This is the story of a lame man whose friends believed jesus could heal him. They eventually found a way to get their friend in front of Jesus by opening the roof and descending from ropes attached to his bed. But Jesus did not heal man's lameness: he forgave his sins. A few days later, when Jesus entered Capernaum again, people felt that he had returned home. They gathered in such a large number that there was no more space, not even outside the door, and preached the word to them. Some men came, bringing to him a paralyzed man, brought by four of them. Since they could not take it to Jesus because of the crowd, they made an opening in the roof above Jesus digging through it and then lowered the mat the man was lying on. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralyzed man: Son, your sins are forgiven. Now some law teachers were sitting there, thinking to themselves: Why does this guy talk like that? Is Who can forgive sins, but only God? Immediately Jesus knew in his spirit that this was what they were thinking hearts, and said to them: Why are you thinking of these things? Which is easier: say to this paralyzed man: 'Your sins are forgiven', or say, 'Get up, take your mat and walk'? But I want you to know that the Son of Man has the authority on earth to forgive sins. Even after the operation, however, the person would still need a long period of therapy and rehabilitation. But no one, not even the best doctor, can simply say: Get up and walk and make it happen. Anyone can say: Your sins are forgiven, and there is no immediate evidence that the person is a fraud. Which is more important? A sign that Jesus said to the Pharisees: But I want you to know that the Son of Man has the authority on earth to forgive sins. So he said to the man, 'I'll tell you, get up, get your mat and go home.' For believers, this is not necessary. We already believe that the Son of man has the power to forgive sins. We do not need a sign of Jesus' power to prove that he has the authority to forgive sins. We feel it and know it as the Holy Spirit testifies with our spirit (Romans 8:16). Believers did not need visible signs that their sins are forgiven. Signs are usually for unbelievers. Paul was a disbeliever and an enemy of the Gospel, in which he persecuted believers when Jesus and the Apostles. Sometimes, however, we would like to have a sign, because we fall into doubt about the things that God has told us. Sometimes we doubt that God has really forgiven us. Sometimes we also doubt, even if we hate to admit it, if God is really there at all. And our doubt makes us worry even more that if God is there, he must not love and forgive sinners and doubters like us. ours is Jesus. Faith does not save us, Jesus does. In our moments of strong faith, we fully trust him and every fear is gone. In our moments of doubt, we fear condemnation. We can we can trust in Jesus to have faith for us when we are in doubt, because it is his righteousness and faith in our favor that God accepts. Jesus represents us before God. He stands for us. And it is for his sake that we are clean and saved. May our faith be in Jesus, not in our faith. Myth about physical healing It is said that if people really trusted God for healing, they would heal. So when people aren't healed, they feel guilty. They're looking for the supposed secret sin that's keeping them out of being healed. Christian friends and family can tell them that they must pray that God will show them their sins so that he can heal them. They could tell the sick person that they need more faith, and prescribe more prayer and biblical study and fasting as a way to get God to heal them. This is not gospel; it's religion. It's superstition. It reduces God to the level of the ancient pagan gods, tyrants, who cared little about the situation of human beings and acted only when they had something to gain, or when a stronger god forced them to do so. The Father of Jesus Christ is not like those gods. Religion, as a formula for being righteous to God, has no place in the Gospel. Our relationship with God is not a commercial transaction: you, human, bring me six chickens and say the magic words and then I will do you good. Our relationship with God, God sees it through, and its foundation is his love, not his convenience. The reason we pray, as Jesus did, Your will, not mine, to be done, is that God's will for us is unwaveringly good, never bad. God is not vindictive; he's love. In this, in his commitment to love us and to see us through all things, he does not change (Malachi 3:6). In this, Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever (Hebrews 13:8). This is what all this alliance deal is about - it's god's fidelity to be our God and for us to be his people. It's not about our loyalty, because if it was, it would be over. God is true to his word of promise to love us regardless of what we do. If we live as his enemies, constantly indeplicable, giving little or no regard to our Creator and Redeemer and his good plans for us, then our lives can never be anything but the miserable, selfish stabbed to the happiness that we can evoke for ourselves. But God is no less faithful to us, regardless of what we do. Keep leaving the door open and the porch light on, even when we are holed up in our shack with the door closed. He's out there knocking, even when we put earplugs on and crawl under the bed. The point is: God is faithful. That's the way it is, and that's how it's going to be When you look at Jesus Christ, you see what God is like. He sacrifices himself for sinners, and invites the Father to forgive even those whose greed, pride, ambition and jealousy led them to torture and kill him. In this, we all have a pole; we all h creation. We pray for healing, but we trust in ourselves with the One who takes care of us. We believe it will do what is right and good for us. We live by faith, resting in his hands, because he is good. The main thing like the paralytic, we know that our sins are forgiven, and that's what really matters. If we too are physically healed, this is an in addition blessing. But we must remember that the paralytic is dead. Lazarus, who was relieved of death, died. Every person who has ever been healed, has eventually died, and unless Jesus returns before he dies, we too, who have never been cured of a disease or not, die. Physical healing is great, and we praise God for the wonderful healings he has given and continues to give, but we ultimately look at something that lasts forever. Like those cited as examples of faith in the Book of Jews, we seek a better, permanent, heavenly country promised to us by those who are faithful (Hebrews 11:13-16).
