It is the sixth single from Jackson's sixth solo album, Thriller (1982). The original demo version of the song was written by Jackson and Greg Phillinganes. Quincy Jones transmitted the song itself, but liked the title and, along with James Ingram, created a whole new song with the title. The demo version is featured in The Ultimate Collection (2004). P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was released on September 19, 1983. The single reached number 10 on the Billboard Hot 100 and number 46 on the Hot Black Singles chart, becoming the sixth top 10 hit on the album. In the UK, the song reached a maximum position of 11. The single was the most successful in Belgium, and was in the Top 10 in number. 6. The song was covered and sampled by numerous artists, including Monica, Justin Guarini and Kanye West. The original demo was also remixed by singer The Black Eyed Peas will.i.am for Thriller 25. P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was never performed live by Jackson. In a rehearsal for the Dangerous World Tour, however, Jackson sang a small part of the demo version, describing it as something I wrote that I haven't recorded yet. The James Ingram recording later described working with Jackson and Jones as being in The Wonderful Wizard of Oz. It's almost like I had the chance to go to Oz and Quincy was the Wizard of Oz and Michael Jackson was who was dealing with in his world. Their work ethic is incredible. [3] He noted Jones would fall asleep on the board, waking up to answer a question. He works a lot in Alpha State, Ingram added. [3] Two of Jackson's sisters, Janet and La Toya, provided a background voice under the guise of P.Y.T.s. The two sisters sang na na na back to their brother towards the end of the song. [4] [5] According to the official score at Musicnotes.com, P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) is in B minor's key. [7] It has a tempo of 126 beats per minute, making it one of Jackson's fastest songs. [8] Launch and reception of P.Y.T. Young Thing) was released on September 19, 1983, as the sixth single from Thriller. Single mapped at No. No. Billboard Hot 100 and number 46 on the Hot Black Singles chart, becoming the sixth Top 10 hit in Thriller. [5] In the United Kingdom, the song reached a maximum position of 11. [4] He had the most success in Belgium, finishing in the Top 10 in 6th place. [4] The single was ranked 14th in the Netherlands. [4] P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) ranked 24th in Canada and ranked 51st in Germany. [4] The response to P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was mixed with positive. Stephen Thomas Erlewine of AllMusic thought it was funk chalk. [10] Eric Henderson of Slant Magazine believed that P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was a lush disco paradise. [11] However, Rolling Stone critic Christopher Connelly, while discussing the album in a review, stated that the song was not at the limit of character from the other tracks. Connelly noted that one of Jackson's weaknesses was a tendency to go for brilliance, and cited the song as an example of this. Davitt Sigerson, from the same magazine, also agreed with Connelly, calling him one of Thriller's forgettings. I grew up in projects in East Los Angeles and Thriller was filmed about two blocks from my house, but my mom was very strict and she wouldn't let me go to the factories-she doesn't care who was filming a video there; but I'm on my 25th birthday, 25 years later – that's pretty awesome. [3] Titled P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) 2008, the remix was well received by Rolling Stone. The publication described the song, along with The Girl Is Mine 2008, as one of the best songs on the album. [16] They noted that will.i.am update the original sound of the songs to make them dance 25 years after its release. (Pretty Young Thing) on the first season of the show. [36] 2007: Part of the lyrics of Justice's D.A.N..C.E. refer to Jackson's song and are said to be in homage to the singer. [37] [38] 2010: R&B singers T-Pain and Robin Thicke covered the song for Quincy Jones' album, Q: Soul Bossa Nostra. [39] 2011: The song is performed in the twelfth episode, Silly Love Songs, in the television series Glee, by the character Artie Abrams (played by Kevin McHale). [40] 2012: The Wood Brothers performed a version of the song for the A.V. Club undercover series of the A.V. Club. [41] 2017: John Gibbons covered and remixed P.Y.T (Pretty Young Thing). [42] To date, it has reached number 12 on the UK Dance Singles Chart[43] at number 1 on the Indie Singles Chart[44] and number 22 on the Scottish Singles Chart. [45] Sampling 2002: P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was sampled and interpolated on Monica's single All Eyez on Me. [5] [46] I used vocals from the song that didn't make it to the Thriller album, producer Rodney Jerkins said. He [Jackson] had several voices and ad-libs that were never heard, and I used those that were not heard. Jackson hand-delivered his original masters to Monica, who, like a longtime Jackson was touched by the move. [47] [48] 2003: The chorus of P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was sampled by rapper Memphis Bleek in I want to Love U. The song, sung by Donell Jones, appeared on Bleek's M.A.D.E. album. [49] 2007: P.Y.T. (Pretty Young Thing) was also included in Kanye West's Good Life, the third single from his graduation album.
