In winter, Farmington Canyon has been closed at the lower gate and is only open to snowmobiles, 4 wheelers or foot traffic and usually opens in May up to Y in the road, until the roads are clear at the top. See for updates. The Forest Service is currently considering keeping it closed until March 15. From the above website as of 5/5/19:Farmington Canyon and Ward Canyon roads in Davis County were scheduled to open on May 1, but due to snow and wet/muddy conditions the roads will remain closed to dry enough to support motorized vehicles over 50 inches. The Forest Service plans to close the Sunset campground in late 2018. At sunset campsite (which is first and before Y), the signs may indicate that it is closed (in spring or autumn). I didn't want to worry about it. I've seen the campsite half full when the sign says it's closed. That probably means the toilets are closed and no one is raising money. There are established and non-established camping areas up Farmington Canyon. But due to the steep terrain, the non-established camp areas are few far between before you reach the top. It's a long, winding, kind of scary (but safe) dirt road to get there. Go north at 100 East in Farmington, it changes to Skyline Drive and heads up the canyon. The first campsite you come to is Sunset and has nine single and 1 double area, which first comes first served and quite close together and usually fill up quickly. They are \$14 per website and \$8 for extra cars. See for more information. Most of the places are small and have only enough space for one or two tents. There is a nice waterfall that you can go down to on the Farmington Canyon trail. There is a sign on the southwest side of the campsite. It's only about a mile down the path, or you can walk it from the bottom of the parking lot where the sidewalks end. Just across the road from Sunset is a wooden staircase leading up the hill to a nice little campsite. It's as good as or better than the other sites and I don't know if it's part of the tax area. It has room for about three tents:Goes further up the road, the road divides and there is a place you can camp there at Y. It is not a great place, but feasible if the gates are closed. There are gates just above Y on both roads that are locked in winter until the roads are clear, usually in May. If you go right by the fork and then the next left, you will Peak Campsite. There are about 25 pay websites for \$16 and are first-to-come-first earn and an extra \$8 for extra cars over one (park it out on the road). Most of the places are quite small, for one or two tents. There are three double sites, for a double fee. If they have 2 tables they are double sites. This is the site #2: There is also a group site nearby that is reserved for \$150. Double-click the map to see some of them in red. At the intersection just below Bountiful Peaks CG, look to the left going uphill and you will see some mountain stairs going up the hill. It leads to a fairly large site, but with only small trees. If you continue up the road past Bountiful Peaks CG, there are quite a few places to camp. On the left, just past the campsite entrance, you see a parking lot where people have camped. It's a better place to camp just outside the parking lot. Not much further up the road is another good place on the left without parking space. But there's room on your shoulder to park. You'll see a post there for, for some reason. Further up the hill are a few more nice places. The road eventually goes around back to the first junction, Y.If you go right at both junctions you will pass at an exit to the right with a nice place to camp and a little up you will see a couple of ponds. There are a couple of nice campsites at the third pond called Farmington Lake. But it's about a 10 minute trip to get to them. Follow the path around the left side of the two or three (swampy) ponds, cross a small stream and walk up the hill to Farmington Lake. Here's a picture of the lake. It's pretty clear, you can wade into it. The two campsites are up and over their backs to the right of the lake and down the hill. Here is the lower one with room for several tents. The second is just up the hill in some thick pine trees. It can accommodate a small and medium-sized tent. You can accommodate a larger group using both areas. Up the road across the ponds are a couple of pull-offs to the right where you can camp. There are several flat places further up the road. Another option is to backpack from the bottom up on the Farmington Canyon trail. It starts in the parking lot to the right of a U-shaped bend and the sidewalk ends. About 700 meters from the parking lot and trail you will see quite a path heading towards the river. Head down and there is a primitive little campsite overlooking the river. There is not much room for tents, but you can find enough flat places for at least 8 under the stars. There is also a smaller area just off the path just above the Great Falls, about 2.5 miles up. There is room for about 6 people. People.

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
