

He was the saint of the Catholic Church and patron saint of youth teachers. He was referred to both La Salle and as De La Salle. La Salle dedicated most of his life to the education of poor children in France; by doing so, he began many long-lasting educational practices. He is considered the founder of the first Catholic school. Background La Salle was born to a wealthy family in Rheims, France on 30 April 1651. He was the eldest child of Louis de La Salle and Nicolle Moet de Brouillet. Nicolle's family was a noble man and ran a successful winery business and he was a relative of Claude Moët, founder of Moët & Salle received tonsure [need clarification] at the age of eleven and was crowned canon of Rheims Cathedral when he was sixteen years old. [2] He was sent to the College des Bons Enfants, where he pursued higher studies and, on 10 July 1669, he took a Master of Arts degree. When De La Salle had completed his classical, literary, and philosophical courses, he was sent to Paris to enter the Seminary of Saint-Sulpice on 18 October 1670. His mother died on 19 July 1671, and on 9 April 1672, his father died. This required him to leave Saint-Sulpice on 19 April 1672. He is now twenty-one, the head of the family, and hence has a responsibility to educate his four brothers and two sisters. He completed his theological studies and was ordained to the priesthood at the age of 26 on April 9, 1678. Two years later he received a doctorate in theology. [3] The Sisters of the Children of Jesus are a new religious congregation whose work is the care of the sick and the education of poor girls. Young priests have helped them to become established, and then serve as pastors and their confessions. It was through his work with the Sisters that in 1679 he met Adrian Nyel. With the help of De La Salle, a school soon opened. Shortly thereafter, a wealthy woman in Rheims told Nyel that she would also bless the school, but only if La Salle would help. What began as an effort to help Adrian Nyel set up a school for the poor in la Salle's home town gradually became his life's work. Jean Baptiste de La Salle believes that education gives people hope and opportunity to live a better life of dignity and freedom. Moved by the plight of the poor who seem so far from safety either in this world or next, he is determined to put his own talents and further education over the services children often leave to themselves raised badly. [2] La Salle knew that the teachers in Reims were struggling, lacking leadership, purpose, and training, and he found himself taking increasingly deliberate steps to help this small group of men with their work. First, in 1680, he invited them to home, as much as to teach them table manners to inspire and instruct them in their work. This intersection of social boundaries is one whose relatives find difficult to bear. In 1681, De La Salle realized that he had to take it a step further - he took the teachers to his own home to live with him. De La Salle's relatives are deeply disturbed, his social class scandalized. When, a year later, his family home was lost at auction because of a family lawsuit, De La Salle rented the house where he and a handful of teachers moved in. [5] La Salle decided to resign from his canonry to devote his full attention to the establishment of schools and teacher training. He had inherited considerable wealth, and this may have been used to advance his cause, but on the advice of a Pastor Barre of Paris, he sold what he owned and sent money to the poor of the province of Champagne, where famine caused great hardship. [6] La Salle thus began a new religious institution, the first without priests, at all, among its members: the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, [2] also known as the De La Salle Brothers (in England, Ireland, Malta, Australasia and Asia) or, most commonly in the United States, the Christian Brothers. (They are sometimes confused by a different congregation of the same name founded by Edmund Ignatius Rice in Ireland, known in the US as the Irish Christian Brother.) The De La Salle Brothers was the first Roman Catholic teaching religious institution not to include any priests. [Citation needed] One decision led to another until La Salle found himself doing something he never anticipated. La Salle wrote: I have imagined that the care I assumed of schools and masters would only amount to marginal involvement that did me to do nothing more than provide for subsistence masters and convince them that they were relieving themselves of their duties with righteousness and devotion... [3] Indeed, if I ever thought that the care I took from principals from purely charities would ever make it my duty to stay with them, I would drop the whole project. ... The Lord, who guides everything with wisdom and tranquility, whose way does not force people's tendencies, is willing to commit fully to the development of the school. He did this in a way that was invisible and over a long period of time so that one commitment led to another in a way that I didn't foresee at first. [7] La Salle's company met opposition from the church's authorities who rejected the creation of a new form of religious life, a public community that was dulled to perform free jointly and by association. The educational establishment hates its innovative methods. [6] Nevertheless, La Salle and a small group of his free teachers founded the Institute The brothers of the Christian Schools are, according to La Salle's website, fully dedicated to the Christian education of the children of craftsmen and the poor, in a life close to Catholicism. [8] In 1685, La Salle established the first normal school — that is, a school whose purpose was to train teachers — in Rheims, France. [9] Worn out by austerities and exhausting labor, La Salle died in Saint Yon, near Rouen, early in 1719 on Good Friday, just three weeks before his 68th birthday. [10] The remains of John Baptis de La Salle at Casa Generaliza in Rome. Italian Pope Leo XIII canonized La Salle on 24 May 1900 and Pope Pius X inserted his feast in the General Roman Calendar in 1904 for celebrations on May 15. Because of his life and inspirational writings, Pope Pius XII proclaimed him patron saint of all youth teachers on May 15, 1950. [10] In a revision of the Church calendar in 1969, Pope Paul VI moved his feast day to April 7, the day of his death or the birth of heaven, his dead natalis. Of his writings on education, Matthew Arnold said: 'Then working on the same subject has slightly improved the teachings, while they have absolutely no say. [11] Educational innovations include Sunday courses for working youth, one of the first institutions in France for delinquency care, technical schools, and secondary schools for modern languages, arts and sciences. LaSalle University said its writings influenced education practices, school management, and teacher preparation for more than 300 years. [12] In 2017[update] approximately 4,200 brothers and 69,000 lay and religious colleagues worldwide served as teachers, counselors, and guides to 1,000,000 students in more than 1,500 Lasallian educational institutions of educational institutions around the world are named La Salle.
