealed a study found that Academy voters were overwhelmingly white (94%), male (77%), and a majority over 60 years old (54%). The academy has announced its efforts to diversify voters with future invitations. After adding more than 700 new voters in the summer of 2017, voters were 39% female and 30% of people of color, according GoldDerby.com. About a third of voters are former Oscar candidates or winners. Members of the Academy are divided into 17 different branches — the largest branch (22% of its members) is an acting branch and other branches include Casting Director, Costume Designer, CEO, Producer, Film Editor and Documentary Filmmaker. After the #OscarsSoWhite controversy in 2016, when all 20 acting candidates were white for the second year in a row — many critics pointed the finger at former, white executives for choosing only white acting candidates. However, this criticism misunderstood how the Academy voted for the nominations. In fact, only actors can be nominated for an Academy Award. Members of the executive branch - or any other any other branch - no nominations for action nominees. Restricted members nominated within the ring for awards are only covered by their affiliates (except Best that every voter can nomm out for). For example, only a Cinemas branch can nomm out individuals for Best Cinemanies. In other words, members of individual affiliates choose their own nominations. Of course, while this allows affiliates to choose their own it is an imperfect system- for example, some critics believed that the Director branch did not nom nomination Ben Affleck for Best Director for Argo because the Director branch considered him an actor rather than a director (Argo would go on to win Best Film, one of the few films to win Best Film without the film's director being nominated for Best Director). Then again, that year Affleck may have been shut down by only a handful of votes. As the ballot is confidential and the number of votes is never disclosed, this is all speculation. At the end of this process, the nomination votes are tallied and the first year (or up to ten for best film) are announced as nominations. In some cases categories each year -- such as Best Animated Or Song -- may eventually have fewer than five nominations in a category. Note that the category voted as the exception to this process is the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film because there are thousands of potential nominees. After the candidates are announced, each Academy member will receive a final ballot. At this time, members can vote in all categories regardless of which branch they are based in. The final votes were tallied and the winners were ready to be announced at the Oscars ceremony. After the #OscarsSoWhite controversial measures that could deprive members of voting rights deemed inactive (i.e. members no longer actively working in the film industry). Critics of the measure say it is unfair for the Academy to assume older members of the Academy are the source of clear diversity issues in the industry. These measures can lead to the Academy being divided into voting members and not voting, which will fundamentally change the voting process. As in the past, the Academy will probably adapt to future changes, but fans will also never stop guessing second Academy voters when their favorite film doesn't win oscar night. Night.

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
